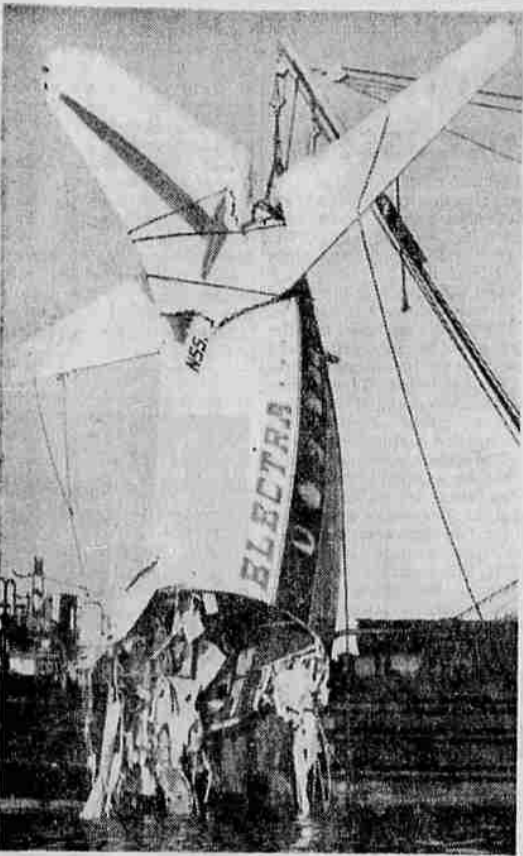

Boston—UPI—A huge flock of migrating starlings may have caused an Eastern Airlines crash that took 61 lives Tuesday night, Elwood R. Quesada, administrator of the federal aviation agency, said today.

## Court Calls for Building Plans

Medford Architect Jack Edson will be asked to submit preliminary plans and cost estimates for construction of an all purpose building on the county fair grounds to house the county extension offices, the county court decided yesterday afternoon.

The "L" shaped building will house 10 offices in one section, has a patio-type rest area in the center and an auditorium with stage and adjoining large conference rooms in the other section.

County Horticulture agent, Clifford B. Cordy, who is also chairman of the extension office here, said the new building would relieve the crowded extension offices on the first floor of the main courthouse building, would relieve the crowded courthouse parking area and make county extension offices more accessible to farmers and the general public. The fairgrounds provide a central location, he said.

## Polio Shot Clinics Scheduled in Area Saturday by J. C.

The clinics are being sponsored by the Jaycees in Medford, Eagle Point and Central Point in cooperation with the Jackson County Medical Society and the Jackson county health department.

## Tests Completed At Powerplant

Tests completed yesterday at the Green Springs power plant in the Talent Irrigation project were "satisfactory, generally speaking," a bureau of reclamation official here reported.

Tests were started Thursday by Richard Krueger, engineer from the bureau's Denver, Colo., office. The plant was tested by injecting a salt solution in the penstock by the surge tank and electronically checking the velocity of the water.

This was coupled with exact measurements of the diameter of the pipe and exact quantity of water in the power plant, the official explained. Various instruments checked the electrical output and the net head of water on the turbine. These factors determined the efficiency of the turbine.

Precise results of the tests are not yet known since the data must be collected and the report made at a later date, it was explained. The 16,000 kilowatts of power produced by the plant will be sold to California Oregon Power company. This is equivalent to 21,000 horsepower, the bureau official said.

## Sweetland Says Doctors Asked To Support Appling

Not Asked for Funds, GOP Candidate Says

Oregon City—UPI—State Sen. Monroe Sweetland, Democratic nominee for secretary of state, said today physicians in Oregon were being solicited for \$50 each for the campaign of his Republican rival, Howell Appling Jr., because Appling opposes the Forand Bill to provide medical care for the aged.

## Supports Principles

Sweetland told a Lions Club luncheon he supports the Forand Bill's principles and believed it essential that elderly persons with low incomes be provided health insurance through the established social security system. He said "My opponent for secretary of state calls the Forand Bill 'foolish'."

## Nixon, Kennedy Suggested in Talks

United Nations, N.Y.—UPI—Saudi Arabia suggested today that a five-power neutral resolution calling for an Eisenhower-Khrushchev meeting could bring in Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Sen. John F. Kennedy for such talks.

The suggestion was made by Saudi Arabian Minister of State Ahmad Shukairy during General Assembly debate on the resolution and an Australian amendment suggesting instead a Big Four summit talk at "the earliest practicable date."

## Thornton Replies To Support Lack

Salem—UPI—Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton replied today to his failure to receive the official endorsement of Labor's Committee on Political Education (COPE).

Thornton, seeking reelection, said "I know that there are a goodly number of rank and file trade union members as well as labor leaders who believe that labor has been treated fairly by the attorney general's office during the past 7 1/2 years."

## FACE CUTS OFF LATE RALLY FOR 6 TO 4 VICTORY

Pittsburgh—UPI—The Pittsburgh Pirates won the opening game of the 1960 World Series today when they shut off a desperate ninth-inning rally by the New York Yankees to win, 6-4, on some daring base running and Bill Mazeroski's two-run homer.

A crowd of 36,676 at Forbes Field watched relief pitcher Elroy Face induce Hector Lopez of the Yankees to hit into a game-ending double play after Elstron Howard had hit a pinch two-run homer that narrowed the Pirates' lead to two runs.

Victory Saved for Vern Law. Face's relief job saved the victory for starter Vern Law, who was knocked out of the box in the eighth when the first two Yankee batters hit singles. Face pitched his way out of that jam but ran into trouble in the ninth when he yielded a leadoff single to Gil MacDougald and Howard's pinch homer.

The Pirates, who stole fewer bases than any team in the National League this season, threw the favored Yankees off balance in the first inning when they stole two bases during a three-run outburst that drove out New York starter Art Ditmar.

Then, after the Yankees had narrowed Pittsburgh's lead to 3-2 with a run in the top of the fourth, Mazeroski hit a 2-0 pitch by reliever Jim Coates over the left field scoreboard following a walk to Don Hoak. That blow drove in what eventually proved to be the winning run.

## Forest Fire Danger Extreme in Region; Caution Is Urged

Some relief to southern Oregon's extremely dangerous forest fire situation, which has increased in the past few days with hot, dry southwest winds, may arrive this week end with the weather bureau's forecast of showery periods.

But until relief comes, forest service personnel and state department of forestry officials have urged caution in all forest areas.

Forest fire potential is greater this fall than it has been for many seasons, according to Carroll Brown, supervisor of Rogue River National forest.

Dry, southeast winds ranging up to about 30 miles an hour were recorded at some higher elevation lookouts yesterday afternoon.

The weather bureau said showery periods are likely tomorrow or Saturday, and

again Monday, but the actual danger of forest fires may not be eased too much since 20 to 30-miles-an-hour winds are forecast in the mountain areas, and thunderstorms throughout the area are possible.

Temperatures during the next few days are not expected to reach yesterday's high of 83, the weather bureau said.

The forest fire danger is gauged through a burning index by the forest service. The index is based on an evaluation of weather conditions, the moisture content of debris on the ground, and wind velocity.

Content Determined. The moisture content of forest fuel is determined from four pine sticks on wire frames at various locations and elevations above ground, the forest service said.

All the indexes are high. On forest fire danger boards located throughout the area to indicate to travelers the danger, the pointer is now at extremely dangerous, which is equivalent to a burning index of 35 or greater, the forest service said.
