## UCLA Football Star Dinner Speaker Here

A Presbyterian minister, who was one of University of California at Los Angeles' all-time football greats, will address a gathering of Medford High school athletes and coaches here on Thursday evening, Oct. 20.

He is Donn Moomaw, minister of new life and evangelism at the First Presbyterian church of Berkeley, Calif. His topic will be "The Qualities of a Champion."

This dinner will be at 6 p.m. in the senior high school cafeteria. United Presbyterian Youth fellowship and Presbyterian Men's association are sponsors.

Moomaw gained All-American lineman honors each of his three seasons at UCLA. In his final year, 1952, he was named to every All-American team in the country and was named lineman of the year by both United Press International and Associated Press.

With Crusade

He played in the North-South Shrine game as a senior and was on the college all-star team which met the Detroit Lions the following August. In 1954 Moomaw gained All-Canadian honors playing for the Toronto, Ont., pro team.

The ex-grid great has been active as an evangelist and youth speaker since committing his life to Christ in 1951. In 1954 he served with Bill Graham's London Crusade team and in 1957 he was graduated from Princeton Theological seminary. The Junior Chamber of Commerce of California in 1957 selected Moomaw as one of the five

## Crater High Trims Yreka Miners 26-19

Central Point—Crater High school's football machine got back on the winning track here Friday night. The Comets of CP outscored the Yreka, Calif., Miners 26 to 19.

Ahead of the rest of the way after putting over the first touchdown, Crater, nevertheless, was pressed in the second half. The victory came after a pair of losses. Comet footballers now have a 2-win, 2-loss, 1-tie season record.

Crater led 7 to 0 at the quarter, and 14 to 0 at the half but just 14 to 13 after three cantos. The home club made it 26 before Yreka scored again.

A 20-yard pass play, Mike Glines to Loyal Higginbotham, was good for the opening touchdown and Pat Pepper thumped the extra. A four-yard run by Martin scored next and a Glines to Harold Tweedell pass converted.

John Ellis put Yreka's first tally in the book on a 32-yard pass interception run. Butch McCarthy a bit later intercepted another Crater pass then touchdown on a six-yard running play. McCarthy also ran the bonus.

The Comets came back with a drive from the Yreka 48 and John Champ went over from two yards out. Crater then had its chance to make the most of an interception. Higginbotham tipped up a Mi-

throw. Tom White grabbed the ball and ran 57 yards to the goal.

Ellis ran the Crater kickoff back to the Comet 26-yard line. Bud Green went the last yard.

The Central Pointers missed a chance just as the first half ended. They had first down and a yard to go but Higginbotham fumbled and Yreka recovered on its one-foot line.

Crater coach Leonard Warren noted improvement in his team's blocking and tackling and called its pass defense "exceptionally good." A finger cut, suffered at school Friday, limited the service of Crater's Martin to offense. He was a defensive stand-out against Medford the week before. Pepper was hurt right after kicking his conversion for the Comets.

## Beavers Trounce Idaho 28-8; New Record Set

Moscow, Idaho—(AP)—Sophomore halfback Terry Baker set a new Oregon State college single game total offense record yesterday as he led the Beavers to a 28-8 victory over a surprisingly tough University of Idaho team before a sparse homecoming crowd of 10,500.

Before coming out of the game midway through the final period, Baker passed for 171 yards and made another 113 on the ground for 284 yards, surpassing by 10 yards the record of Joe Francis against Stanford in 1957.

The Vandals, winless in five games this season, were in the game all the way on the fine passing and clutch running of quarterback Sil Vial, and the through-the-line short gains of substitute fullback Mike Sheeran.

Stands Out

But it was Baker figuring in every drive, scoring two touchdowns, rushing for one conversion and passing for another who stood out.

Oregon State scored once in the first and second periods and twice in the fourth. Idaho's lone touchdown came in the third.

With nine minutes gone in the game, Baker started from eight yards out and leaped over Idaho tacklers and into the end zone for the first score. The play ended a seven-play drive which began on the Beaver 11. Key play in the drive was Baker's 47 yard run to the Idaho 19.

Another seven-play drive with three and one half minutes gone in the second period ended in the score when right halfback Gene Hilliard broke loose for a 26-yard run. The Beavers started that one on their own 11 and made it downhill fast with a 49-yard pass play from Baker to right end Amos Marsh, who was tackled on the Idaho 26.

At halftime, the Beavers led 14-0.

Opening the third period, fullback John Kirby fumbled a pass from Baker on his own 34 and Idaho recovered it. Twelve plays later, with She-

ran biting off the yardage in small chunks, the Boston senior plunged over from the two to score.

An Oregon State touchdown by Hilliard was nullified, but he made it up when he caught Baker's 22-yard pass in the end zone to end a 54-yard drive later that period.

Idaho threatened again, but lost the ball on downs on the seven, but intercepted an OSC pass as the gun sounded.

Considered the real underdogs, Idaho was badly outplayed on the ground, but actually led in first downs, 18-17.

## Eagle Point Thumps IV Footballers

Eagle Point—Eagle Point high broke loose in the second half Friday night, turned a close game into a romp and drubbed Illinois Valley 32 to 7 in Rogue league football.

Dick Skeeters spurred the Eagle assault with 182 yards in 23 rushing plays. He and Tom Perdue each got two touchdowns and Mike Palm one as EP chalked up its third loop win without a loss.

The Eagles marched 72 yards to the goal after the opening kick. Skeeters went the last three yards of the drive and Perdue ran the extra point. That was all the scoring until the third quarter.

In the second stanza the teams traded pass interceptions and Eagles recovered two IV fumbles.

Long Runs Aid

Perdue touchdown on a three-yard play in the third canto as a 26-yard sneak by Gary Ayres and a 46-yard run off tackle by Skeeters prepared the way. Then came a 45-yard push. Skeeters did most of the lugging on the drive and crossed over from the five.

IV got its only TD of the night at the start of the fourth quarter on a 50-yard pass play, Steve Hanby to Don Johnson. On the conversion Johnson carried.

Perdue set up a fourth EP touchdown with a fumble recovery. Then a tremendous block by Skeeters, taking out three defenders, broke Perdue loose for a 41-yard romp to the goal. Skeeters ended another 45-yard promenade with Skeeters going over from the nine with 12 seconds left to play. Palm ran on the bonus.

EP had 347 yards net from scrimmage, all on the ground and held the Cougars to just 57 rushing. IV gained 65 through the air for a 122 total net. First downs favored the Eagles 14 to six.

Taken from the line to play quarterback this week, Gary Ayres had 50 yards for seven carries and contributed fine blocking. Perdue rushed 73 for 12. Roy Moore and Dick Hertager, along with Ayres, stood out on defense.

## Phoenix Cracks Rugged Defense to Top Chiefs

Rogue River—Phoenix, the defending titlist in the Rogue league and District 6 A-2, fought by a stubborn, defensive minded Rogue River high football team Friday to remain unblemished in the loop.

The Pirates punched across single touchdowns in the second, third and fourth periods to win 20 to 0. It was their third triumph in the circuit.

Phoenix moved from its own 34-yard line in eight plays for a second panel marker. Jerry Moore traveled five yards for the TD. Conversion run was by Harry Gay, shifted from tackle to fullback because a leg bruise had sidelined regular back Mike Conbruck.

In the third quarter the Pirates marched 69 yards to the end zone with Gay, going across after a 20-yard run by Monty Combs set up the score.

Gamble Fails

Failure of a Rogue River fourth down gamble gave the Pirates the ball on the RR 39-yard line in the fourth quarter. Moore passed to Dave Johnson to put the ball on the four. Combs went the last four yards and Gary Colfax booted the extra tally.

Phoenix in the first quarter took advantage of a high center snap to get a push going in the first quarter but RR held on downs on its own yard line. In the last stanza the Chiefs had an opportunity when Earl Bowen blocked a Colfax punt. Rogue River, however, made only four yards to the Phoenix 35 and lost the ball on downs.
