

PSC Vikings Have Classy Backfield

Portland - Portland State attempts to keep Oregon Collegiate conference title hopes alive in a league football skirmish Saturday with Southern Oregon at Ashland.

The Vikings, with only a tie to show for three outings this season, dropped their league opener last week to defending champion Oregon Tech 19-14. SOC will make its conference debut after posting a 1-2 record in non-league action.

PSC will throw a classy backfield, featuring Billy (Bye, Bye) White and bruising fullback Frank McCormack, at the Red Raiders. White, a spectacular freshman from Roseburg, is the Viki's leading ground gainer and top pass receiver and his sensational running ability is the talk of the league. He has proven to be a real crowd pleaser and last week thrilled a partisan OTI crowd with his running talents.

Teamed with White and McCormack, an all-conference choice last year, in the backfield will be quarterback Bob Grant and halfback Al Parent. This unit will be supported by halfbacks Jerry Humphreys, Byron Arthur, and Chuck Swanson, and fullback Joe Gatto.

Portland State will be without senior right guard Lee Wells against the Red Raiders, but otherwise should be operating at full strength. Wells is sidelined with a severe bruised left ankle, which was injured against University of Puget Sound two weeks ago and re-injured in the Owl game.

The veteran lineman will be replaced by either Jim Gaul, 200-pound freshman from Central Catholic or Roy Lazelle, 185-pound freshman from David Douglas, in the starting lineup. Other starters in the Viking line will be Mickey Gray and Phil Vaughn at ends, Bob Williams and Loren Remy at tackles, Dave Roberts at guard, and Herb Harms at center.

Defensive replacements are tackle Mike Halfstrom, 230-pound tackle, and defensive backs Gary Hamblet, Denny Parra and Byron Arthur.

The Vikings will be after their first win over the Red Raiders since the series started in 1952. Southern Oregon has captured all eight games between the two schools and last year posted a 12-7 victory.

Southwest: Damp weather will improve hunting conditions; woods have been extremely dry.

Summer steelhead fishing only fair in North Umpqua; lakes within national forest boundaries in Cascades close Oct. 9; Winchester bay has been poor for salmon fishing.

Central: Dry weather has made deer hunting conditions difficult and Mt. Hood National forest has been poor; some of better areas have been in draws and canyons containing water in the Ochoco Mountains; the Klamath area has been good in low areas where deer come for water and food.

Big Lava lake still good on troll; East Lake good; Deschutes should be good for fly fishing and on troll; Cascade lakes in National Forests close Oct. 9.

Southeast: Hunting prospects are poor to fair in Lake Harney and Malheur coun-

ties because of dry conditions; deer are sticking to heavy cover at higher elevations; waterfowl opening day

prospects for Summer Lake area are very good. Malheur reservoir excellent for small rainbow.
