Ashland Grizzlies Nip Crater Comets

Central Point—Ashland Grizzlies nipped the Crater Comets 13 to 6 Friday night in a struggle of surging offense. But, the Comets of Central Point and their partisans long will be insistent that victory should have gone to them.

With just 15 seconds showing on the clock, the Comets were knocking at the Ashland door. They had the ball on Ashland's one yard line, fourth down and, of course, goal to go. Halfback Loyal Higinbotham, Crater standout of the night, crashed ahead. Crater players say he poked across the goal. But, officials placed the pigskin on the one-inch line and the Central Pointers lost the ball.

Ashland tabulated twice before the Comets hit pay dirt but the CP gridders, trailing 7 to 13 at the quarter's end, touchdown in the next panel for a 14 to 13 halfway edge. The Grizzlies had 27 to 20 advantage for three cantos.

Voris Runs 84
Bob Voris put Ashland on the scoreboard with an 84-yard run on a pitchout. Then, the Bruins promanaded 55 yards in eight plays with Ron Scholar going across the pay stripe from the four. Voris ran the bonus for 13-0.

Crater roused up and bombarded 82 yards in 10 plays with Glines getting a TD on a six yard roll out play. Glines ran the conversion counter. A Glines to Higinbotham pass ate up 38 yards of this push.

In the second panel Ashland drove to the Crater six-yard line with Voris to Bob King throw making 33 yards to the Comet 17. John Harris fell on an Ashland fourth down fumble and the Comets took possession on their own 13. They sprang out for 37 yards and a TD in 14 maneuvers with the ball. A 35-yard Glines to Higinbotham passing gain gave the booster and John Champ ran over from the five. Champ also banged the bonus.

Ashland in the third quarter battered 66 yards in six plays with Scholar scoring from the four and Voris running the conversion. Crater flared back after starting from its 40 and a 32-yard aerial play, Glines to Harold

The last two cantos saw Toews and Mike Barnes and Edmonds getting extra points. Icing on the cake came with Barnes passing for one more TD.

The Grizzly Cubs couldn't seem to get off the ground. Their only hope for the visitors came on interceptions by Jan Sursee and Bob Johnson. But the Ashlanders couldn't take advantage.

OSC Defeats Houston by 29-20 Score

Portland, Ore. — (UPI)—Sophomore Terry Baker passed for two touchdowns and fullback Chuck Marshall ran for two more, one on a 56-yard gallop to give Oregon State a 29-20 football victory over University of Houston last night.

Oregon State never was behind in the wide-open defensive battle before 22:57 but the Beavers were hard pressed to pull out their second victory in three starts.

Oregon State turned two Houston fumbles into first quarter touchdowns and appeared to be on its way to a romp. But Houston, behind the passing of reserve quarterback Don Sessions and the running of Ken Bolin, rallied to make it a close game.

Marshall broke through the center of the line in the third period and eluded three men on his 56-yard touchdown run to give the Beavers a 22-14 lead. Houston came back to make it 22-20 but Baker's 26-yard scoring pass to halfback Gene Hilliard iced the victory in the final quarter.

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Attempted Bribe Case Turned Over to NCAA

Ann Arbor, Mich. — (UPI)—The Michigan state police, with no one pressing for legal action, have dropped the investigation of an alleged attempt to bribe a University of Oregon player and have turned the matter over to the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

A Brooklyn, N.Y., school teacher — identified as David Budin — was arrested last Saturday in connection with an alleged attempt to "fix" the outcome of the Michigan-Oregon football game.

State police said Friday that Budin, accompanied by two other men, approached Oregon's defensive halfback Mickey Bruce of San Diego, Calif., and discussed the point spread of the Michigan game. Police also said Budin mentioned a figure of \$5,000.

Eagle Point Victor Over Rogue River

Rogue River—Eagle Point turned three pass interceptions into touchdowns and capitalized when a Rogue River high fourth down gamble failed Friday night to defeat the Chieftains 26 to 0 in a Rogue league grid encounter here.

It was the Eagles' Rogue league starter and their first victory of the season. They hadn't scored a touchdown in a previous game. Mike Palm tallied two TDs for Eagle Point. Steve Geren one and Tom Perdue the other. Geren kicked two extra markers.

First touchdowns followed an interception by Perdue on the Rogue River 42-yard line. Palm crossed the goal on a 22-yard run. Geren next snared a Chief aerial on the Rogue River 43. Scoring punch was a Perdue to Geren pass was a 12 yards. Big run of the occasion was Palm's 70-yard interception runback for a score.

Yardage Try Fails
In the fourth quarter, RR tried for yardage on first down and failed. Eagle Point took over on the Chieftain 34. Geren broke to the 29 and Perdue sneaked the other five. Rogue River made several threats including pushes to the EP 19 and 22.

The Eagles netted 202 yards from scrimmage to Rogue River's 44 and led in first downs 7 to 6.

Klamath Falls — Phoenix High school overcame a tough hurdle in its Rogue league football campaign Saturday afternoon by coming from behind to nudge Henley 13 to 6 on the Henley field.

Henley's Hornets headed 6 to 0 at the halftime intermission on Chuck Blofsky's second quarter touchdowns. He crossed from six yards out following 20 to 25 yard passing games.

Phoenix drove 77 yards in 12 plays for a TD in the third quarter. Mike Conbruck scored on a seven yard run and Jerry Moore ran the extra to put the Pirates in front.

In the fourth quarter Phoenix drove over after Gary Colfax intercepted a Hornet pass and ran back 45 yards to the Henley 20. Conbruck went over from a yard away.

Phoenix led 10 to 6 on yards from scrimmage and Henley 169, of which 136 was through the air. However, the Hornets led in first downs 13 to 11.
