

Yankees Rout Pirates 10-0; Take One Game Edge in Series Play

New York—Little Bobby Richardson, a long-scorned midget in a clan of immortal batting giants, displayed Ruthian muscles Saturday when he massacred the Pittsburgh Pirates, 10-0, in the third game of the World Series.

Richardson, who had struck only one home run all season, broke the game open in the very first inning with the seventh grand-slam home run in series history and drove in a record six runs to wipe out the old mark of five held by such sluggers as Mickey Mantle, Bill Dickey, Tony Lazzeri and big Ted Kluszewski.

But Mantle roared into the

act, too, with a two-run blast into the stands—one of his four hits this pleasant sunny day—to move to within one smash of Babe Ruth's all-time series total of 15 before 70,001 roaring fans.

The mighty mite and the Oklahoma Kid thus sparked a murderous 18-hit attack against six Pirate pitchers, gave the Yanks a 2-1 game lead, allowed Whitey Ford to coast to a sparkling four-hit shutout triumph and hung the defeat on quickly-bombed Wilmer (Viengar Bend) Mizell.

It was a disastrous game for the Pirates, hoping to bounce back off the floor after a ignominious 16-3 defeat in the

second game at Pittsburgh. For those rampaging Yankees took right up where they left off at Forbes field as they rolled up six fat runs in the first inning.

Before it was over, they had sent 11 men to bat, piled up seven hits—including Richardson's grand-slam homer—routed the gum-chewing Mizell and his successor, Clem Labine, and to all intents and purposes ended the ball game after 35 riotous minutes of play.

Cerv Singles

Bob Cerv started the landslide with a single to center and held there as Roger Maris rifled a long out to the racing

Roberto Clemente. Mantle sent Cerv to third with a single to center and Moose Skowron started the scoring parade with a single to center which scored Cerv and parked Mantle at third. Gil McDougald walked on four pitches and that was all for the mauling Mizell.

Labine, who had been shelved in a seven-run inning in the second game disaster at Pittsburgh, came on—and it was for him the same sad old story.

Elston Howard topped a bleeder down the third base line and easily beat it out while Mantle scored, Skowron sped to third and McDougald

to second.

That's when the bantam Richardson stepped in and, although a notoriously weak hitter, wielded as big a bat as they've ever seen in Yankee stadium. It wasn't a long shot he clouted but as it dropped into the lower left field stands it was as good as a tape measure job because it sent the three baserunners scampering home ahead of him for a 6 to 0 Yankee lead.

That Richardson homer, his first in more than five months, was the seventh grand slammer in World Series history—and the sixth by a Yankee.

The merciless Yankees still weren't satisfied.

Tony Kubek beat out an infield single over second base and Ford forced him at second. But Cerv came up with his second hit of the inning, a single to left which moved Ford on to second, and that was all for Labine.

Lanky Fred Green came on to Maris on a foul pop and at long last the inning ended.

The Yankees really put it away in the fourth inning when they sent 10 men to bat to wallop six hits and chalk up the four runs that made it 10 to 0.

Ford started the ball rolling with a single and then, with two out, Mantle lashed a 430-foot home run into the lower

left field stands. It was his 14th in series competition, leaving him only one short of the immortal Babe Ruth's all-time total.

Even then the Yankees weren't satisfied as they set out to completely smash the Pirates' morale.

Skowron kept them rolling with a single to right field and went to second as McDougald beat out a three-hopper down the third base line for another hit.

That was all for Green. George Witt came on and Howard greeted him with a high grounder which bounced off Don Hoak's chest to fill the bases.

Then it was bantam Richardson again—and once more he delivered.

This time it was a slashing single to left field which drove home Skowron and McDougald. That gave little Bobby six runs batted in and a new series record.

Wild Pitch

The Yankees tried to make their lead even bigger. For Witt uncorked a wild pitch on which Howard went to third and Richardson to second. The Bucs gave Kubek an intentional walk to fill the bases and it paid off as Ford, up for the second time in the inning, grounded out to finally end the scoring.

New York — Little Bobby Richardson was showered with congratulations by his New York Yankee teammates, who all agreed today he "really turned on the power" for a buy who originally was instructed to bunt.

"That's right," said Richardson, who set a world series record by driving in six runs, "the bunt sign was on when I went up to the plate with the bases full in the first inning."

"After (Wilmer) Mizell got two strikes on me, though I was on my own, so I swung away. Frankly, I thought the left fielder had caught the ball. But I knew differently when I saw the left field umpire giving it the home run sign."

Richardson, who had hit only one homer all year previously, said he didn't even know he had set a record until the news was flashed on the scoreboard out in center field.

"It'll sure look funny seeing my name alongside all those other great ball players," he

grinned. "People will think it's a misprint."

Among those who pumped Richardson's hand after the first inning grand-slam was Mickey Mantle, who happened to be on base at the time and who had a great day himself with a two-run homer plus three other hits.

Mantle's homer was his 14th in World Series play and placed him within one of Babe Ruth's all-time series record.

"I might luck it into the record now," he said, "but it's gonna be rough. They got (Vern) Law going tomorrow and I don't hit as good left-handed as I do right-handed." Casey Stengel studiously avoided any hint that the Yankees might have the Pirates on the run despite the fact they have scored 26 runs against Pittsburgh in the past two games.

"It still takes four games to win the series and we've only won two," he commented. "Whitey Ford was amazing today. He confused 'em, had good control and was in charge from the minute he throw the first ball."

Oregon Pours It On; Whips San Jose 33-0

Eugene, Ore. — Dave Groz's pin-point passing and the running of a covey of swift Oregon backs buried the San Jose Spartans under a five-touchdown attack, 33-0, here Saturday before 10,000 fans.

The veteran quarterback connected on 8 of 15 passes and two of them went for touchdowns to reserve right halfback Mickey Bruce. The first was a five-yarder which opened the scoring in the first period. Sophomore center Bill Swain widened the lead to two touchdowns early in the second period as he picked off a Cham Gallegos' pass at midfield and went all the way to score behind a covey of a half dozen Webfoots.

Open Lead
In the final minute of the second quarter Oregon opened the lead to 10-0 as Groz directed a 42-yard drive in eight plays which was highlighted by the running of sophomore fullbacks Jim Josephson and Duane Cargill.

The two rookies struck repeatedly inside the Spartan ends and finally Josephson, whose home is in San Jose, blasted over from nine yards out.

A fumble recovery by sophomore tackle Ron Snidow early in the fourth quarter

put the Ducks back in the scoring column. His rush of passer Mike Jones jarred the ball loose and he then snapped up the fumble on the San Jose 38.

Dave Grayson sprinted for 13 yards to get the Ducks within striking distance and then Groz fired a 20-yard scoring pitch to Bruce in the end zone, where he made a great catch as he tumbled over the back of a Spartan defender.

Final TD
Oregon's reserves, playing most of the fourth period, accounted for the final touchdown as right halfback Mike Gaechter, a 9.6 sprinter, turned left end and outran the San Jose secondary in a 45-yard touchdown run.

San Jose never mounted a serious scoring threat and was never past the Oregon 40. Its passing ace Mike Jones was under constant pressure from the Oregon line and never had much chance to find his receivers.

Oregon picked off two passes to boost its total interceptions to 11 in four games and its ground defense was best in Webfoot history as it left the Spartans with a -29 yards rushing for the day. San Jose gained 37 yards but lost 86 to the Oregon linemen.

Notre Dame Upset 12-7

Chapel Hill, N.C. — Quarterback Ray Farris struck fire to North Carolina's Tar Heels behind an alert, pass-snatching defense Saturday to achieve a 12-7 upset victory over Notre Dame before 40,000 unbelieving fans.

Farris turned the first game he ever started as varsity quarterback into personal triumph in the Tar Heels' first victory over Notre Dame in 11 years of the rivalry.

He started the scoring with a pair of perfect passes, 17 yards and then 47 yards to halfback Skip Clement in the second period. A punt exchange later Tar Heel end Mike Greenaday grabbed a stray aerial by Notre Dame reserve quarterback Clay Schultz and ran 42 yards untouched to score. The North Carolina defense took it from there.

Notre Dame, still shaken by last week's 51-19 route by Purdue, was thwarted repeatedly — five times inside the Tar Heel 20. The Irish finally recovered a Farris fumble on the 25 and, aided by a 22-yard pass interference ruling against Clement, scored on a two-yard end sweep by halfback Bo Scarpitto in the fourth period.



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
