

Works by Valley Painter To Be At Rogue Gallery

Ashland-Oil paintings by Benoyd Stephen Bayless, Southern Oregon college assistant professor of art, will be on view at the Rogue Gallery, Medford, from October 4 through October 21.

According to Mr. Bayless, the works are recent ones, the majority having been completed during the past year while he was on leave from SOCC on a teaching association at Washington State university where he is working to complete his doctoral degree.

Previous to the one-man show at the Rogue gallery, Mr. Bayless has shown in the Portland Art museum, the Spokane Art museum, the Weasner gallery in Seattle in Northwest competitions. In addition, he has had three one-man shows in the Southern Oregon college and Eastern Oregon college galleries.

The Bayless paintings to be in the Rogue gallery are abstract expressionist and draw upon the world of form and color as a means of conveying the artist's statements.

"A statement in painting should not be a literal one," says Artist Bayless. "It is important that depth of experience serve as the motivation and the purpose of art. This, then, eliminates the necessity for, and any obligation toward, the graphic representation of a literal idea. Ideas exist in color and form relationships. These ideas are expressive of the artist's experience. This in itself can per-

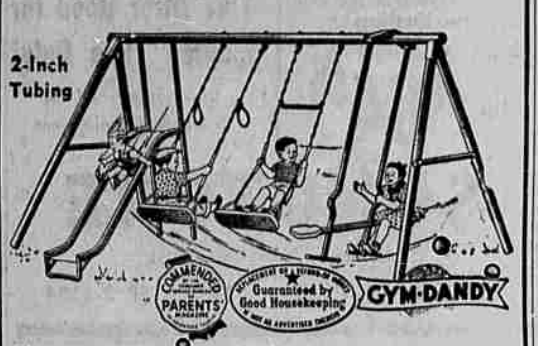
