Candidates' Parade

Editor's note: These are the first in a series of statements by candidates for congress from the fourth district, state legislative candidates, and candidates for county officials. Statements are either from the candidate personally, or a representative of the candidate with the candidate's approval.

(Today's statements are from Robert R. Van Leer, Eugene, campaign manager for Charles O. Porter, Democrat, who is seeking reelection to the fourth congressional district seat, and Dr. Edwin R. Durno, Medford, Republican seeking election to the seat.)



CHARLES O. PORTER

Congressman Charles O. Porter, Democrat, seeks reelection to congress for the fourth district on his record of effective work for the people of the district.

Porter believes that the Republican tight-money-high interest policy and its disastrous effect on the economy of the fourth district is one of the most important issues of the campaign.

Three times he voted for housing bills that were vetoed by President Eisenhower, bills that would have increased housing construction and made jobs and payroll for the lumber industry.

Porter has an effective record of getting appropriations for public works projects during his four years in office. In Jackson county the Talent Irrigation project is under construction with an ultimate expenditure of \$24 million. Screening of the Savage Rapids dam has been completed at a cost of \$200,000.

Elsewhere in the fourth district new ports have been built at Gold Beach and Brookings, jetties repaired or repairs planned at Coos Bay, Reedsport, and Florence. Six new dams have been built or are being built, including Green Peter, a \$64 million project.

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In Wire to Gunnar Ike Praises Nixon

Salem - (UPI) - President Eisenhower told Oregon GOP Chairman Peter Gunnar in a telegram today that as a man qualified for president, "Dick Nixon has the broadest and deepest preparation and experience of any man I know."

Detroit - (UPI) - United Auto Workers Union President Walter P. Reuther today expressed regret at the "implacable" nature of the UAW literature that was exploiting the religious issue in behalf of Sen. John F. Kennedy.

College Audience Hears Ted Kennedy

Ashland - Ted Kennedy, younger brother of Democratic Presidential candidate Sen. John F. Kennedy, told a Southern Oregon college audience this morning that "A tide is running. It is running strongly and it is running in favor of the Democrats."

Kennedy was in southern Oregon for a brief speaking engagement at SOC. He was 1 1/2 hours late for the engagement and blamed the tardiness on a late plane from San Francisco.

The younger Kennedy repeated his brother's charges that U.S. prestige is faltering. He pointed to such things as the President's cancelled trip to Japan and Vice President Nixon's poor reception in Central and South America two years ago as proof of this.

He said the U.S. has promoted an unintentional policy of "distort and confuse" toward people in other coun-

I am, by honest conviction and after years of interest in public affairs, a Republican. I wholeheartedly subscribe to the 1960 Republican platform as the program most likely to keep us a nation morally and economically strong and independent.

I am, however, a Republican third. I am first an American and second an Oregonian.

As a member of Congress, I shall put first things first, without regard to personal aggrandizement. I am not a professional politician. I was born on a farm near Albany, Ore., worked my way through the University of Oregon. I taught school in order to attend medical school. 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Washington - (UPI) - Vice President Richard M. Nixon's television adviser proposed today that the final Nixon-Kennedy TV debate Friday night be extended an hour to permit the candidates to answer telephone questions from viewers.

More Than 300 Die as Algeria Fighting Flares

Algiers, Algeria - (UPI) - The fiercest fighting in two years between French forces and Algerian Moslem rebels took more than 300 lives over the week end in the Aures Hills, it was reported today. French officials said 277 Moslems were killed. A private source reported about 40 French soldiers killed.

The heating up of the Algerian war followed appeals by the rebels to Communist China and Russia for more help to free the giant North African territory from France. The Soviet news agency Tass indicated today the Russians were responding to some extent. It reported the Soviet motorship Fat Fatezh was being sent with supplies for Algerians.

Rebel "Premier" Ferhat Abbas recently made a trip to Moscow and Peiping to ask for aid. In Tunis, Tunisian President Habib Bourguiba was quoted by a new French language newspaper "African Action" as saying the Soviet Union and Red China were likely to give massive aid to the Algerian rebels.

Medford Lawyer George M. Roberts presented the resolution for Lombard and Otto Frohnmayer, Medford lawyer, for Howard. Families of both men were present. The ceremonies were conducted before the opening of the fall term in circuit court. Retiring Jackson County Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna sat in the judge's chair beside Judge Main for the ceremony.

Roberts noted that the late Ben Lombard combined the "attributes of an honest, unimpeachable attorney" with those needed to be a successful attorney. "During his comparatively short practice Lombard earned the respect and universal trust from people of all walks of life here. He gave unstintingly of his time and service and exerted a tremendous influence. He lived up to every part of the lawyer's oath at great personal sacrifice to him and his family."

Both Judge Main and Judge Hanna said the late attorney was "a great credit to his community and profession."

As a preamble to Frohnmayer's resolution, Sam Harrison, Medford lawyer, close friend and neighbor to Howard, remarked that the late court reporter attracted people and their personal trust. Frohnmayer related how the late court reporter had been admitted to practice in South Dakota, had come here from Portland when well established there and became well known for his speed and accuracy in taking transcripts of testimony. Judge Hanna, close personal friend to the late court reporter, attempted to voice his sentiments, but could not and had to sit down. Speaking for Judge Hanna and himself, Judge Main said Howard was a close friend to both of them. "My life has been much better due to knowing Cliff," he added. "I'm also happy that Cliff's daughter, Carol, is continuing in his place as court reporter."

Amos Voorhies in Critical Condition

Grants Pass - (UPI) - Amos E. Voorhies, 61, president of the Courier Publishing Co., remained in critical condition at Josephine General hospital today after suffering a stroke at his home Friday.

Hospital attendants reported that Voorhies remained unconscious.

Evelyn Nye Joins in Statement on Report

Salem - (UPI) - Four members of the Legislative Interim Committee on Education said today the committee's report will include a statement from them that they are against the use of Oregon and California railroad land grant funds as an offset to the basic school support fund.

The four are State Reps. Nancy Kirkpatrick (D-Lebanon); Evelyn Nye (R-Medford); Tom Monaghan, (D-Milwaukie); and Al Flegel (D-Roseburg).

Spending Policies Of Hammarskjold Under Attack

Russia Levels 'Excess' Claims United Nations, N.Y. - (UPI) - Russia pressed its campaign against Secretary-general Dag Hammarskjold on the budgetary front today, accusing him of "extravagant spending" to support U.S. policies in the Congo and in Laos.

The Soviet attack on Hammarskjold's spending policies came in the administrative and budgetary committee while the secretary-general was defending the General Assembly in the UN for its policies in the Congo as responsible acts in a desperate emergency.

India, however, declared in the assembly that there is no alternative to the Congolese "running their affairs in their own way."

Soviet Delegate A. A. Roschin told the 99-nation fiscal committee Russia "categorically objects" to Hammarskjold's request for a \$67.5 million budget for 1961. He said the budget should be "stabilized" at about \$50 million.

Roschin said UN budgets had risen an "excessive" \$20 million since 1954. He charged that Hammarskjold had "followed the U.S. line" in organizing UN missions to such areas as Laos, Guinea and the Congo which were "political" rather than administrative.

Roschin reiterated Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's demand for a three-man presidium to replace Hammarskjold as the top executive of the United Nations.

Guy Applewhite Dies in Ashland

Ashland - Guy Applewhite, 68, of 112 Nob Hill st., Ashland, died Sunday at the Ashland General hospital. He was born Oct. 28, 1891, in Eugene, Ore., and had lived in Ashland since 1924.

Mr. Applewhite was active in community affairs having served as chairman of the selective service board in Ashland for 17 years and for a number of years was on the county welfare board. He was a member of the Ashland city council for 12 years.

A life member of the American Legion, Mr. Applewhite served as service officer for the Ashland post. He served in the U.S. Army during World War I. He was also a member of 40 & 8 and the Elks lodge.

He married Laura Lawrence in Eugene in April, 1918. Survivors include his wife, one son, Warren Applewhite, Ashland; three sisters, Mrs. Ethel Link, Ashland, Mrs. Mabel Purdy, Milwaukie, Ore., and Mrs. Hazel Stamm, Eugene, and one brother, Leonard Applewhite, Eureka, Kan.

Funeral arrangements will be announced by Litwiler's Funeral home, Ashland.

General Electric Employees Flock Back to Plant

Schenectady, N.Y. - (UPI) - Employees of the General Electric Co. home plant here flocked back to work today for the first time since Oct. 6.

The company said approximately 5,500, or 95 per cent, of its union workers on the first shift showed up and that it expected "almost normal" production today. The first shift employment totals about 6,000. About 3,000 other shift workers were expected to report for work later.

International Electrical Workers Local 301 sent its approximately 9,000 members into the plant in defiance of a strike by the international union.

About 100 pickets, half of them said to be from other striking locals including those in Pittsfield, Mass., and Syracuse, N.Y., tried to stop them.

Federal mediators met with both sides in New York City today and when the meeting broke up James B. Carey, international union president, said the return to work at Schenectady had "weakened" the union's bargaining position.

Lawyer's Sentencing Set This Afternoon

Sentencing of Medford Lawyer O. H. Bengtson for larceny by embezzlement was scheduled for 2 o'clock this afternoon in Jackson county circuit court.

Circuit Judge Orval Millard, Grants Pass, is expected to pronounce sentence.

Robert Boyer, Medford lawyer representing Bengtson, said there may be some action taken before the scheduled sentencing but did not say what he and Attorney Richard Carney, Portland, planned.

Bengtson was declared guilty Wednesday night unanimously by a Jackson county circuit court jury. He was charged specifically with taking \$3,701.14 from the Medford Excavator company. Deputy District Attorneys Gerald Scannell and Brian Mullan represented the state.

Oregon Court To Hear 19 Appeals

Salem - (UPI) - The Oregon Supreme court will hear 19 appeals at its three-day fall term session in Pendleton beginning Oct. 31.

One is the consolidated appeal of two Morrow county citizens who claim the school district reorganization law is unconstitutional. The citizens are Dewey West Jr., and Eileen Pedberg. A third appeal had been consolidated into the one hearing but this was withdrawn.

They contend the section of the law that provides reorganization of a district without a vote of the people is unconstitutional.

Progress Report Set on Air Pollution

Reports on progress made by local industry in helping to eliminate air pollution are expected Friday afternoon during a special meeting, County Judge Earl Miller said today.

He said letters have been sent to fruit, lumber and garbage disposal representatives to attend Friday's meeting and report what progress their industries or businesses have made.

Members of the Citizens Air Pollution Abatement League here have been invited also. T. M. Gerow Jr., district sanitary engineer, of the Oregon state sanitary authority, said this morning he plans to attend.

This morning, representatives of the fruit and lumber industries said they would have little progress to report since last spring's meeting with the county court and league members. Then, considerable progress was reported by both industries in reducing their contribution to air pollution.

Land-Fill Method A. B. Baitano, of the City Sanitary Service, local garbage disposal company, said this morning that his company is disposing of all residential garbage through the land-fill method in the White City area. Trash the public takes to the dump and refuse collected from the business district of Medford, which consists almost entirely of paper and cardboard, is burned here.

"We are extremely limited as to equipment for the land-fill method," Baitano said. "However, we are getting more and expect to do better."

Baitano noted that the Jacksonville area dump was closed in June due to fire hazard. He did not know whether it would be reopened. Burning of trash at this dump had caused considerable complaints from Jacksonville citizens.

The Oregonian Production Chief Shotgun Target

Donald Newhouse Said 'Satisfactory'

Portland - (UPI) - Donald I. Newhouse, 41, production chief manager of The Oregonian, was shot and wounded Sunday night by an unknown assailant who fired through a basement window of his home with a shotgun.

Newhouse, a cousin of newspaper owner Samuel I. Newhouse, was reported in "satisfactory" condition at a hospital here he underwent surgery for removal of shotgun pellets from his right hip.

A doctor said if the shot had struck a little higher it could have caused death.

Strike Link Unknown Police Chief William Hilbruner said it was too early to tell if the shooting was connected with an 11-month-old strike against The Oregonian and the Oregon Journal. "We'll know when we catch him," Hilbruner said.

Newhouse helped reorganize the production department of The Oregonian after the strike started last Nov. 10. Both newspapers have continued to publish and until last April published combined editions in The Oregonian plant.

Police said Newhouse was working in his basement workshop. They said the gunman apparently climbed through shrubbery at the back of the house, located in the West Hills area of Portland, and fired through a window from a position about six feet above Newhouse.

Newhouse's wife, Lee, said she was on the second floor of the home putting their five children to bed. "I heard a loud pop, and explosion, and I thought the TV tube had blown up."

She said she went downstairs calling her husband's name and heard him say "Quick." "... I found him collapsed and bleeding. All he could say was 'I don't know how it could have happened.'"

Mrs. Wallace Hagedast, a nurse who was in the house at the time, applied artificial respiration while Mrs. Newhouse went next door to the home of a doctor, Arnold Rustin.

State Police Jail Man for Burglary

Richard Allen Brown, alias Richard Allen Carr, 20, of Sacramento, Calif., is being held in the Jackson county jail on suspicion of taking \$300 in cash Tuesday afternoon from Stan's Market here.

State police said Brown is also wanted in California on forgery and bad check charges.

The robbery was reported by Mrs. Stanley Straus, wife of the owner of the store at Crater Lake highway and Sams Valley highway junction. She said apparently a male customer had taken the money from the store cash register while she was filling his car with gas. Mrs. Straus' description matches that of Brown, state police said.
