Seattle - (UPI) - Center Roy McKasson and fullback Ray Jackson have been named as co-captains for the University of Washington Huskies who meet Stanford Saturday.

Tuesday, 196-pound Sam Hurgorth was working out in the first-string left guard spot, vacated by regular Chuck Allen, who is nursing a bruise received in last Saturday's game with Navy.

BERRY SIDELINED - Pullman - (UPI) - First string guard Bill Berry who has started every Cougar game so far this season will not make the trip to Berkeley this Saturday, coach Jim Sutherland announced Tuesday.

Berry, 160 pounds, was injured in the Washington State-Arizona State game last Saturday. He will not be in the lineup when WSU meets three-time loser California; End Harvey West also appears to be sidelined with an injury.

LIGHT SCRIMMAGE - Eugene, Ore. - (UPI) - Oregon held a two-hour workout Tuesday including a 30-minute light scrimmage.

Coach Len Casanova said three injured players would probably not face San Jose State this week-end. They were Paul Bauge, Sandy Fraser and Ken Petersen.

TRIO IN SHAPE - San Jose, Calif. - (UPI) - Coach Bob Titchenal said his all-time trio of halfbacks Fred Blanco and Willie Williams and end Oscar Donahue all should be in shape for San Jose State's battle against tough Oregon Saturday.

OPTIMISTIC - Berkeley, Calif. - (UPI) - Coach Marv Levy waxed optimistic Tuesday that his California Bears could win their first contest Saturday against Washington State.

He scrimmaged his charges and then said "the team has been showing good fire. I think it intends to play a full 60-minute game this week." This referred to the fact that California has looked tough during the first half of each of its losses, but then faded.

Halfbacks Bill Patton, Jim Burress and Bob Willis returned to contact drills after being injured, but two other halfbacks will miss the Cougar contest, Jack Trumbo has a bad knee and Alex Jamille a concussion.

The new coach said he would definitely make a change, meaning Prukop seems to be out of the running. The Trojans worked Tuesday on defending Georgia plays.

UCLA LOOKED RUSTY - Los Angeles - (UPI) - UCLA looked rusty Tuesday in drills designed to get the Bruins used to Washington plays and the accurate throwing and sharp use of the option by Bob Schlorff of the Huskies.

It was the first Bruin workout of any consequence since the Purdue game. The squad went through passing drills, doing most of the flinging. Coach Bill Barnes said the team definitely would pass at Seattle against the Huskies on Oct. 15.

Elementary Grid Slates Will Open

Medford district elementary football schedule opens this week end with tussles on Thursday and Friday, Oct. 6 and 7.

Fourteen grade schools of the district are fielding teams this fall and competition will be in three leagues. One of the 14, Ruch, will contend on a non-league basis.

Thursday action in the Rogue Valley league will be Griffin Creek at Jacksonville and West Side at Lone Pine with Oak Grove drawing a bye. Ruch will play its games against clubs in this loop and first meets Lone Pine on Oct. 13.

Members of the American league are Howard, Hoover, Wilson and Lincoln. Playing in the National loop are Roosevelt, Jefferson, Washington and Jackson. This Friday there will be non-counting inter-league contention between clubs of the two circuits.

Games are Howard at Jackson, Lincoln at Jefferson, Hoover versus Roosevelt at Hawthorne park and Wilson versus Washington at the senior high school.

Some Rule Exceptions - Grade school games are set to start at 4 p.m.

For this grid program National High School federation rules will be followed with some exceptions. A junior size rubber football will be used. Quarters will be six minutes. Playing fields will be 80 by 40 yards. Fifteen yard penalties will be reduced to 10 yards. Tennis shoes must be worn and no cleats of any kind will be permitted.

On offensive plays from scrimmage all backs and ends must weigh less than 100 pounds except that a punter may weigh 100 pounds or more. On defense, all three deep backs and one linebacker must weigh less than 100 pounds.

At the end of regular playing time for games there will be a post game period to play boys who have not been in the game or who saw only brief action.

Dwight Jordan Sued for Taxes

Salem, Ore. - (UPI) - The Oregon employment department sued Dwight Jordan, head of the Salem Senators baseball club, Tuesday claiming he owes \$1,862 in back payroll taxes.

The suit was filed in Marion county circuit court here by David H. Cameron, department commissioner.

The suit says Jordan did not pay a 2.7 per cent tax for 12 months in 1959 and 1960 on a \$68,991 payroll.

The department asks for the taxes plus \$106 in interest and an \$86 penalty. The suit also asks a charge of one per cent a month on \$1,862 starting Oct. 31 until the claim is satisfied.

Sacramento Solons Of PCL Up For Sale

Sacramento, Calif. - (UPI) - The Sacramento Solons baseball club of the class AAA Pacific Coast league was for sale today.

The team's board of directors voted Tuesday to dissolve the club in a 7-0 vote. One director abstained.

The Solons, who have operated in Sacramento every year but three since 1903, thus appeared destined for a new home next year.

Honolulu and Albuquerque have been mentioned as possible sites for the team if it is moved, but Solon President W. B. Golsong said Tuesday that no official offers for the club have yet been received.

The final argument for selling the club was believed to have been failure of a unique ticket plan. It called for sale of \$5 admission tickets and \$2.50 junior tickets which would entitle fans to attend all home games at Edmunds Field in 1961.

The Solons lost an estimated \$75,000 this year and had been shooting for \$100,000 in its ticket drive. Golsong said the ticket plan raised just \$25,128 in nine days.

The Pacific Coast league had asked the Solons for a statement of future plans by Nov. 15.

Fullmers Rated High In Class

New York - (UPI) - Two brothers were listed among the top 10 men in one boxing division today by The Ring magazine ratings for the first time.

The brothers are Gene and Don Fullmer, both middleweights, of West Jordan, Utah.

Gene, recognized by the National Boxing association as world champion, is 29. Don, who broke into the ring's top 10 for the first time today, is 21. He is now ranked ninth among the world's 160-pound contenders.

Don was elevated to the select group because of his recent surprise draw with southpaw Gustav Scholz of Germany, a champion of Europe.

Although Gene is the NBA's world champion, he is rated only top contender by The Ring magazine, which goes along with New York, Massachusetts and some European countries in recognizing Paul Pender of Brookline, Mass., as king of the class.

Pone Kingpetch of Thailand was named "Fighter of the Month" because of his impressive defense of the world flyweight crown by knocking out ex-champion Pascual Perez in the eighth round of their return bout.

Bees Align With Tribe

Salt Lake City - (UPI) - The Salt Lake City Bees announced Tuesday that they have inked a working agreement with the Cleveland Indians of the American league.

New General Manager Herman Franks announced the signing just hours after the Pacific Coast league team terminated its three-year agreement with the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Franks said the new agreement will give Salt Lake first call on Cleveland farm talent.

Salt Lake will hold its spring training with the Indians' other minor league teams in Daytona Beach, Fla.

The agreement with the Indians was signed in Cleveland Sunday.

However, it was not announced until after the Bees had severed their connections with Pittsburgh yesterday.

Relations between the Bees and the Pirates had been strained by the fact that the National league champs had another triple-A farm club, the Columbus Jets. Salt Lake officials felt Columbus had first shot at most of Pittsburgh's available triple-A talent.

A search for the plane failed to turn up anything.
