



Nationalist China Not To Surrender Offshore Islands

Taipei, Formosa — (UPI) — A high government official declared today that Nationalist China never will surrender the offshore island complexes of Matsu and Quemoy to the Communists.

Vice Adm. Liu Hu-tuh, military spokesman for President Chiang Kai-shek's government, made the statement to United Press International.

"We have repeatedly made our determination known to the world that we will fight to the last" in defense of the islands, he said.

Adm. Liu was commenting on clashes between U. S. presidential candidates Richard M. Nixon and John F. Kennedy over whether the islands should be defended.

Their statements were played prominently in all newspapers here.

The Foreign Ministry simultaneously issued a statement categorically denying that the United States and the Nationalist government ever had negotiated possible withdrawal from the islands.

James Shen, Foreign Ministry spokesman, said there was "absolutely no truth" in such a claim.

Other officials contacted by United Press International declined to comment publicly but all expressed grave concern over the fact that the islands had become a political issue in the United States.

They said the Nationalists had proved they are able to defend the offshore islands without the United States committing any of its troops.

Hatfield Says Ullman Jeopardized Boardman

Salem — (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield said today that despite statements by Rep. Al Ullman, (D-Ore.) to the contrary, Ullman "complicated and put in jeopardy" the state's acquisition of the Boardman bombing site in the last Congress.

Hatfield first said this in Pendleton last Saturday and Ullman rejected Hatfield's charges Tuesday in Heppner.

"The congressman's excited response and name calling cannot hide his record of failing to give full cooperation to the state administration, in acquiring the Boardman site," Hatfield said.

The legislation did pass

Mice Hurlled Into Space in Missile; Capsule Recovered

Cape Canaveral, Fla. — (UPI) — An Air Force Atlas missile hurled three black mice 650 miles into space and 5,000 miles over the Atlantic Ocean today in its first flight with living passengers.

The Air Force said a nose cone carrying the animals was recovered from a watery target area in the South Atlantic about three hours later. It was not known immediately whether the mice had survived.

The 85-foot rocket, expected to lift a human astronaut into orbit next year, thundered from its pad at 1:35 a.m. (p.s.t.). The nose cone plunged into the target less than 30 minutes later after taking its passengers through a deadly band of radiation ringing the earth.

The shot came five hours after another Atlas, fired in a training test at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., blew up one minute after launching.

The mice, two females and a male named Sally, Amy and Moe, were tucked in a cylindrical life-support cell in the missile's roomy nose, a comparatively new cone built by General Electric Co. expressly for a nuclear warhead. Surrounded by instruments, they were surrounded by packages of instruments designed to measure radiation in the upper atmosphere and in space as the rocket soared into an intense area of radiation known as the lower Van Allen belt.

The Air Force said the crew of the range ship Coastal Crusaders saw the nose hit the water. The vessel pulled alongside the object, floating with a balloon.

Skin divers set to work and the nose cone was pulled aboard the ship. The experiments were to be returned to scientists at Cape Canaveral. Officials said the trip back up the Atlantic Missile Range would take nearly one week.

Man's Address Fits Police Records

Tampa, Fla. — James Arthur Hay, 45, sentenced to 55 days in the "honor system" stockade after being arrested for the 43rd time on drunkenness charges, lists his address as "at large" on police records.

Dope Number One Problem Facing Police Group

Washington — (Science Service) — Interpol's number one crime problem is dope. And the United States is the number one center for the sale of illegal narcotics. More money is spent here for dope than anywhere else in the world.

The high price narcotics can command here because of the high standard of living is the reason given for this U. S. leadership by Assistant Secretary of the Treasury A. Gilmore Flues, chief of the U. S. delegation to the International Criminal Police Organization now meeting here.

There are 45,000 registered drug addicts in the United States and an undetermined number of victims of the dope habit not yet registered.

Mafia, the international criminal organization sometimes referred to as the Black Hand, and which originated in Sicily in the early 1800s, is believed to be behind most organized international illegal activities.

Chicago Important
Currently, the center for Mafia is the United States, Charles Siragusa, U. S. Interpol delegate attached to the Bureau of Narcotics, Washington, D. C., told Science Service. Chicago is an important Mafia center, he said. Among its activities are white slavery, counterfeiting, smuggling and drug trafficking.

Interpol assists the U. S. in its fight against Mafia and particularly the illegal drug traffic by the swift exchange of police information on an
