### Bombers of Bronx Thinking In Terms Of 5-Game Series

New York - (UPI) - It won't be four straight like in 1927, but the New York Yankees began thinking in terms of five today, now that they again are looking like old "Murderer's Row."

They are only even with the Pittsburgh Pirates going into tomorrow's third game of the 1960 World Series. But the way that they evened the count at 1-1 Thursday when they bombed the Pirates, 18-3, at Forbes Field, put them back solidly in the favorites role.

The bookies quoted them 8 1/2 to 5 to win the Series chiefly on the strength of the manner in which they humiliated the Pirates.

Furthermore, they were 7 1/2 to 5 choices to beat the Pirates in the third game at Yankee Stadium Saturday with Whitey Ford going against Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell. Both are left-handers and Yankee Stadium is supposed to be a pitching paradise for southpaws.

It has been for Ford, although his record this year was only 12-9. But he has been the Yankee clutch pitcher for years, especially in the Stadium.

Mizell, a fast-baller, had a 14-8 record. Thirteen of those wins came after the Pirates obtained him from the St. Louis Cardinals in May. But he never has pitched in Yankee Stadium where late afternoon shadows become a problem, especially for the left fielders.

Because he has heard so much about those shadows, Manager Danny Murtaugh, whose Pirates flew here Thursday night, ordered a 1:30 p.m. EDT workout today.

"I want my players to see the stadium as close to game conditions as possible," Murtaugh explained, adding that his boys would do all right, "shadows or not."

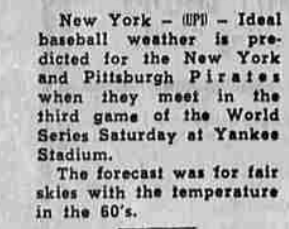
