"Writing your own biography is like filling out an application for a loan. Some things are better left out. Everything is a blank until I was nine years old and fell off a horizontal bar and broke my left elbow.

"The next thing I remember I left college to become a sports writer on the Bakersfield Californian, where I learned how to score baseball games and spell.

"I was working on the Honolulu Advertiser in Honolulu, T.H., on December 7, 1941, and I was just as surprised as the Army and Navy when the Japanese bombed us.

Lost His Typewriter

"In World War II I was a combat correspondent with the U.S. Marine Corps and was present at the battle of Iwo Jima, where I distinguished myself by losing my portable typewriter on D Day.

"Since the war I have worked on a half a dozen West Coast newspapers as a reporter and writer, including two which sank into oblivion soon after I left them.

"For the past six years I have been employed by the Los Angeles Times, which does not seem likely to pass on whether I go or stay.

"I am a domesticated but not wholly tamed American male of an age at which you are supposed to stop doing certain things and start doing certain other things, none of which I have done.

"I live with my wife and our two sons, 12 and 14, on Mt. Washington, a rundown, scraggy hill which is still infested by skunks, foxes, coyotes and tarantulas.

Wants to Write Book

"I am not what you would call an outdoor man but I like to look out the window. Someday I hope to write a book about the marine life of the Tahitian coral reefs. My wife is president of the PTA. We have two dogs and a cat which has been missing since June 17, 1958, which was my 10th wedding anniversary.

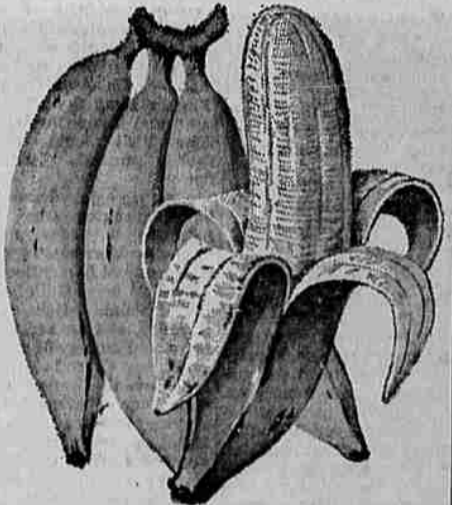

Two Timber Tax Plans Drawn by Interim Group

Salem—(AP)—The Legislative Interim Tax committee Saturday emerged with two timber taxation plans to submit to the 1961 legislature, one for Eastern Oregon and the other for Western Oregon.

Because of the nature of the pine forests in Eastern Oregon in that various age classes of timber must grow on the same acre the committee recommended removal of collection of property taxes on the basis of value. These property taxes would be collected instead through a harvest or severance tax at the time the timber is removed from the ground.

Separate rates would exist for various species. The rate for ponderosa pine would be \$1.50 for a thousand board feet. A spokesman said in order to prevent removal of this timber from the bonding base the present values of timber would be continued on the tax rolls and adjusted periodically. The severance tax money would be distributed to all counties and taxing units in relation to the present standing timber. Standing timber would be checked periodically to accomplish equitable distribution.

The committee adopted a proposal by the Industrial Forestry association for timber taxation in western Oregon. The proposal provides that the determination of the discount factor from immediate harvest value of standing timber would be set by the legislature at 30 per cent. Presently this discount is determined by the State Tax commission.

The committee was not certain that its recommendations should apply to growing timber and while it adopted the Industrial Forestry association's proposal, a subcommittee was named to further explore the taxation of growing timber.
