

### 500 Students Slug It Out After Game

Stanford, Calif. — (UPI) — San Jose State college students won a bloody battle from Stanford university students Saturday and finally tore down the goal posts after a 45-minute slugfest. In a riot involving an estimated 500 students, police were trampled underfoot, noses were bloodied and at least two participants were carried away on stretchers. The crowd of 33,000 in Stanford stadium, which watched the Spartans upset the Indians for the first time in six years, 34-20, stayed in their seats to watch the long drawn-out fight. The fight began when 20 red-shirted Stanford cheerleaders surrounded the goal posts to protect them as about 300 white-shirted San Jose students rushed onto the field. More Stanford students joined in the melee. Fist fights broke out all over the field and while the major action was at one end of the field, the cross bars at the other end were knocked down without any opposition. While the San Jose band played rock 'n roll music the fight raged on and within a few minutes at least two unidentified fighters were carried out on stretchers.

A team which can score touchdowns with the chain-like reaction of nuclear fission, the Medford High school football juggernaut, Friday night continued on its path of 1960 devastation. Fleet halfback Phil Humphreys erupted on four scoring runs and jack-of-all-halfback trades Mike Hood ran, passed and caught for touchdowns in a 49 to 6 Southern Oregon conference rout of Klamath Falls at the Medford stadium. The power and speed-laden Black Tornado No. 1 offensive combination scored almost at will against the Pelican invader. It blasted to TD territory each time it got possession of the ball. Victory was the sixth straight this season for the Big Wind and the second in District 6 A-1. Klamath was dealt its fourth consecutive setback and its third loss in the conference. 171-Yard Total

Tornado blockers broke Humphreys loose for 68, 27, 21 and 19 yard TD runs. He totaled 171 yards in eight rushing plays. Hood passed 37 yards to Bob Quinney for a goal, caught a throw from Dick Ragsdale for 28 yards and a marker and burst 24 yards to cross the payoff stripe. Miles kicked extra points after five of the seven touchdowns. Another boot was erased by penalty. A safely added two points on the board for Medford, Richard Connolly blocked a Sperm Allen punt and Allen recovered the ball in the end for the Pels.

Klamath Falls gave the Medford defense a workout with its wide open style of assault and its biggest flash of offensive lightning resulted in its only score. In the late first quarter, with Medford leading 22 to 0, Allen unleashed a heave to Wayne Dennis for a 52-yard gain. Medford's Jim Barry brought Dennis down on the Tornado 15-yard line. A KF running play gained two yards, Medford was penalized for offense, putting the ball on the eight. Greg Jones then touched down on a buck lateral, skirting left end. The home club was on top 29 to 6 after one quarter and the score was the same when the halftime signal blared. Third period standing was 42 to 6. Medford outscrimmaged Klamath 465 net yards to 154. The Tornado used a top defensive platoon all the way, with some switches. While KFHS offense reeled off a few good gains, the Medfordites held it to just 87 yards net rushing.

Black Tornado gridders went 66 yards in five plays for the first TD off the opening kick with a reverse and pass. Hood to Quinney, the final play. Medford's kickoff by George Clearwater got through Steve Stiles and Dave Stippich fell on the ball for KF on the two-yard line. Allen punted on third down from behind the Pelican five. Jim Stever ran the ball back from the 34 to the Pel 27. On the next play Humphreys went over right tackle and barged to the goal. The safety followed with Allen punting from behind his 11. On the kickoff from the KF 20-yard line, Barry ran the ball back 29 yards from the Medford 43 to the Pelican 28. Dan Sieg made seven yards, then Humphreys broke through the middle for the 21-yard paying jaunt.

Medford was started on the way to touchdown No. 4 when Al Funston fell on the ball on the Pel 45. Gary Hancock's attempted onside kickoff for Klamath was short and offside. The Tornado, penalized once 15 yards for clipping, needed just six yards to score on the Ragsdale to Hood pass. Larry Brown of Medford fell on a Larry McClure fumble on the Klamath 38 right after the third quarter began. The Tornado had a TD in five plays on Humphreys' 19-yard run. KF drew a seven yard penalty on the drive but Medford was set back 15 yards on an infraction.

Klamath next moved down to the Medford 24 but was put back to the 39 on a shoving infraction on a pass. It gained back to the 31 but Barry broke up a fourth down Allen pass, falling over an official as he did. The Tornado took over and, on the first play from scrimmage, Humphreys shot through an opening on the right side of line, went up the sideline, slanted left across the field then went up the left sidestripe, outrunning KF defenders on his 69-yard trek to the end zone.

In the late third stanza, Medford took the ball on its own 38 and moved in six plays to tally on the first play of the fourth quarter, Hood going 24. A pitch-lateral play, Ragsdale to Sieg to Ragsdale, gained 18 yards and Hood went 14 on a reverse. Reserves Move Out

Medford reserves took over the rest of the way. They moved to the KF 28 in the closing moments with a Paul Noel interception of a Lawrence pass ending the push. Stever of Medford intercepted a Kent Franklin throw on the last play of the game. Tornado second and third line offensive players were in action through the scoreless second quarter and predominantly junior crew marched from the Medford 28 to the Klamath 18 in 16 plays. There, on the last play of the half, Kent Lewis intercepted a pass by senior Bill Charley. This drive had been started after Klamath had reached the Medford 18. Tornado defender Barry intercepted an Allen toss on the goal line and ran it out. Stippich had 26 and 13-yard runs for the Pels. The scrap was penalty-filled with 150 yards assessed against Medford and 67 against Klamath. Medford once kicked off from the KF 30 yard line when two successive 15-yard penalties were called against the Pels. The Tornado onside try by Clearwater failed to get the required 10 yards and Medford was put back to the KF 35 to boot again.

## Oregon Strikes Twice in 42 Seconds; Wins 21 to 12

Eugene, Ore. — (UPI) — Oregon struck for two touchdowns in 42 action-packed seconds late in the game Saturday to overhaul Washington State for a 21-12 football victory that ended a four-year-homecoming hex. Quarterback Dave Gosz climaxed a desperate 80-yard drive with a 31-yard scoring pass to end Len Burnett to put Oregon ahead 13-12 with just six minutes left. On the first play after the kickoff, Oregon guard Mike Rose picked a deflected pass out of the air and raced 29 yards to score standing up. Fourth Win

It was Oregon's fourth victory in five starts this year and was the first time since 1955 that the Webfoots have won a homecoming game. The defeat was a heart-breaker for the battling Cougars, seeking their second win of the year. Halfback Keith Lincoln and end Hugh Campbell, the nation's leading pass receiver, teamed up for two touchdowns to put Washington State ahead 12-7 after Oregon had gone in front 7-0. Lincoln, one of the real stars of the game, hit Campbell with a 4-yard touchdown pass on the last play of the first quarter after he appeared to be trapped. Lincoln boomed over from 2 yards out in the second quarter to climax a drive from the Oregon 41, which started after tackle Ron Green recovered a fumble by tiny Cleveland Jones. After that, Lincoln helped keep Oregon in the hole with his booming punts, one of which covered 60 yards. Oregon finally got a drive going in the third period, moving 63 yards but Washington State's Jim Boylen stole the ball from Dave Grayson on the Cougar 20 to halt drive.

Oregon marched 65 yards the first time it got the ball with Grayson scoring from a yard out. Campbell caught seven passes today for 61 yards to run his season's total to 33 for 457 yards. He has caught six touchdowns passes. Even without the use of star breakaway back Willie Gallimore, the Bears were favored by 7 points to win the key game at Chicago. But the officials and some of the cooler heads stopped it before things got completely out of hand. Washington's margin of victory was provided by George Fleming's 38-yard field goal, 42 seconds before the end of the first half, and two goal line stands that thwarted Bruin Bill Kilmer's second-half heroics. The Huskies threw UCLA back twice after the Uclans had penetrated to inside the 10-yard line. But the third time UCLA got there — late in the fourth

period — Kilmer clicked on a 7-yard scoring pass to reserve end Craig Chudy, and added two more points with a pass to Jim Johnson. The clock, however, had run out for UCLA. Bob Hivner, who has played second fiddle to Bob Schloredt for two years, came into the game late in the first half after Schloredt, Washington's star quarterback, took himself out of the game with a shoulder injury. Hivner took over with Washington on its own 28, after center Roy McKasson recovered a fumble. Hivner then led Washington to the UCLA 19, and with the first-half drawing to a close, the Huskies went for the three-points and Fleming booted it home. Go Ahead
