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Court Seeks Opinion On Non-School Area

A legal opinion will be requested from the state department of education on distribution of funds accumulated for the now non-existent non-high school district in Jackson county, County Judge Earl Miller said Saturday.

The county school boundary board which discussed the problem Thursday, consists of County School Superintendent A. B. Mekvold, County Judge Earl Miller and County Commissioners Chester Wendt and Ralph James.

Thursday the group provided for the distribution of \$72,000 in tuition funds accumulated by the district which was dissolved July by special legislative act.

However, \$3,854.93 was collected during the fiscal year. This is beyond the official cut-off date. The state law provides only for distribution of those funds accumulated up to July 1, 1960, Miller explained.

Exams Announced For Academies

Written examinations for service academy careers will be held in several fourth congressional district cities Saturday, Nov. 12.

Young men interested in such careers should contact Congressman Charles O. Porter in care of his Washington, D.C., office not later than Friday, Oct. 14, according to the congressman.

Porter said he would make one principal and 10 alternate appointments to the Air Force academy in 1961, one principal and five alternate appointments for the U.S. Naval Academy and he will nominate 10 men for the Merchant Marine Academy. Currently, Porter has no vacancies in West Point, he said. Men interested in the U.S. Coast Guard should apply directly to that service, he added.

Applications will be limited to single men from 17 to 22 years old on July 1, 1961. They may contact Porter's Washington, D.C., office at 252 House Office building by letter, wire or telephone.

Young men who qualify in the civil service and physical examinations will be asked to appear before Porter's academy selection board later this year. The board meets annually in Eugene and is headed by Dean Robert D. Clark, University of Oregon.
