**Morse on Ballot In North Dakota**  
Bismarck, N. D. — (AP) — The name of Democratic Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon will appear in the presidential column on the North Dakota ballot this November.  
Four men filed Thursday as Nonpartisan League electors in behalf of Morse.  
A petition containing 289 names was filed at the secretary of state's office before noon. The number was 11 short of the legal minimum needed to get on the ballot. One half-hour before the 5 p.m. deadline on filings, K. W. Simons of Zap brought in the needed signatures.  
The Morse move was interpreted as an effort to create a third party in North Dakota. The Nonpartisan League held a joint convention with the Democrats this year and Simons opposed the move.  
If Morse drew five per cent of the total vote, a third party would be created with ballot representation in North Dakota.

A Good Egg Not Hard To Find or to Cook  
Nowadays fresh, top grade eggs are not all hard to find, in fact it borders on the impossible, thanks to the continuing improvement of refrigerated transportation and proper storage both at the food markets and in the home. Once you get them home, remember that eggs like the coldest place in the refrigerator, and keep them covered to avoid having odors of other foods permeate their delicate flavor.  
A good egg for the breakfast table should be strictly fresh top grade. A good egg for cooking in such things as meat loaf, custards and the like, however, is a medium or smaller egg and need not be the very top grade. A good egg for baking, especially in cakes, is a large egg which will weigh about 2 ounces.

**Fish Filets Baker With Herbed Crumbs**  
There are "no bones to pick" about it, fish filets are among the most popular types of ready-to-cook fish. We spiced these with an oregano and marjoram dressing for your taste-pleasure. Recipe makes six servings.  
1 1/2 pounds fish filets  
Salt  
6 slices butter  
3 cups soft bread crumbs  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper  
1/4 teaspoon whole oregano leaves, crumbled  
1/4 teaspoon marjoram leaves, crumbled  
1/2 cup (1 cube) butter, melted  
Cut fish into six serving-size pieces; place in a greased nine-inch baking pan and sprinkle with salt. Place a slice of butter or margarine on each piece. Combine remaining ingredients and cover each piece of fish with one-half cup of the mixture. Bake in moderate, 375 degree, oven 25 to 30 minutes or until crumbs are brown and fish flakes easily.  
**Potatoes and Eggs Country-Style**  
This delightful old-time recipe will make a hearty breakfast feast or may be served as a luncheon or supper main dish. Some cooks will add bits of pimiento for extra color and flavor. Sliced stuffed green olives are also a nice addition.  
1 cup cold diced cooked potatoes  
1/4 cup (1/2 cube) minced onion  
1/4 cup (1/2 cube) butter  
5 eggs, well beaten  
1/2 cup light cream  
1/4 to 1 teaspoon salt  
Pepper  
2 tablespoons chopped parsley

**Egg Beating Notes**  
If you're going to separate yolks from whites, the sooner the better after removing from the refrigerator. If whites are to be stiffly beaten, hold at room temperature for a while for highest, lightest results. Eggs for baking purposes should also be restored to room temperature.  
**Eggs Can Get Tough**  
Eggs will get tough if you make it too hot for them. Simmer, don't boil. Fry gently, don't fry. Bake slowly, don't broil. And the double boiler saves toil and trouble when cooking egg mixtures on top of the stove.  
**Soft-Cooked Eggs.** If eggs are at room temperature, place them in boiling water, cover and set in warm place off the heat from six to eight minutes, depending on consistency desired. If eggs are fresh from refrigerator, start with cold water, being sure water is at least one-fourth inch over top of eggs. Heat gradually to simmering; remove from heat and hold two to five minutes depending on consistency desired. Do not boil.  
**Hard-Cooked Eggs.** Same as soft-cooked eggs except that eggs are held in the water 15 to 20 minutes dependent on

size of eggs. If eggs are cooked too long or at a high temperature a dark ring is likely to form around the yolk. The ring is harmless but unattractive. To remove shell smoothly dip egg immediately into cold water; tap gently on hard surface turning over and over to break shell in many small pieces.

**Fish Story.** There are excellent choices among coast-caught fish and shellfish, and they really deserve a place on our menus more often. Consider fish sticks, cod, flounder, halibut, rock fish, salmon, sea bass and shrimp. They are plentiful, modest in cost, quickly prepared. Give flavor fillip to any broiled white fish by spreading fish when hot with blend of butter and prepared mustard. For a gourmet touch, blend butter and anchovy paste and spread over fish. Don't forget the lemon wedges.  
**Cheese Dishes.** Seasonal abundance of cheddar cheese offers menu variety in grilled cheese sandwiches, cheese souffles, cheese fondue, rarebits, sauces for vegetables. Plenty of dairy fresh cottage cheese for salad and sandwich making, cheese cakes, lasagna and other cooked dishes.  
**Fruit, Vegetable Abundance**  
Fall harvests continue to bring in bountiful supplies of colorful fruits and vegetables. Fruit varieties now include Jonathan apples (the favorite of schoolboys), grapes, melons, bananas and a smattering of cranberries. Western-grown vegetables include c a r r o t s,
