## Lunch Box Meals Should Be Nutritious, Appetizing

New York—School lunch box meals should be nutritious, appetizing, imaginative, easy to carry in box or paper bag, and made with ingredients that keep for several hours without refrigeration.

To fill this tall order, here are packing tips and sandwich recipes from the consumer service bureau of a manufacturer of lunch meat casings (Viking Company). Each spread recipe serves six to eight.

—Braunschweiger - blue cheese spread: Mash ½ pound of braunschweiger or liver sausage. Blend in ½ cup of crumbled blue cheese and 2 tablespoons of mayonnaise. Spread on split, buttered French roll. Wrap tomato slices and lettuce separately to add at mealtime.

—Summer sausage salad: Mix ½ pound of chopped summer sausage or cervelat with 1 tablespoon of instant minced onion, ½ green pepper, minced, 2 tablespoons of diced pimiento, 1 stalk of celery, chopped, salt and pepper to taste and mayonnaise to moisten. Spread on buttered caraway rye bread.
