

## Three Reunions Planned During Homecoming

Eugene — Three reunions are slated during the University of Oregon's 1960 Homecoming on Oct. 14 to 16.

Two fraternities chapters are planning the reunions in honor of their 50 years on the Oregon campus and one class is holding a five-year reunion. Alpha Tau Omega and Sigma Chi fraternities, both of which were chartered on the university campus in 1910, will celebrate the occasions with banquets and recurring chapter members.

Guests for the ATO reunion, in recognition of the founding here in February, 1910, will be charter member and past national president John MacGregor, a distinguished Oregon alumnus from New York; and the present national president, Gerland Johnson, Cleveland. Charter members will hold a dinner on Oct. 12, and on Friday night will join all returning members of the chapter for a banquet.

Some 350 members are expected to return for the Sigma Chi reunion. This chapter was founded at Oregon in November, 1910, the second fraternity on the campus.

The class of 1955, the first to hold a five-year reunion, plans a special post-game reception. Presiding as master of ceremonies will be Jim Light, Eugene. Don Rotenberg, permanent president of the class, will be unable to attend.

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## West Berlin Said Corrupting East Germans With Music Fad

Berlin—UPI—One reason the Communists want to liquidate free West Berlin, in the opinion of many observers, is to do away with what they call the "corrupting" influences of movies, cigarettes, and songs from across the border.

"They've told us we won't be able much longer to cross over and see western movies and smoke western cigarettes," a 21-year-old worker told a UPI reporter in East Berlin recently.

As far as song goes, the lowly portable radio is a traitor within the gates.

Usually "Decadent" Sounds. It's hard to walk a block in East Berlin at night without meeting a teen-ager wired for sound. The sounds are usually "decadent" western music from West Berlin stations.

"Treacherous recordings from the Golden West," the Communist Party newspaper "Neues Deutschland" calls them.

East Berlin has only a few movies and these are crowded. Its few dance halls are sold out days in advance.

So the youngsters stroll the streets aimlessly with portable radios tucked under their arms, or gather in small groups to tune in their favorite western rock 'n' rollers.

Some of the youth are obviously hoodlums, others are students or workers who simply have nothing else to do in the evenings.

Several months ago in Karl-Marx-Stadt (formerly Chemnitz), a "People's Policeman" chided a group of boys for sitting in a park listening to western music.

One word led to a riot in which park lights were broken, glass strewn in front of police cars, and 23 youths arrested.

A similar incident occurred this week when a group described as "rowdies" taunted police at a Dresden festival.

Things are so serious that the "Neues Deutschland" this week devoted a long story to

## Wall Street Chatter

New York—UPI—The investor who does his tax selling early will, in all likelihood, create an opportunity to salvage the maximum advantage from an unfortunate situation, according to E. F. Hutton and Co.

By taking his tax loss ahead of the pack, he has a chance of realizing a price for a "worry" stock that will be above the lows for the year, Hutton advises.

There is also the possibility that many stocks with reasonably good intermediate prospects will be forced down to unrealistic levels in the crush to establish tax losses.

The Fitch survey has a liking for the producers of business forms including Ameri-

can Business systems, Lewis Business forms, Moore Corp. and Standard Register. Spear & Staff, Inc., says it would not buy heavily until there is evidence that a firm believes there will be a thoroughly mixed earnings picture coming up for the third quarter, with the probability of a moderate decline in the industrial net.

J. W. Sparks & Co. favors Boeing Airplane as a candidate for trading purposes. The issue has held up exceptionally well in a falling market, Sparks says.

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## Belton Points to Interest Increase

Tigard, Ore. — UPI — State Treasurer Howard C. Belton said Monday that in the first six months of his regime "good investment practices" produced an increase of \$1,150,000 in interest earned on state money invested.

Belton, Republican candidate for state treasurer, said the money was "an important contribution to the current estimated treasury surplus of \$33 million that should make it unnecessary to raise state taxes in the next three years."

Belton spent the day campaigning in Washington county.

New York—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev, on United Nations "failure" to speedily effect a disarmament agreement:

"You are unfortunately compelling us to build more rockets. We have plenty of rockets already. We are manufacturing them like sausages on a mass production basis."

United Nations, N.Y.—Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld, rejecting Khrushchev's demand that he do the "chivalrous" and "courageous" thing and resign:

"It is very easy to resign. It is not so easy to stay on . . . I shall remain in my post . . ."

Greensboro, N.C.—Mrs. William Hall, on her 33-year-old son Robert's "confession" that he killed three persons in New Jersey last January:

"I know he never killed anybody. This is all kinds of foolishness. Everybody will tell you he never hurt anybody."

New York—Federal narcotics agent George Gaffney, on the smashing of an international heroin-smuggling ring Monday:

"This operation defies the imagination in its magnitude."

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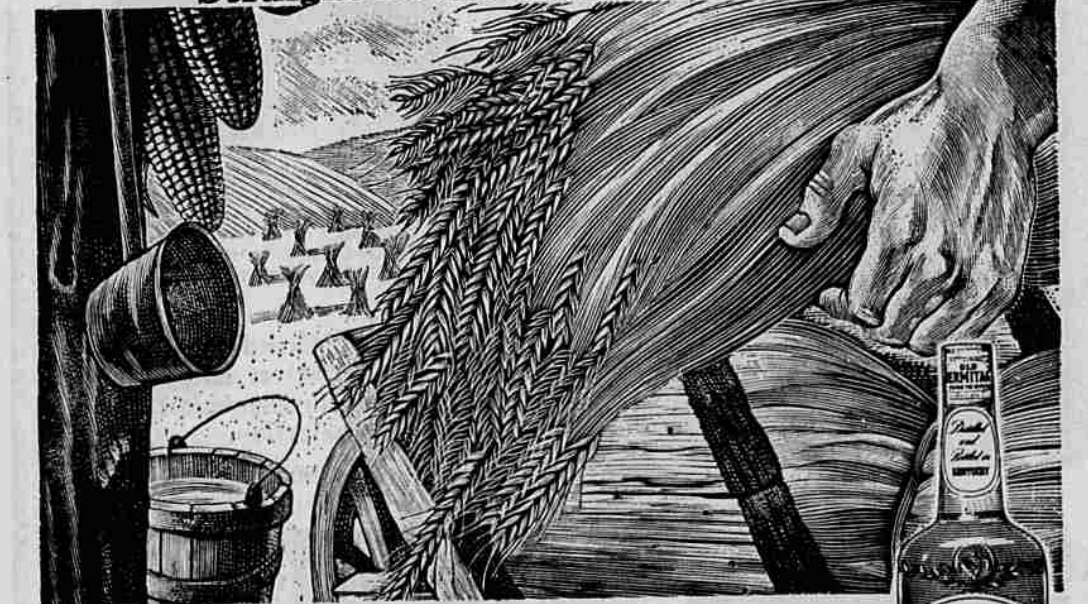
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
