The death of Howard Glenn, a 24-year-old lineman for the New York Titans, marred an otherwise exciting week end of professional football.

Glenn, a 245-pound offensive guard from Vancouver, Wash., and ex-Linfield college, died in a Houston, Tex., hospital Sunday night from head injuries suffered in the Titans' 27-21 setback at the hands of the Houston Oilers.

On the playing field, Sunday's games in both the National league and the AFL had a touch of the Frank Merriwell script.

The Green Bay Packers upset the champion Baltimore Colts in the biggest surprise of the six-game program; the New York Giants and San Francisco Forty-Niners both won in the last minute of play, and the Philadelphia Eagles scored their winning touchdown with six minutes remaining.

Green Bay gave Johnny Unitas a hard time by intercepting four of his passes and

beat the Colts, 35-21, and Charlie Conerly hit Frank Gifford with a 44-yard scoring pass to give the Giants a 19-17 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers.

John Brodie threw 18 yards to R. C. Owens as the clock ran out in San Francisco's 14-10 triumph over the Detroit Lions, and Norm Van Brocklin heaved 11 yards to Tommy McDonald for a late score that produced Philadelphia's 31-27 win over the St. Louis Cardinals.

In the two other games, the Chicago Bears thought they had a romp against the Los Angeles Rams but had to beat off a desperate late rally before winning, 34-27. And even the weak-sister Washington Redskins looked good in beating the Dallas Cowboys, 26-14.

The young American league got into the thrills-minute act, too. A 99-yard kickoff return by Jetstream Smith started the Oakland Raiders off on a third-period scoring spree that upset the Dallas Texans, 20-19, and rookie halfback Charlie Tolar bolted 40 yards from scrimmage in the final quarter to supply the Oilers with their winning margin in their tragedy-ridden triumph over the Titans.

Pittsburgh Proves Its Courage, Winning Best Series Game So Far

New York - (UPI) - Whether history finally writes that they won or lost the World Series, the Pittsburgh Pirates of 1960 now feel they have proved their courage.

Few teams in baseball annals were the targets of more rude jokes than these Corsairs when they absorbed back-to-back 16-3 and 10-0 drubbings from the New York Yankees. Words like "over-rated" were being tossed around and gasters inquired whether the Pirates would "show up for the rest of the Series."

All that ended Sunday, however, when the Pirates out-scraped the Yankees in a tough 3-2 game that could have gone either way.

"We showed 'em we had guts enough to come off the floor and bounce right back," said Dick Groat, shortstop and team captain. "All of a sudden, we're alive again."

Pirate Manager Danny Murtaugh likes to maintain that his athletes "never are affected in today's game by the memory of what happened yesterday" and he insists that his club "was not down in the dumps" after those two nightmarish beatings.

But there could be no doubt in the Pirate clubhouse that these Bucs felt they had proved so much in their dressing room celebration after Sunday's triumph was not unrestrained glee, but a quiet, proud nodding of heads with the recurrent theme, "we showed 'em."

Murtaugh declared that he was not surprised at the strong comeback.

"We have been counted out

lots of times before," said Murtaugh. "And we have always bounced back. One Pittsburgh writer said we were 'resilient.' I don't know how to spell it, but that's what we are."

All even at two victories each after the Pirates victory in the tense fourth game of the Series, the teams closed out the New York phase of the Series today. The Series will resume in Pittsburgh on Wednesday and the seventh game, if needed, is scheduled for Thursday.

The Yankees, who have won two games "by a mile" and lost two "by inches," ruled 8 to 5 favorites to win today's fifth game and were 9 to 5 choices to win their eighth world championship in 12 years under Casey Stengel.

The odds were a tribute to the professional bettors' confidence in Stengel and the Yankees even though the Pirates were firing Harvey Haddix, an experienced pitcher of solid talents.

The Pirates had two reasons to feel confident - they won the best game played in the Series so far Sunday and no matter what happened today they will go back home for the final two games.

They got sturdy early-inning pitching from Vern Law and they got a strong wind-up performance from Elroy Face.

The Pirates needed one more key play to win it, after Face replaced Law, and they got it when Virvon raced to the base of the bleacher wall, 407 feet from the plate, to haul down Bob Cerv's seventh-inning bid for a two-run triple.

Ashland - Southern Oregon college's Red Raiders of the Rogue, starting out on the Oregon collegiate conference football warph, turned fumbles into a pair of quick touchdowns and whooped on to tomahawk Portland State 39 to 20 here Saturday night.

SOC touchdowns four times on running plays, but passes played an important role as the Raiders inflicted on the Vikings their second circuit loss.

Quarterback and end Gordon Carigan, quarterback Olson, and Hartman and fullback Allen Barnes spearheaded the Raiders' overall assault. Carrigan rushed for 24 yards, passed for 49 and received for 35, a total of 108 from scrimmage. Olson completed nine of 17 aeriels for 188 yards. Hartman caught four throws for 101 and Barnes packed the ball 13 times for 70.

For the Vikings Grant hit receivers on 14 of 30 passes for 150 yards and White carried seven times for 35.

I was very fortunate today. Both at bat and in the field. Ralph Terry had good stuff and he made some excellent pitches to me. He struck me out in the first inning and got me on an infield grounder in the third.

But in the fifth, he tried to get the ball down on me and hung a curve high instead. I hit the ball on the fists and it just fell in for that single.

The ball I caught on Bob Cerv in the seventh had me fooled at first. I thought it was going to carry farther than it did and I imagined I was going to run into the wall.

Autopsy Slated To Learn Grid Fatality Cause

Houston, Tex. - (UPI) - Houston officials today probed the death of a New York Titan professional football player to determine whether he died from heat prostration or a head injury.

An autopsy was to be performed on the body of Howard Glenn, a 24-year-old offensive guard. Glenn collapsed after leaving the field in the Titan - Houston Oilers game Sunday, and died about two hours later.

It was at first believed the 6-2, 245-pound guard was suffering from heat prostration from playing in the 90-degree weather. But two physicians who examined the Vancouver, Wash., native immediately after the game disagreed and ordered him to a hospital.

Concussion

A spokesman at the hospital where Glenn died said the cause of death appeared to be a concussion followed by a cerebral hemorrhage.

It was understood that Glenn was originally injured in last week's game against the Dallas Texans. However, Titan officials were en route to New York and could not be contacted for immediate comment.

The death of the Linfield (Ore.) college graduate was the third in professional football history. Dave Sparks of the Washington Redskins died in 1954 after a game with the Cleveland Browns, and Stan Mauldin of the Chicago Cardinals collapsed and died in the clubhouse following a game with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1948.

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
