Long Ball Pays Off For Chicago Bears

Chicago — (UPI) — The so-called "long ball" made its appearance in a professional football game between San Francisco and Chicago Sunday — and it knocked the Forty Niners out of a first place tie in the National League.

The Forty Niners kept possession of the ball during nearly two-thirds of the game, but during the other third the Bears just ran . . . and ran . . . and ran. The final score was Chicago 27, San Francisco 10.

Chicago scored four touchdowns — and the shortest one came on a 37-yard run by Johnny Morris. Earlier, Morris rambled 61 yards to score, and J. C. Caroline romped 59 yards to the end zone after recovering a fumble.

The Bears put the frosting on the cake in the third period with a 92-yard scoring

play on a pass from quarterback Ed Brown to Bill Deweave.

The Forty Niners completely dominated the statistics in their battle with the "Monsters of the Midway" — but the NFL doesn't pay off on statistics.

San Francisco controlled the ball for 85 offensive plays, to 35 for the Bears. The Forty Niners also dominated the following statistics: first downs, 23-6; first downs rushing, 14-4; first downs passing, 7-2; total yards gained, 298-231; net yards gained rushing, 229-150. Chicago held a slight edge on net yards gained passing, 81-69.

Second Half Rally
Ralph Guglielmi, playing despite a virus condition which clogged his throat with phlegm, recovered from a wretched first half and completed 13 out of 16 passes during the final half as Washington rallied to tie the Giants before a crowd of 60,625 in New York.

Guglielmi's passes spared two last-period touchdowns drives, his last aerial sailing 21 yards into the arms of Jim Podoley in the end zone with 25 seconds left on the clock. The Skins got the break for the final TD when New York's Jimmy Patton fumbled an on-side kick and lineman Vince Promuto recovered with two minutes left to play.

Lennie Moore, an "old" hero, ran for three touchdowns and caught a 22-yard pass from Johnny Unitas for another score in Baltimore's victory before 57,808 home fans. Two of Moore's TDs were on 57 and 34-yard runs from scrimmage.

The touchdown pass continued Unitas' record string through 41 games. The setback was the 12th in a row for Los Angeles, dating back to last season.

J. C. Caroline romped 57 yards with a recovered fumble and Johnny Morris bolted 61 and 37 yards from scrimmage for touchdowns that sent the Bears on to victory over the Forty Niners before 48,226 at Chicago. Bill Deweave completed the Chicago scoring by running 74 yards with a 91-yard scoring pass from Ed Brown.

Hickey Blasts Defense
Coach George Halas of the Bears praised his defensive unit for the best work of the season and Red Hickey of San Francisco blasted his defenders for "giving the game away."

Norm Van Brocklin threw two touchdown passes and set up another score with his tosses in the Eagles' home win before 38,065, and the Steelers beat off the Cards' 14-point final quarter and clinched victory on a 51-yard scoring pass from Tom Tracey to Jimmy Orr before 22,971 at Pittsburgh.

Richards Chosen Manager of Year

New York — (UPI) — Paul Richards, whose Baltimore Orioles electrified the baseball world with a spectacular bid for the pennant, today was named the American League's "manager of the year" for 1960 by the United Press International.

Richards received 14 votes of a possible 24 from UPI's board of baseball experts, made up of writers in each of the eight American league cities.

Cookie Lavagetto, who led the Washington Senators to a fifth place finish, was runner-up to Richards in the balloting with seven votes, while Casey Stengel of the pennant-winning New York Yankees received three votes.

Under Richards' leadership, the Orioles wound up in second place with an 89-65 record for their highest finish since returning to the American league in 1954.

The 51-year-old Richards had the Orioles in first place as late as Sept. 9.
