

Tornado May Start Separate Defensive Platoon Against KF

A completely separate defensive platoon may start for the Medford Black Tornado in the Southern Oregon conference football game with Klamath Union High school here Friday night.

That was the indication today of Medford Head Coach Fred Spiegelberg.

The District 6 A-1 ruckus is set for 8 p.m. with Medford, No. 1 ranked in Oregon, gunning for its sixth straight

The old grandstand on the west side of the Medford high stadium is to be reserved for students of the two high schools Friday night and not to be used for general admission when Medford and Klamath Union football teams vie. It was announced today. It was indicated that the old grandstand seating will be held for occupancy by students until 7:45 p.m. If the seating is all taken by that time, gates will be barred. If there is some room available in the old stand after that time, some general admission fans may be admitted.

With the defensive platoon in mind this week Spiegelberg and his staff have groomed Chuck McNair for an opening assignment at a linebacker post where Terry Earl has had first call. Richard Connolly, Don Tichenor and Stan Smith have been scrapping for the tackle position which has been held down by Terry O'Sullivan. The head mentor also indicated that Tim White is to have first summons at corner. Linebacker over Dan Sieg and Jim Stever the job at a deep back ahead of Mike McCulloch.

Players Trade
A major change involves Al Funston and Sam Knudsen who have traded positions. Funston going to linebacker and Knudsen to middle guard.

Earl, O'Sullivan and Sieg all are offensive regulars. It's quite probable that they'll see reserve defensive duty. McNair has been moved up from reserve role behind Earl, White and Stever are no strangers to their positions but the other two players have been considered the regulars. Spiegelberg said that Warren Parke may alternate with McNair. Parke, nevertheless, may be more needed at offensive center since regular Chuck Holt's back is ailing.

The head coach gave morale bolstering as a reason for defensive platoon plan. He allowed that other teams "have been going through" Medford defense this season but attributed it to a considerable extent to the "opening up" of offenses by rival schools more in comparison to past years.

Not Satisfied
While Spiegelberg did not say so in exact words, it's apparent that he's not entirely satisfied with the attitude of his Black Tornado charges. He did say, "I'd like to see them get a real good scare." The mentor reported a good practice yesterday but said that it was the first good one all week.

Most of the clubs which Medford has played have been "up" for the Black Tornado and played their best game against it. Klamath may prove no exception although on the basis of season record it enters the contest a decided underdog. Klamath, high rated at the start of the season when it beat Boise, Idaho, and tied North Salem, has lost successively to Ashland, Eureka, Calif., and Grants Pass. Medford, undefeated, in contrast has a string of impressive victories.

The Pelicans of KF did suf-

fer a rough blow this week when it was learned that regular quarterback Kent Hunsaker has a broken hand. Sherm Allen reportedly has been named by Coach Bob Williams to take over at the position and Gary Buchholz is expected to see duty there.

Bobby Richardson, the sawed-off second baseman of the New York Yankees, never thought they'd call him that. But they are indeed.

Because as the Yankees clobbered the Pittsburgh Pirates in three of the six games, Richardson was the batting star with a grand slam homer, two triples and a new World Series record total of 12 runs batted in.

Look back over the years at some of the hitters who have played in the series — from Babe Ruth right down through such as Joe DiMaggio and Ted Williams — and it makes for fascinating, and almost unbelievable, speculation.

Richardson is a modest little man noted for his sick fielding and, until this Series, was considered by most American league pitchers as one of the original All-American outs. Now, all of a sudden, he's sheer murder at the plate.

"It beats me," says the little man from Sumter, S.C. "I can't even begin to explain what's going on. I'm just doing the same old thing in the same old way but, whango, something seems to happen to the ball."

Then, as an afterthought, he added:

"Thank goodness."

Going into the Series, little Bobby was anything but a ball of fire at the plate.

He had knocked in only 26 runs all season. And, in a miserable last half of the season, he drove only seven runs home since the All-Star break in mid-July.
