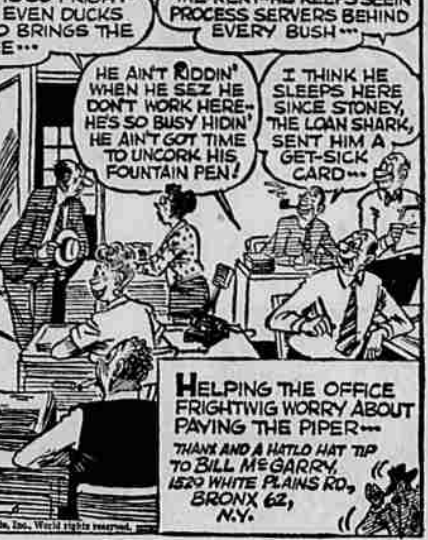

## In the Days News

Of all the questions that face us at this moment in history (and their number is legion) I think we can all agree that this one looms largest in the minds of the people of the United States: How STRONG are we?

Are we strong enough to deter Russia from attacking us?

**I DON'T KNOW.**

You don't know. So let's turn to General Nathan F. Twining, who is retiring as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Before that, he was Air Force chief of staff.

If anybody in America knows how strong we are in relation to our enemy, it is General Twining.

**SPEAKING** at a dinner of the National Security Industrial Association in Washington, he said:

"The United States can now destroy Russia, and China, too, if we are attacked, and the communists know it."

He added:

"They know that even if they launched a surprise attack they would bring down destruction on their own heads."

**ANOTHER** question: Of all our weapons, which does Russia presently fear most?

**SEEKING** an answer, let's turn to the Inter-Parliamentary Union, an organization in which many Asiatic nations are represented, which opened its annual conference in Tokyo yesterday.

In a special message to the Inter-Parliamentary Union, Soviet Premier Khrushchev charged that "the U. S. government by sending atomic and hydrogen bombs through the world's air space creates an appalling danger for everyone." The Soviet delegate, Justus Paletskis, who read the message, added that "the American bases overseas are nothing but bleeding wounds on earth which may cause war."

Turning to the Japanese, he said: "Do you want this planet turned into another Hiroshima by a handful of saber-rattling adventurers?"

**WHY** this bitterness about our bases that surround Russia?

The answer is quite plain. Russia FEARS them. There are hundreds of them. Russia knows that if she launches an attack against us, bombers from these bases will DESTROY her. There are so many of them that she knows she can't destroy them all at one fell blow.

Russia KNOWS we are strong.

**WE** mustn't, of course, permit ourselves to fall into the delusion that we are strong enough and don't need to do anything more. That would be fatal.

But let's not get scared out of our boots. That, too, could be fatal.

## Campaign Quotes

**By United Press International**

Sen. John F. Kennedy (in Carbondale, Ill.):

"It is ridiculous that a nation which is in a race for its life with Russia cannot find full-time use for the talents and energies of seven million people."

"I am proud to have been the floor leader in the Senate for the depressed area redevelopment bill. That bill passed the Senate three times. It passed the House twice. And both times the Republicans vetoed it."

"Now, in an election year, the Republicans are pretending that their token bill will provide more help than the Democratic bill. But if you read the fine print in the Republican contract you will see that it cuts the heart out of the program. It requires local sources to raise six or seven times the amount of money that the federal government will provide. And local money is precisely what cannot be raised."

"This is an example of the Republican bargain basement approach to economic problems."
