New York—(UPI)—Prentice-Hall, Inc., says that the downward break in stock prices to new lows is probably laying the ground-work for a pretty smart year-end rally following the heavy bout of tax selling and switching that's already started.

Whether such a rally will mark the start of a new up-trend, or merely be a temporary reversal in a major bear market, will depend largely on business in 1961. The publishing firm feels it recommends a conservative policy at least until after the November election.

Chartcraft, Inc., reports that the chart pattern of Anken Chemical is very bearish and shows excellent short sale possibilities. The stock already has given a "sell" signal at 43, it says.

# Commendable Service Award Presented To Park Employee

Superintendent Otto Brown of Crater Lake National park has announced that Harvey E. Cliff has been presented the department of interior commendable service award following his retirement.

Cliff entered on duty as a seasonal employee at Crater Lake National park in July, 1938, and after a brief series of temporary appointments he became the park's permanent plumber.

Because of Crater lake's curtailment of activities during World War II, Cliff transferred to Yosemite National park in 1942, returning to Crater lake in 1946, and was subsequently promoted to plumber foreman, the position he held when he retired July 10, 1960.

With little and often no help, but with an amazing amount of ingenuity, skill and ability, Cliff pioneered the various water, heating and sanitation systems. His innumerable contributions, technical skill and congeniality made him a most valuable employee, Brown said.

Tribute to Service

Brown declared that the award is in tribute to Cliff's loyal and devoted service of over 20 years with the National Park service, 17 years of which were at Crater Lake National park.

The award presented by Brown at an employee party included a citation certificate, bronze medal, and lapel emblem. Mr. and Mrs. Cliff were each given department of interior Lifetime Passes to the National Parks.

The award presentation was made at a farewell party for Assistant Park Naturalist Richard M. Brown of Crater Lake National park. Brown is transferring to the position of park naturalist for Muir Woods National monument. Brown worked as a seasonal naturalist from 1952 to 1957 at which time he was given a permanent appointment.

At the same employee gathering, three new employees and their families were welcomed to the Crater Lake staff. New plumber for the park is "Chel" Springgay who transferred from the public works department at the Tongue Point Naval station.
