Working Women Make Good Mothers, Editor Tells BPW

Washington-UPD - Working women make just as good mothers as non-working housewives, Gay Pauley, women's editor of United Press International, said Saturday.

"The working wife is better organized—she has to be to survive," Miss Pauley said. "And because she does go to the office every day she puts in twice as much effort to make home and family happy and comfortable," she added.

Miss Pauley spoke to the District of Columbia Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs. She said her own poll of high government and business leaders indicated they believe working women are indispensable.

She quoted secretary of labor James P. Mitchell as saying that job opportunities for women "are unlimited in the changing, automated world."

From Keith Funston, president of the New York Stock Exchange, came this comment: "The world of women wouldn't know what to do without women."

A similar feeling was expressed by J. M. Freeman, assistant vice president of American Telephone and Telegraph.

"The ladies are vital to our business. We couldn't run it without them," Miss Pauley quoted Freeman as stating.

As for herself, Miss Pauley admits the idea of "sleeping until nine o'clock any morning" has often appealed to her.

But when she thinks of quitting her job, she said she just asks herself: "Think of all the fun you'd have missed in 18 years if you had been, as they say, 'just a housewife.'"
