Luncheon was served on the lawn by the hostess and co-hostesses, Mrs. Stiehl and Mrs. L. L. Krepps.

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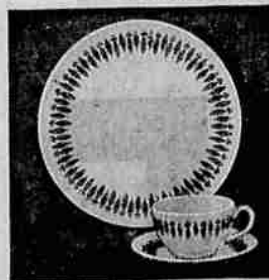
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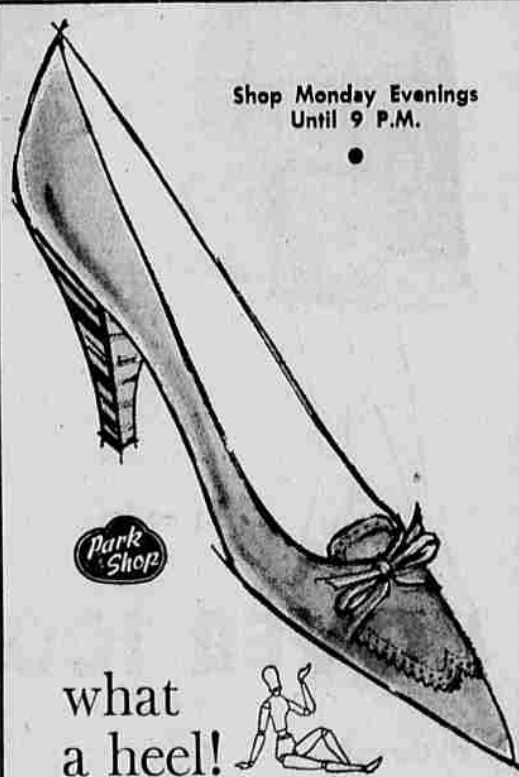
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
