Shakespearean Portrait Added to National Show

A portrait made by Dwayne Smith of classic studies, Medford, has been accepted as a "loan print" by the Professional Photographers of America, Inc., and has been made part of a traveling loan collection.

The portrait is one of the Shakespearean actor, Philip Hanson, Ashland, and was made for the actors' Kings and Clowns show in which he toured last winter. The print was chosen from four which Mr. Smith entered in the show of the Professional Photographers.

The Medford photographer reports that he entered the maximum number of four prints in the national exhibition, and that all four were hung. Prints submitted for the show are judged by a jury on a point system, with 50 points being the largest number which it is possible to win on a print. Any print receiving 30 or more points in this judging is accepted to be hung at the print display for the national convention, and the maker receives one merit point towards his master's degree for each print accepted.

Prints of exceptional quality which receive 45 or more points are placed in the traveling loan collection and the maker receives two merits for the print. Mr. Smith's additional three prints each won 35 points and were displayed at the national convention. He thereby won five merit points, making seven which he now has toward the 25 necessary to apply for his master's degree. Last year Mr. Smith had one print hung in the national show. This also was Shakespearean in origin, having been his portrait of Anne L. Bowmer, producing-director of the Oregon Shakespearean festival, in his costume as Shylock of "Merchant of Venice," two seasons ago. This was made originally for the festival program cover.

All the prints which the Medford photographer has submitted to the Professional Photographers of America for judging for merit points have been Shakespearean in origin, and he plans to submit only this type for competition in the future. Mr. Smith has been official photographer for the festival the last three years.

Potpourri

Several days ago the mail brought six long pages of single-spaced typewritten lines from the William Pearsons, who recently left the Rogue Valley to live in Honolulu and operate the Quaker guest house in that city. Mrs. Pearson frankly said that she wrote the letter to Potpourri in the hope that it could be published, thereby saving her the labor of writing to her numerous friends.

"My job here has never been clearly defined," she wrote, "but like Topsy, it just grows, and in the process uses all of my available time."

The letter, "as is," would use up about five or six columns of type. Potpourri, who struggles daily to keep ahead of the piles of local material, tried first to enlist Pal Peg's aid in coping with the epistle, and then mixed it in with EO's stack of weddings and meetings to write. But neither the church editor or Friday Girl found time for the letter, and here it is again, back on Potpourri's still well-covered desk.

All is not lost. We're going to start a "round robin" with it, for it is too interesting to abandon. Early in the letter Mrs. Pearson wrote that she and her husband and their young daughter, Anne, went to the islands "economy tourist" on the President Cleveland. Since this class of passage provides dormitory type accommodations, Mrs. Pearson and Anne found themselves in the midst of a troop of Girl Scouts going from Iowa to Hawaii, which made everything lively, especially since the voyage was rough and many were ill.

Mrs. Pearson wrote that she had been enjoying the great quantities of flowers, had attended a fair sponsored by the Hawaii Farm Bureau and learned a great deal about island agriculture, and had also enjoyed the many programs given to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the coming of the first contract laborers from Japan to the islands.

Anne is attending a school with 1,400 children enrolled, finding it a great contrast to classes at Ruch. In addition to the usual studies for the third grade, she has been pestering her parents to let her study hula dancing and either the Japanese or Chinese language. She has been attending Manoa Valley Congregational Sunday school, where she is the only Caucasian child in the primary department, and then returns to attend Sunday school in the Quaker center, since the two services are held at different hours.

Anne has found the school lunch a unique experience, since the menu includes dishes familiar to the various groups represented. "Rice is served every day, poi (which she says she like very much, daikon, meat with sweet and sour sauce, and other equally interesting dishes," Mrs. Pearson wrote.

We should have asked Matilda Nelson how to cook black-eyed peas. Mrs. Nelson, who lived in Georgia before she came to the West, was telling with pleasure at the Sojourner Guest day not long ago how she had obtained some seeds and planned to grow some good old-fashioned black-eyed peas in her own garden next year.

That very night while browsing along the grocery store shelves we came upon canned black-eyed peas, so we bought some as an experiment. The label said peas, but what was beside looked like beans to Potpourri and Pappy. (Pappy was born in West Virginia, but doesn't know a thing about black-eyed peas).

We put the peas in a saucepan and heated them with a little salt and pepper and then tasted. Deciding that more seasoning was needed, we put in some dried basil and a couple of tablespoons of cooking sherry. This improved the taste, but something still seemed to be lacking, so we added a bit of meat broth. The result must have been fair, for the two of us finished off the batch, along with the meat patties and salad, without any trouble.

Perhaps black-eyed peas could be prepared like garbanzos or the big kidney beans—marinated in vinegar, oil and spices and served cold. This is the manner in which Julie Tumblers at Mon Desir prepares both the garbanzos and big beans, and they are delicious.

Wedding parties are getting bigger and bigger. Potpourri and the society gals work real hard when the attendants number 10 or 12—four bridesmaids, a best man, four ushers and a flower girl, but the New York Times often prints wedding stories where attendants number as many as two dozen. Recent issues have had one wedding where the headline said 26 attend couple, and another said 28.

Somehow, this society editor hopes the time never comes when we have to take time to count the number of attendants and then record it in the headlines of a wedding story.—O.S.

Foods Group To Hear Talk On Rose Hips

The food value of rose hips will be discussed at a meeting of Natural Foods Associates Tuesday, October 4, at 7:45 p.m. in room 35 of the Medford High school. The public is invited.

Mrs. Dorothy Roelfs will give a thirty-minute report on the rose hips and their preparation; there will be five mimeographed recipes of those who desire them. Rose hips should be picked before the heavy frosts, and there are abundant supplies of wild roses in this area. They are said to be a valuable source of vitamin C.

The second half of the program will be a recording of one of Earl Nightingale's most famous lectures, titled "The Strangest Secret." This lecture is said to be the result of more than 20 years of research and practical application and no use throughout the world.

A study group for mothers of young children is being planned in order to exchange information and ideas regarding a nutritional program which would be most advantageous for the family which includes children still living at home. It is tentatively planned to meet at 10 o'clock one morning a month in the homes of the members. Anyone interested in a study group of this sort is asked to remain after the regular NFA meeting to discuss plans.

Dr. Weiss believes deer and wild rabbit are excellent and preferable to the meat of commercially grown or domesticated animals, and that the vital organs are most beneficial for health; therefore it is best to consume the heart, liver and kidneys more often than roasts, steaks and other muscle portions of the meat. He also mentioned the importance of obtaining complete proteins, rather than trying to obtain what is lacking of a single vitamin.
