Mrs. Casper, 37, a small brunette with a large artistic sense, is so far as she can determine the only female free lance designer in an industry doing \$100 million in volume annually.

Asked why there aren't more women designing a product bought almost exclusively by women, Mrs. Casper answered that few students get out of design school realizing the potential of plastics.

Mrs. Casper is married to an art historian, the couple has one child, Pamela, 6, and lives in a charming old building in Manhattan's fashionable Gramercy Park section.

Artistic talent came naturally to her. Her father, now retired, was in fashion merchandising and buying. Her mother is a milliner.

The designer, born in Brooklyn, attended Art High school and studied advertising design at Pratt institute.
