Sen. John F. Kennedy spent the day resting at his Hyannis Port, Mass., home. But his press secretary, Pierre Salinger, was authorized to say in reply to Nixon charges about defeat of Kennedy-backed legislation in the summer session of Congress: "There is no question that Republican obstructionism prevented enactment of these bills."
"The vice president seemed to have missed the mark rather widely. It was not Sen. Kennedy who suffered defeat, but the people."
Salinger said the defeat was felt by persons "hoping to get a \$1.25 an hour minimum wage, effective medical care for the aged, effective legislation for federal aid for schools. And if Vice President Nixon can derive any satisfaction out of this defeat of the legitimate aspirations of the people, that is his privilege."

Democratic vice presidential candidate Lyndon B. Johnson at a Democratic rally in Jackson, Tenn.: "The Republicans suffer from delusions of adequacy, and the case is too advanced for an effective cure."
"In 1947, his (Nixon's) first year in Congress, the Republican candidate for President voted against raising REA (Rural Electrification Administration) funds from \$225 million to \$250 million. In 1948 he voted against providing \$300 million needed for REA loans, and against restoring a 50 per cent cut in funds for the administration of the REA program. Yet he says he is for farmers. What farmers does he mean—those in Outer Mongolia? Certainly he has shown no friendship for the farmers of America."

Vice President Richard M. Nixon at Binghamton, N.Y., challenging Kennedy's TV debate statement that Russia by 1975 will be producing more power than the United States: "If America stood absolutely still, if we built not one additional hydroelectric project between now and then, the Soviet would be faced with the monumental task of building eight Grand Coulee dams a year from now until 1977 just to catch up to where America is today in hydroelectric power."

Tax Collections Reach New High

Portland - Oregon tax collections reached a high of \$208 million in 1960, according to preliminary data released by the bureau of census. This compares to collection of \$177 million in 1959, and \$194 million in 1957, the previous high.

The 1960 tax collections on a per capita basis amounted to \$118.39. This compares to \$101.72 for the nation; \$182.82 for Washington; \$136.99 for California and \$104.09 for Idaho.

Receipts from individual income taxes in 1960 totalled \$94.6 million or 45 per cent of the total from all sources. Sales and gross receipt taxes, largely on motor fuels, brought in \$45 million. License tax collections accounted for \$40.8 million with licenses on motor vehicles bringing in the major part of the total.
