George Loftin, Texas Democrat, and a farmer in the Beagle district, was elected chairman of the group and called on members seated around the table to express themselves as to conditions in their farming operation, and if they believed that a change in the national administration would be beneficial to them. Search Abandoned For Pilot at Sea

Wake Island—UP—Search was abandoned today for a missing pilot whose small plane crashed three miles offshore during an attempted record flight from California to Manila.

Authorities said they gave up hope of finding Lt. Duane Stirling, 27, Fargo, N. D., after searching an area of 1,000 square miles in the vicinity of Wake.

Stirling's plane crashed late Wednesday as he and Capt. Charles Finnegan, 30, also of Fargo, were attempting a record flight of 7,698 miles from Oakland, Calif., to Manila. The two Air National Guardsmen were flying identical planes.

Finnegan landed safely at Wake and notified authorities of the crash. Stirling's plane was recovered from the ocean a few hours later, but the pilot was not aboard.

 Portland - UP - The State Board of Health said today a dog which had rabies was discovered in Curry county last week.

The board said immediate quarantine of small domestic animals will go into effect at once in the county, where the dog bit a man in Gold Beach. The board said the dog is now dead but other animals might be infected. The man is undergoing treatment.

Coos county also was reported considering a quarantine on a voluntary basis. The health board said it was the first confirmed case of rabies in an Oregon dog in about 15 years.

Rogue River To Have New Fire Truck by Next Week

Rogue River - A new fire truck will arrive in Rogue River next week, according to Douglas Buckle, assistant fire chief.

The Coast Apparatus Co. has notified the Rogue River Fire district that the new fire truck is nearly completed. After finishing touches and tests, the truck will be delivered.

The \$10,000 truck was specially designed for the needs of the district, according to Buckle.

The truck is being acquired under a rental lease purchase agreement. It should be paid for in five years, Buckle said.

The new truck features a 165 horsepower engine, twin electric high pressure reels, an 800 gallon galvanized booster tank and an electric combination siren-speaker system.

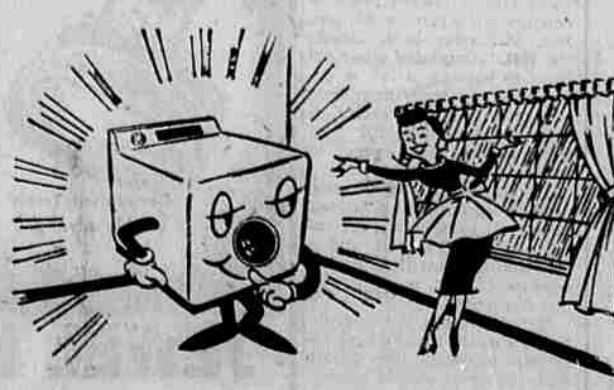
