Candidate's Wife Said 'Diplomatic'

Mrs. Henry Cabot Lodge By United Press International "Every man in politics should marry an Emily Lodge," said her husband's onetime college roommate, John Mason Brown.

Mrs. Lodge showed just what he meant when a reporter questioned her recently on an international crisis her husband, then Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, was dealing with at the United Nations.

"Of course I have ideas," said Mrs. Lodge. "Who hasn't? But it couldn't matter less what I think, could it? I'm sure Cabot would love to talk to you about it."

She had demonstrated her diplomacy as well, without a public word, a year ago when she was official escort to Mrs. Nikita Khrushchev and her daughters during the Soviet premier's tour of the United States. Mrs. Lodge packed half a dozen or more of her prettiest hats for public appearances. But Mrs. Khrushchev never wore a hat; neither did her hostess.

Is Tall, Slim Mrs. Lodge, a tall, slim and elegant woman with light brown hair and brown eyes, was born Emily Seft, daughter of a Boston surgeon and member of a family as her husband's. They met at a debutante party and were married in 1926, two years after his graduation from Harvard.

Emily Seft was born July 5, 1905, in Beverly, Mass.

where she and her husband still have their permanent home. She attended a Boston private school and studied piano and other subjects for three years in Paris at the Conservatory of the Assumption and Institut Capoulque.

Political Charm Her family's political charm is not confined to the Republican party. Mrs. Lodge's sister is the wife of Archibald S. Alexander of New Jersey, an active Democrat.

She entered the political and diplomatic life early; her husband was a Washington newspaperman at the time of their marriage. In the capital bureau of the New York Herald Tribune. Their sons George Cabot, now an assistant secretary of labor, and Henry Seft, an electronics firm executive, were born in Washington.

Mrs. Lodge is the grandmother of eight children — Lodge noted recently in response to a question on the religious issue in the campaign that some of them are Roman Catholics, as is their mother. The family is otherwise Episcopalian.

Probably the most awesome and spectacular part of the trip were the many miles through the lava beds approaching Redmond, Ore., from the MacKenzie pass. Water and Soap Good for Leather

Chicago — (UPI) — Genuine leather or the synthetic variety can be kept clean as new with lukewarm water and mild soap, says W. J. Buxton, general service manager for an automobile manufacturer.

Dip a soft brush in lukewarm water, shake out excess moisture, and rub the brush on soap with a circular motion until a rich lather is raised.

Work the lather over a small area of the soiled material, using the same circular motion except along pleatings, seams and natural leather veins. In these areas, the brush should be applied in the direction of the fold or vein.

Repeat the operation if necessary. Wipe the material clean with dry cheesecloth, then buff to high sheen.
