

Second Candidate Fails To Appear at Roundtable Lunch

For the second week in a row Monday a scheduled speaker for the Medford Chamber of Commerce roundtable luncheon failed to appear. Last week it was a Republican, this week it was a Democrat.

A slightly perturbed roundtable chairman, Dr. Ken Baker, waited for about a half-hour for the speaker to show up and then announced to the more than 30 people assembled there that Monroe Sweetland, Democratic candidate for Secretary of State, was apparently not going to show up.

Dr. Baker said he had obtained Sweetland's commitment to speak at the luncheon by letter in August. He called Democratic headquarters yesterday to find out what had happened to the errand candidate and was told that Sweetland sent him a letter about a week ago cancelling the engagement.

Dr. Baker said, however, "I haven't received the letter." He said it was possible that the letter was "somewhere on my desk."

Last Monday, Dr. Edwin Durno, candidate for Congress from the Fourth Congressional District, failed to show up for the roundtable engagement on an apparent mix-up of speaking dates.

Dr. Baker, who commented in good humor that he is con-

sidering resigning his post, said he thought next week's speaker should be there. A representative of the California wine industry is scheduled to speak then.

It appeared that Dr. Baker may have given up on political candidates as speakers at the weekly luncheon meetings.

Denounces Editorial.
County Commissioner Chester Wendt took the occasion to denounce an editorial that appeared in Sunday's Mail Tribune. The editorial criticized the county court for allegedly not moving fast enough on the development of recreational facilities at Howard Prairie lake.

Wendt said: "I want to correct that," and stated that "the writer (of the editorial) didn't know what he was talking about."

He said "nobody is dragging their feet," and contended that "quite a bit has been accomplished at Howard Prairie this year."

Wendt said plans are being made to construct a permanent concession facility at

the lake and added that the court hopes construction can begin in the spring.

Used Next Fall.
It would do no good to start on the permanent concession facility any sooner, he said, because it could not be used until next fall anyways. Johnston Stores has an 18-month contract to operate a temporary concession facility. Wendt pointed out, and the permanent concession facility would then have to wait until the contract expired before it could open.

He said also that under another agreement, with a contractor who has been installing a water system at the reservoir this summer, no other work could be done until he was finished. The contractor completed the water supply system and restroom facilities several weeks ago, he added.

Wendt concluded his off-the-cuff comments on the note that "if the writer had contacted the county court before he wrote the editorial, he would have known what's going on."

Lost La Grande Trio Found Safe

La Grande—UPI—Two newspapermen and a 14-year-old boy found their way to safety Sunday after being lost while deer hunting on the southeast side of Mt. Emily about 10 miles northeast of here.

Grady Pannell, managing editor of the La Grande Evening Observer, his son Robin, and Charles Custer, reporter for the newspaper, were tracking a deer late Saturday in the snow. "We tracked too long and found we were lost," Custer said.

The trio built a fire and spent the night. The boy was wearing low-topped shoes, Custer said, so he was left by the fire Sunday while he and Pannell found their way to their parked car to get a pair of boots for the boy.

Custer said they came across a state policeman who was looking for them. They took the boots back to Pannell's son and hiked out about 6 p.m. Sunday. Custer said they were reported lost a second time because it took so long to make the second trip.

Sen. John F. Kennedy (in Columbia, S. C.):

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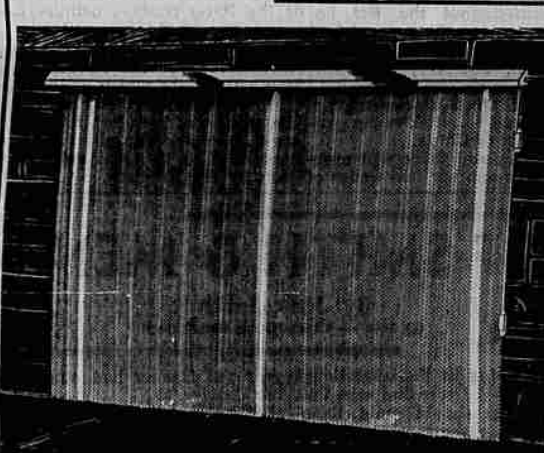
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McNeil Elected Head of Group

Don McNeil, manager of the Medford Chamber of Commerce, was elected president of the Oregon Chamber Executives association at a three-day meeting in Bend during the week end.

McNeil will replace Bill Catlin, manager of the Corvallis chamber, who served as president during the past year.

McNeil said the purpose of the association is to exchange information and to alert smaller chambers in the state to the current things in Oregon "that are of concern to all of us in the field of development." The group is comprised of Chamber managers and presidents.

The association meets twice a year with chamber representatives from Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Some 40 persons attended the Bend meeting. McNeil said, and heard Robert Tarr of the state's department of planning and development, speak on the services of that agency. There were a number of other speakers, he said, including one from the Better Business Bureau.

Also elected to office was Phil Hunt, a representative of the Portland chamber. He will serve as the new secretary-treasurer.

Wall Street Chatter

New York—UPI—The big question, according to Standard & Poor's Corp. is: Has the stock market made adequate allowance for the deflated hopes of early 1960 and for the prospect of an even less favorable business climate?

Standard thinks the market has largely done so. If the bottom has not already been seen, it says, it probably is not far away. At this stage, the firm advises against large-scale reductions in holdings, but would still be alert for switching opportunities to strengthen portfolio positions.

Spear & Staff recommends buying Corning Glass in the 145-150 range, Eastman Kodak in the 101-106 area, McDonnell Aircraft in the 19-20 1/2 range and Suburban Gas and Lehn & Fink at the market.

Investors Research Co. says that while the airlines have

good speculative possibilities for the future, it ranks the group as unfavorable for purchase as capital gains candidates at this juncture.

United Business Service reports that while the gold outflow from the United States is a serious problem, there is no immediate actual gold crisis. The firm says the nation's gold stock is still large enough so that time is available to find a solution.

Morse's Name Taken Off Ballot

Bismarck, N. D.—UPI—The North Dakota Supreme Court Monday took the name of Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon off the state's presidential ballot.

The court's precedent-making decision said neither the name of Morse nor those of the electors who tried to represent him will be on the ballot. The decision set a precedent by determining that a candidate, and not the electors, are the official nominees.

Morse, a Democrat, had asked to have his name off the ballot.

William Murray, Bismarck, representing Morse and the North Dakota Democratic party, had argued that the electors are puppets subject to the will of the candidate. Murray maintained that Morse told Secretary of State Ben Meier in writing that he did not want his name on the ballot and this refusal invalidated any action by the electors.

The state argued that the electors are the official candi-

dates or nominees, and that Morse is merely the man to whom they pledged their votes in the electoral college.

The supreme court said Morse's nomination was void because of his written refusal.

Air-Water Agency Approved at Salem

Salem—UPI—A joint air-water port agency for the Salem area was approved Monday night by the Salem City Council.

It was approved earlier Monday by the county courts of Marion and Polk counties. The new port agency will take over operation of Salem's McNary Field airport. It will be charged with maintaining and expanding the air transportation facilities in the two-county area and with developing new river transportation facilities along the Willamette river here.

Creation of the agency followed a one and a half year study by the Intergovernmental Cooperation Council, an advisory coordinating agency of area government.

Portland Airport Warned of Birds

Portland—UPI—The Port of Portland was warned Monday by E. R. Quesada, administrator of the federal aviation agency, of the danger of birds on the runway at Portland International Airport.

A flock of starlings is believed to have caused the crash of an Eastern Airlines' Electra turbo prop airliner at Boston last week, according to Quesada's telegram.

Jake Fryburger, assistant manager for aviation, told the Port Commission Monday that ducks, pheasants and seagulls had caused some concern, but not starlings.

But, he said, they could become a menace because of their size and the density of their flocks during winter migration to Oregon.

Man, 65, Missing In Lebanon Area

Lebanon—UPI—Search parties today were looking for a 65-year-old crippled man missing from his home in a heavily wooded area about seven miles southeast of Lebanon.

Sheriff George Miller said it was known the man cannot walk far and expressed fear the missing man, Percy Miller, may have been hurt.

A search of Miller's home revealed the rifle was missing but authorities said it was not known if he had gone hunting. Bloodhounds were summoned from Lakeview after deputies failed to find a trace of Miller late Monday.

Police Solve Purse Theft at Restaurant

Police solved a reported theft of a purse Sunday night when Howard Hallett Anderson, 18, of 1029 Court st., admitted that he took the purse in what started out to be a joke.

Police received a report from Susan Carroll Hurt, 19, of 228 North Bartlett st., Sunday night, that someone took her purse, containing \$5, while she in a local restaurant.

Police questioned Anderson who had been sitting with Miss Hurt in the restaurant. He admitted taking the purse as a joke at first, but said that when Miss Hurt did not think he took it, he removed the \$5 from the purse and left it in the men's restroom. No charges were filed.

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
