Her neighbors in Georgetown frequently see her in a wool sweater and Capri pants, sometimes washing the car, sometimes out strolling with her daughter, Carolyn, who'll be three in November.

Mrs. Kennedy Described As 'Natural and Honest'

If Mrs. John F. Kennedy is the next First Lady, she will be the youngest wife ever to preside at the White House. Jacqueline Kennedy, an exquisitely beautiful woman, at 31, doesn't fit the Madison Avenue image of a presidential wife.

It's doubtful that she will try to mold herself to fit any accepted pattern. But she's natural, honest, and thinks that love of art and literature is no sin.

Pregnancy has kept her from the grind of the campaign. But she hopes to hold a few teas and small gatherings at her homes in fashionable Georgetown and Hyannis Port, Mass., to win support for her husband.

"Jackie" Kennedy admits she's never been particularly drawn to the game of politics. But she's developed a lively interest since her marriage in 1953 and knows that she has to keep it. If she wants to keep up with her husband, "My husband's life is politics and his life is my life," she once summed it up simply.

It is obvious that she never thought of herself as a vote-getter. In this respect, she is not in competition with the "Pat for First Lady" campaign of her GOP counterpart.

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Mrs. Kennedy was born in Southampton, N.Y., and reared in New York City, New-

port and "Merrywood" the Virginia estate of her stepfather, Hugh D. Auchincloss. She spent three years at Vassar, a year at the Sorbonne in Paris and received a bachelor's degree in history of art and literature from George Washington University.

She speaks several languages fluently, can recite poetry by the hour, and has helped her husband pepper his speeches with quotes from the classics.

She entranced France's Gen. Charles De Gaulle when he visited the United States. "The only thing I want to bring back from America," he said, "is Mrs. Kennedy."
