

Southern Oregon Red Raiders Trip Whitman Missionaries

Ashland - Southern Oregon college's Red Raiders of the Rogue, their backs to the wall with their own goal threatened through much of the second half, made their first and second quarter offense success stand up sufficient and recorded their first football victory of the season here on Saturday night.

The Raiders, who went scoreless through the last two quarters, yielded one touchdown and an intentional safety in that time but made two stout defensive stands to outlast the Whitman college Missionaries 26 to 23. Whitman had not before been beaten in 1960 play.

Gordon Carrigan with his generalship, his passing and his running and Allen Barnes with his packing of the ball were SOC's offensive sparkers.

Ball toters Al McKinnis and John Buck and aerial catchers Doyle Branson, Dave Hughes and Howard Hartman were other offensive cogs.

Carrigan Scores
Carrigan rolled around right end for the opening Red Raider touchdown and passed to Branson for a score.

Barnes carried the ball into the Whitman end zone twice and Lynn Knight kicked two extra points. Robin Beck, who geared the Missionary effort, passed to Larry Pedegana for one Whitman tally and Tim Smith touchdown twice.

Beck thumped the three conversions.
Said Coach Al Akins of his Raiders yesterday in retrospect, "I thought Carrigan and Barnes just about carried it. We caught Whitman by surprise and then hung on."

Barnes ran the ball 16 times for 127 yards, a 7.9 average. Carrigan, in addition to calling and igniting the attack, completed seven passes for 111 yards.

Southern Oregon struck its strongest in the second quarter, overcoming an early deficit with three touchdowns in the period. First cutoff scoring favored the Washington collegians 7 to 6. The Raiders barged out to a 19 to 7 margin and led 26 to 14 at the half.

Whitman closed it to 26 to 21 in quarter No. 3.
Pass For TD
The Missionaries reached pay soil first in the skirmish, going 53 yards after Jerry Hillis pipped on a Carrigan fumble. Whitman offset 20 yards of penalties with Beck passes for 36 yards to Hillis and for 22 yards to Pedegana for the score.

SOC took the kick-off and promenade 71 yards in seven plays to the goal. Barnes ripped off 48 yards by taking an option pitchout, sweeping right end and cutting left and down the field. A Hughes to Carrigan pass made 15 yards. Six yards were covered on Carrigan's roll around right end into the touchdown zone.

Next, the Raiders checked a Missionary offensive effort and marched out from their 27 on a 78-yard goalward drive. SOC's jaunt was hampered by one yard loss but a Whitman pass interference and a 15-yard

dash up the middle by Buck enhanced the push. Barnes took a delayed pitch from Carrigan and ran the last 19 yards. When Knight's kick was good the Raiders were on top 13 to 7. They were in front to stay.

Long Pass Tallies
Ray Nolte gave the Ashland team an opportunity shortly to up its margin. He fell on a Beck muff on the Whitman 48-yard line. Then, Carrigan arched a high, long pass. Defensive efforts of Missionary Doug Grant were to no avail as Branson, with a slick over the shoulder catch, touchdown for the Raiders.

Whitman fought out from its own 21-yard line and, helped by Pedegana's 25-yard burst, reached the Raider 18. But, Branson snuffed this bid with a pass interception on the three and ran out to the nine.

Two plays lost to the four and Tony Brauner's punt for the Raiders was deflected by Missionary Bob Brown. The ball went out to about the 23 and Hillis ran it back to the nine. Smith punted over the four then went over for a score.

A 19 to 14 count did not last for long. SOC covered 65 yards in 12 tires with the ball. Barnes boomed the final four yards as the Redskins closed out their scoring for the night.

Time Runs Out
Willie Garner's recovery of a Smith fumble gave SOC another big chance with possession on the Whitman 39. But time ran out in the half. Carrigan reached the 23 on a wide open reverse play as the gun went off.

Southern Oregon had only one good offensive streak in the second half. The Raiders reeled off three first downs in a third quarter surge but lost the ball on a Barnes' fumble. Whitman dominated from then on out as Beck handed to Smith, Pedegana and Bruce Hilger for good gains.

The Missionaries, on a 38-yard run by Smith, reached the SOC 21 but were stopped when Fred recovered a Beck muff on the 20. SOC was forced to punt after Beck was dumped for a loss back on the nine. Then, the visitors moved out on a 40-yard drive and Smith went across from the four.

Give Up Points
Whitman in the final quarter drove to the Raider three and lost the ball on downs. The Ashlanders got out to the five but on fourth down were on the three. Rather than risk a blocked punt and determining to get the ball as far as possible from their goal, the Raiders chose to give up two points. Brauner, instead of booting, downed the ball in the end zone for a safety. The Redmen were given a free kick from their 20 and Ron Baker punted.

The Washington aggregation banged back to a first down on the SOC 20. It moved to fourth down and two to go on the 12. Nolte tackled Pedegana for no gain. Taking over, the Ashlanders maintained

possession of the ball until time ran out.

Smith totaled 84 yards rushing for the Missionaries. Beck found receivers on 10 passes for 125 yards. Carrigan had 34 yards on 14 carries for the Raiders and Beck 26 yards on eight.

Coach Akins termed the play of lineman Willie Garner for the Raiders outstanding, "on defense, especially."

Striking quickly in the first quarter then hanging on until more scoring opportunities arose in the last half, the St. Mary's high football team of Medford turned back Glendale 18 to 0 here Saturday night.

It was the fourth win against no defeats for St. Mary's.

The Crusaders touchdown three plays after the opening kickoff when the Pirates punted to the SM 36-yard line. Andre Knutson grabbed the pigskin and picked his way down the field for 62 yards to the goal. Jim Calhoun's attempt to convert by kicking failed.

Second period saw no scoring and at halftime the count was 6 to 0.

Glendale's strong Pirates dominated the first half of play although they did not score. But, they were left far behind in the last two cantos. With the opening horn the Class B champs of Medford went out and used their multiple offense to run and pass for two more touchdowns. Knutson, Alex Mete, Calhoun and Fred Lucas did most of the chugging and grinding out of yardage.

Lucas Scores
The visitors gamely tried to stop the Crusaders, but Lucas pushed across from the three-yard line in the third panel after 11 plays ate up 85 yards in the longest sustained drive of the night. Calhoun's kick again failed.

Jack Berline ran the Glendale team with great skill. But superior SM defense was too much for the Pirates. And, while the defense was holding the offense went rolling along. At the change of ends for the fourth and final quarter, Knutson threw to Mete on a 52-yard pass-run play for TD. The kick was no good.

Statistics showed the Crusaders clearly in the lead. They had a net of 350 yards from scrimmage, 122 from passing and 228 from rushing. Glendale had 67 in the air and 152 on the ground for 219 total. The Blue and White also had 11 to 10 edge in first downs.

1st Period Scores Pay Off For State

Portland - UPI - For one quarter Oregon State was a better football team than Houston.

And that was enough as the Beavers used an initial period two-touchdown spurge to pull out a 29-20 victory.

Oregon State, which appeared to be on its way to a romp in piling up a 16-0 lead, had to battle all the way to get its second win in three starts before a crowd of 22,537 in the first college grid action of the season at Multnomah stadium.

One man didn't think the Beavers battled hard enough, however. That was their coach Tommy Prothro. "We won't win many football games if we play like we did against Houston," Prothro said. "I was pleased with the win and noting else."

Prothro said he thought his club "played fine football for 15 minutes and then had a letdown."

Sophomore tailback Terry Baker and fullback Chuck Marshall accounted for Beavers' touchdowns with Baker passing for two and Marshall running for a pair.

Oregon State, which lost wingback Aaron Thomas with a broken collar bone and had several other player injuries, continues its rugged schedule against the Big 10 conference Indiana Hoosiers at Bloomington, Ind., Saturday.

Two junior varsity football games are slated tonight, matching teams of the Southern Oregon conference.

Medford, aiming for its fourth jayvee triumph will be host to Grants Pass, Ashland meets Crater at Central Point. Both games are set for 7 p.m.

A nominal admission charge will be made for the game at Medford.

Forty Nine Eleven Tips LA's Rams

San Francisco - UPI - It was back to the planning board for the offensive teams of San Francisco and Los Angeles today in the wake of a defensive battle here Sunday won by the Forty Niners, 13-9.

In one of the lowest-scoring National league games ever played in Kezar stadium, coach Red Hickey's club counted the only touchdown of the game. All nine Ram points came on a trio of field goals; and San Francisco also got a pair.

While most observers believed San Francisco played a much better game last week in losing to the New York Giants, the Forty Niner coaching staff wasn't too sure.

"Both defensive sides were playing well and making it tough for the offensives to get rolling," said Hickey.

The closest game ever got to the San Francisco goal line was 14 yards away. Danny Villanueva kicked a field goal from the 21 when that drive ended.

The Rams other two field goals came in the fourth quarter. They set up the first by waiting out the clock at the end of the third period so they could boot with the wind. This cost them a five-yard penalty.

But Lou Michaels kicked it squarely between the goal posts from the 50-yard line - longest field goal in Ram history. The other Los Angeles field goal was by Villanueva from the 36.

San Francisco's touchdown came after a 74-yard drive, with quarterback Y. A. Tittle passing to Hugh McElhenry for the score from the two.

The big punches in this drive were a 42-yard "Alley Oop" pass from Tittle to R. C. Owens that put the ball on the Los Angeles 37 in the second period; and Tittle's own run from the 23 to the eight.

Tammy Davis booted two field goals for the Forty Niners in the third period, from the 27 and 14-yard lines.

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Coast Net Title Won By MacKay

Berkeley, Calif. - UPI - Barry MacKay needed scarcely more than an hour Sunday to breeze past unseeded Jack Douglas and retain his singles title in the 71st annual Pacific Coast Tennis championships.

And Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., who won the National singles title at Forest Hills last month, needed only 38 minutes to polish off England's Ann Haydon for the women's crown, 6-2, 6-3.

MacKay got off to a slow start against Douglas, a former star quarterback for Stanford and now a Marine. But the big Davis Cupper from Dayton, Ohio, quickly gained control of the situation and put together sets of 6-3, 6-2 and 6-4.

Douglas won the first two games of the opening set within 10 minutes and led 40-15 in the third when MacKay started storming the net. MacKay won that game and set, took the second set and proceeded toward making a rout of the third set when he picked up a 5-0 advantage.

But Douglas rallied to hold his own service twice, break MacKay twice and make the score 4-5 before MacKay could clinch the 65-minute victory.

Cliff Mayne and Hugh Ditzler, two local players, won the doubles title with a 5-7, 6-4, 6-4, 6-2 triumph over Bill Crosby and Whitney Reed, both also from this area.

Whitney and Reed had qualified for the championship match with an upset 6-1, 6-2 victory over Wimbledon's Rafael Osuna of Mexico and Dennis Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif.

Mayne and Ditzler gained the finals by defeating MacKay and Ron Holmberg of Brooklyn, 8-6, 5-7, 9-7.

Maria Bueno of Brazil and Miss Hard won the women's doubles crown with a 6-2, 6-2 decision over Britain's Christine Truman and Miss Haydon.

The mixed doubles title went to Carole Caldwell of Santa Monica, and Chris Crawford of Piedmont, Calif. They defeated Billie Jean Moffitt of Long Beach, Calif., and Antonio Palafox of Mexico, 4-6, 6-3, 6-4.

Linfield's win was also gained in the second half. Trailing by 7-8 at halftime, the Wildcats converted a third period fumble by Royce McDaniel on the Pioneer 29 into a score with Al Leopold carrying it over from one yard out.

The other conference teams, Whitman and College of Idaho, dropped non-conference games. Whitman lost to Southern Oregon, 26-23, and the Coyotes were upended by Westminster, 7-0.

George Shaw, once Unitas' understudy at Baltimore, also passed for four touchdowns as the Giants spoiled the St. Louis Cardinals' debut in their new hometown, 45-14, and quarterback Milt Plum gained 308 yards through the air in the Browns' 28-20 win over the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Paul Hornung and fullback Jim Taylor led the Green Bay Packers to a 28-9 triumph.
