

# Odds Favor Pittsburgh For First Time

## Bucs Name Friend; NY Undecided

Pittsburgh—(UPI)—The Pittsburgh Pirates prepared today to let Bob Friend "pop the corks" for their first world championship celebration in 35 years, while Casey Stengel wrestled with a pitching problem that brought the New York Yankees to the brink of extinction in the 1960 World Series.

Needing only one victory in the two remaining games at Pittsburgh, Wednesday and Thursday, the Pirates were favored at 4 to 1 odds to win their first championship since 1925. At the same time the odds-makers made the Yankees 6 to 5 picks to win the sixth game and carry the Series its full seven games.

It was the first time the Pirates, who had been taken off the boards following Saturday's 10-0 defeat, were favored to win the Series.

Manager Danny Murtaugh confidently named 18-game winner Friend as his sixth game starting pitcher but Stengel was undecided between right-handed fastballer Bob Turley and lefty curveballer Whitey Ford. Stengel's indecision spotlighted a pitching problem that was marked Monday when Art Ditmar, who lasted only a third of an inning in last Wednesday's game, was kayoed in the second inning.

**Pirate Pitching Strong**  
In short, Murtaugh appears to have 70-year-old Stengel over the barrel in this World Series because he has Friend, Vern Law and relief ace Elroy Face—a trio of pitchers the Yankees just can't match.

Murtaugh also said that he would start the same Pirate lineup that played the fourth and fifth games Wednesday while he again Stengel was undecided. He promised nothing—and said only that "I've got until Wednesday morning to make up my mind."

Stengel, however, is expected to put Yogi Berra in left field to add lefty-hitting strength against Friend and move Tony Kubek up from the seventh or eighth slot to the leadoff position. It is also possible that Cletis Boyer will take over at third for McDougald, whose error led to two unearned runs for the Pirates in the second inning of Monday's 5-2 defeat.

In times of stress, Stengel usually goes for defense—and he considers Boyer his best defensive third baseman. Yanks Not Disheartened

Veteran Yanks were far from disheartened by the sudden turn of events in a Series they figured they had won last Saturday and pointed out that Turley carried them virtually single-handedly to victory in the 1958 World Series under similar conditions.

The Yankees went back to Milwaukee trailing three games to two that year but Turley pulled them through to one of the most satisfying of Stengel's seven World Series triumphs.

The fly in the Yankee ointment, however, is that Turley of 1960 hasn't been the same Turley of 1958. A fireballing 21-game winner that year, Turley has relied heavily on soft curves this year and had a 9-3 record for the campaign.

Ford is the fellow Stengel and Yankee brass have always said they would want to pitch a game they had to win—and that's exactly the way to describe Wednesday's game. The rub with Ford is that he had an erratic 12-9 season and pitched only eight complete games.

In addition, he never has won a Series game on the road. He had a breeze game in Saturday's rout at Yankee Stadium so should be physically ready for the assignment.

**Pirates Exploit Break**  
The Pirates, who were being written out of the Series last Saturday, showed their

Ditmar was unlucky—but he wasn't too good either and Stengel must have wished he had stuck with Bill Stafford, the 22-year-old fastballer he planned to use until he woke up Monday morning. Once Stafford finally got into the game—he followed Luis Arroyo in the third inning—he took complete command and held the Pirates to three hits and no runs for the next five innings.

The 24-year-old offensive guard, Howard Glenn, collapsed after leaving the field and died two hours later at a hospital. Glenn played his college football at Linfield. He was a native of Vancouver, Wash.

County Medical Examiner Dr. Joseph A. Jachimczyk said Glenn's fatal injury "could have been from the game at Dallas a week ago, but more than likely his neck was broken in Sunday's game."

His death was the first in the young American Football league, and only the third in the history of professional football.

## Bob Friend Gets Second Chance Against Yanks

Pittsburgh—(UPI)—Bob Friend says he "can't wait" for Wednesday, a day in which he hopes to vindicate himself personally and wrap up the world championship for the Pittsburgh Pirates at the same time.

The veteran 31-year-old righthander makes no bones about his disappointment over being yanked for a pinch hitter in the fourth inning of the second World Series game, which the Pirates lost.

"Disappointed isn't the word," said Friend, who will start the sixth game for Pittsburgh Wednesday. "I had waited a long time to pitch in a World Series game and then when I finally got to do it, I wasn't even around long enough to enjoy it."

"The thing that hurt was that I had good stuff that day. I honestly felt I could beat the Yankees if I had remained in the game. But that's water under the dam now. The only thing that counts with me is tomorrow."

For a time, the dejected Friend wasn't even sure that he would get another chance to work in this Series. But Manager Danny Murtaugh set his fears at rest after the third game of the Series by announcing that he planned to come back with him in one of the later games.

Friend came mighty close to losing his chance of starting Wednesday's game during the ninth inning of Monday's contest.

### Stengel, McDougald Take Rap For Loss

New York—(UPI)—Casey Stengel and Gil McDougald took their turns at taking the rap for the Yankees' fifth-game World Series defeat.

Ole Case second-guessed himself for his choice of starting pitcher and also for the way he deployed his infield during the second inning when the Pirates scored three runs.

And McDougald assumed the blame for miffing a "perfect throw" that made two of those runs unearned and gave the Pirates an early commanding lead.

"It was a perfect throw and I dropped it. What can I say?" McDougald commented with chagrin as he discussed his error on shortstop Tony Kubek's throw which attempted to nail Smokey Burgess at third base.

"Naw, he didn't barge into me. In fact, he hardly touched me. I dropped the ball before Burgess even got there," McDougald added.

Someone asked Ole Case if he thought the Yankees' plight was "desperate."

"I don't know whether it is or not," Stengel replied. "I know how to count. Maybe things are desperate. But why should I say it?"

Stengel reflected that perhaps after all he should have started young Bill Stafford instead of Art Ditmar, who failed to last the second inning. Stafford, who was Stengel's original choice to start, relieved Ditmar and pitched five shutout innings.

"I said before I wouldn't hesitate to start Stafford under any circumstances, and from the way things turned out, maybe that is what I should have done," Stengel mused. "He did a wonderful job for us but they (the Pirates) stopped us from scoring."

Casey did not excuse McDougald for his costly error, but the white-haired skipper wondered out loud what would have resulted had he played his infield differently.

With Don Hoak at bat and men on second and third bases with only one out, Stengel directed his infield to play back.

"I was willing to spot them a run at that time," he explained. "If I'd have pulled

the infield in, maybe things would have been different. But how are you gonna know?"

### Mississippi Takes No. 1 Spot in Poll

New York—(UPI)—Mississippi took over the No. 1 berth in the United Press International major college football ratings today while defending champion Syracuse tumbled from first to fourth place.

The unbeaten Rebels, who breezed to a 26-0 victory over Vanderbilt last Saturday while Syracuse was scrambling to a 15-6 triumph over winless Holy Cross, garnered 15 first place votes and 300 points in the weekly balloting of the UPI Board of Coaches.

Ohio State vaulted from fifth to second place with 279 points, only one more than Iowa and four ahead of Syracuse. The Buckeyes received

Navy moved up one notch to fifth place and was followed in order by Missouri, Baylor, Minnesota, Texas and Kansas.

Texas, tied for 22nd place last week, made the biggest jump on the strength of its 24-0 victory over once-powerful Oklahoma. The other newcomers to the top 10 were Baylor, which moved from 12th to 7th place, and Kansas, which vaulted from 13th to 10th position.

Illinois, ranked fourth before absorbing a 34-7 trouncing by Ohio State, received one eighth-place vote while previously seventh-ranked Purdue was not named on a single ballot after losing to Wisconsin, 24-13.

Clemson retained 11th place and Wisconsin jumped from 24th to 12th place. Rounding out the second 10 group were Washington, Michigan State, UCLA, Alabama, Penn State, North Carolina State, Michigan and New Mexico State.

Syracuse dropped out of first place for the first time since last Nov. 9 when the Orangemen replaced Louisiana and held the lead for the final four weeks of the 1959 season to emerge as national champions.
