The company will appear in Hedrick Junior High school which has an extremely large stage and the lighting necessary for such a presentation.

She pointed out that concerts of music and dancing are "family fun" and provide the cultural and artistic life which is essential to counter-balance the American world of noise, speed on the highway, hurry and stress in the business world, and economic materialism.

Mr. Bullis also spoke, stressing that volunteers are not asking for contributions, but selling a worthwhile product and doing a community service. It was pointed out that memberships for both adults and students may be given as gifts.
