

Farmers Work On Diversion

Canby, Ore.—(UPI)—Farmers headed by a crusading dairyman are trying to accomplish for \$1,500 a job which Army engineers estimate would cost much more.

Elmer Deetz, former legislator who led the fight years ago to repeal Oregon's milk control law, is supervising the project on the Molalla river near here.

The idea is to dig a cut into a section of the old stream bed to bypass an 1,800-foot horseshoe swing of the river where erosion to farmlands has occurred. Deetz says it can be done for \$1,500 and that the job should be completed some time this week.

Army engineers said the channel diversion would relieve the erosion problem temporarily. But they said an overall \$188,000 government flood control program on the river would provide major improvements for flood control and not merely erosion elimination at one point in the stream.

Volunteers Sought To Help Complete Eagle Point Club

Eagle Point—Volunteers are needed in Eagle Point. Whatever talents a person may have can be put to good use by supervisors of the Community Scout building project in Eagle Point.

The new Scout building is nearing completion. However, more workers are needed so the project may be completed before winter weather arrives.

The most pressing problem is that of building a roof. Then, electricians, plumbers and any persons who can lift and carry rocks can be used. Work hours are every Saturday from 8 a.m. until darkness.

Goes to Young People
When the building is completed it will be given to the young people of the Eagle

Point area. It will be available for community functions at a nominal charge.

The project was started in June, 1959, by a group of interested citizens. About \$1,000 was collected in a door to door campaign.

Civic organizations contributed another \$800 and \$2,500 was obtained from sale of timber and July 4 fund raising events.

All wood being used has been donated by area lumber companies. Cement blocks also have been donated.

When completed the building will have a main auditorium, kitchen, dining room and basement.

Being Furnished
The kitchen is being furnished with gifts awarded by trading stamp companies. Coupons offered by various food companies also are being collected.

Containers for stamp collection will be placed in local business stores. Stamps may also be mailed to Mrs. Jettie Hayes, star route, box 105, Eagle Point.

Mrs. Hayes said that envelopes for stamp collection will be circulated to area housewives shortly.

Anyone interested in donating time and labor for the building project should contact Harry Hanscom of Eagle Point, Mrs. Hayes said.

School Districts To Ask More Time

Salem—(UPI)—School district reorganization committees in 27 counties will ask the state board of education for six-month extensions in submitting partial reorganization plans when the board meets here next Tuesday.

At the same time the board will act on partial reorganization plans from Clackamas and Marion counties.

The Clackamas plan is the controversial Gladstone district. The Marion plan proposes to consolidate districts 24CJ, Salem; 3G, Popcorn; 50, Pratum; 113, Fruitland and 115C, Bethel.

Up for board approval also will be a report on the Oregon Pilot program for education of migrant children.
