Number of Major Crimes in Medford Down Last Month

The number of major crimes reported to Medford's police department last month was down from the total reported during the same month in 1959, according to the police department's monthly report.

A total of 90 major crimes were reported last month compared to 114 in September, 1959. Of the crimes reported last month, police cleared 28 of them for a 31.1 per cent cleared average.

During September, 1959, the department cleared 43 of the 114 major crimes reported for a 37.7 per cent average.

Included in the major crimes reported last month were one robbery, one aggravated assault, nine burglaries, 10 car thefts, and 69 cases of larceny. There were no reports of murder, rape or manslaughter.

Minor Offenses

The department also received reports of 759 minor offenses of which 658 were cleared for a 86.7 per cent cleared average.

The number of traffic accidents reported to police during September was also down from the same month during 1959, but the number of injuries resulting from accidents remained the same. There were 59 traffic accidents reported last month, compared to 82 during September, 1959. Both months reported 12 injuries resulting from traffic accidents.

Police issued 449 traffic citations during September compared to 415 during September of the previous year. The most common violation was violation of basic rule for which 60 citations were issued, followed by no stop at sign or signal for which 58 citations were handed out.

The department issued 3,320 parking meter tickets during the month, compared to 3,267 during September, 1959.

Hill Attempts Halt Of Power Waste

Salem — UPI — Public Utility Commissioner J. Hill said Saturday he will introduce a bill in the 1961 legislature aimed at curbing future duplication of power facilities in Oregon communities.

A fifth draft of the measure is in the works, he said, and when completed, the PUC will contact every utility in the state that would be affected.

Jacksonville — A total of 4,252 visitors toured the Jacksonville museum during September, Miss Mary Hanley, curator, has announced.

The total is 149 more than the number visiting the museum in September, 1959, and brought the total since July 10, 1950, to 400,933.
