

Duncan's Position Known on Issues, Legislator Claims

Robert B. Duncan, Medford speaker of the state house of representatives, and a Democratic candidate for reelection, said today that his position on taxes and O and C funds "is a matter of public record in the House Journal, and in the committee reports."

He said his position is "well known" to John R. Dellenback, Republican candidate for representative from Jackson county who challenged Duncan on the subject.

Duncan noted that in 1957 a bill introduced by a Republican to consider 25 per cent of the O and C funds in determining a school district's eligibility for state equalization died in committee. He wrote the minority and dissenting report to the recommendation that 25 per cent of O and C funds be allocated

to the county school fund when he was on the interim education committee.

He noted that the house committee recommended further study of the field of school finance by the 1959 interim committee, and as a result the committee may recommend a "compromise that 12 1/2 per cent of O and C funds be considered in allocating equalization funds."

Mrs. Evelyn Nye, Republican from Jackson county seeking reelection and a member of the 1959 interim committee on education, voted against the 25 per cent proposal, but has supported the 12 1/2 per cent, Duncan said.

Duncan said both he and Mrs. Nye "recognize the state's obligation to furnish Oregon youngsters with a good education. Both of us have been seeking a distribution formula fair to all parts of the state and one which will end the geographical antagonism which has held back education in Oregon."

National Group Supports Labeling Contents of Shoes

The National Federation of Independent Business, which has the largest individual membership of any business organization in the country, has supported Wilbur L. Gardner's campaign to have shoes labeled.

Gardner, who operates a shoe repair shop in Medford, started the drive for labeling shoes, and as a result Congressman Charles O. Porter has introduced a bill which would require shoes to be labeled of the material used in manufacture.

About two million people have expressed support for the bill, Gardner said.

Gardner recently sent each congressman a letter seeking each one's opinion on the proposed bill. He referred to the Congressional Record, which included a letter from Gardner to Porter explaining purposes of the bill, and why it is desired.

In his letter to congressmen, Gardner pointed out that "shoes imported from foreign lands, have in some instances caused damage to the feet, and this is another added cause to label shoes for protective buying."

Gardner's letter to each congressman was followed by a letter to each one from Merrill A. Watson, executive vice president of the National Shoe Manufacturing association, who expressed opposition to the proposed bill.

As a result of Gardner's letter, 14 congressmen have gone on record as favoring the bill, and many more may line up in support of it, according to Washington sources, Gardner said.

Sen. Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota and Congresswoman Martha S. Griffiths, Michigan, are among the recent supporters of the bill.

Tax Measure Good

The tax measure referred to the people, Duncan said, "is a good bill." He said that according to estimates from Gov. Mark Hatfield's tax commission, it was necessary to raise additional revenue to balance the budget.

"The changes which this bill makes were a part of Governor Hatfield's recommendations. His entire program was not adopted because it was not necessary and had it been, the surplus would have been astronomical," Duncan said.

"The referred measure probably will not pass, and should not because of the inconvenience to taxpayers in bookkeeping and filing returns," he added.

Duncan asked Dellenback to state his position on several questions, including school reorganization, the tobacco tax, the three-way industrial accident proposal, minimum prices for cigarettes, the welfare commission to Salem, the Columbia Basin Interstate compact, the labor elections bill, executive reorganization, the development of the legislative fiscal committee and other subjects on which Duncan already is on record.

Ashland—Coeds at Southern Oregon college scored higher on grade point averages than male students, according to Mrs. Mabel Winston, registrar.

The grade point average for women during the academic year 1959-60 was 2.70, while the men had a grade point average of 2.50. There is a possible 4.0 perfect average.

Mrs. Winston said the teacher-education students held the highest average compared with non-teacher education groups.

Women's residences had an average of 2.45 for the whole year, and the various men's housing units averaged 2.14, she said.

The all-school average for 1959-60 rose each consecutive term, and averaged out at the end of three terms at 2.55.
