

USC Scores Come From Behind Win

Los Angeles - (UPI) - Touchdown jaunts of 63 and 42 yards by fullback Hal Tobin and halfback Lynn Gaskill brought University of Southern California a come from behind 27-10 victory Saturday over winless California.

Tobin, a sophomore fullback from Coronado, Calif., broke loose from Southern Cal's 37 to go all the way in the third period and overcome a 10-7 California lead for his longest run on an afternoon in which he dominated the ground game with a total of 145 yards.

Southern California tried hard to give away the game in the first three periods with six fumbles, losing the ball to the Bears three times.

Southern Cal scored in the second period on a drive of 52 yards, with Gaskill spurring the final three yards through center.

But the Bears on the ensuing kickoff marched 70 yards on a mixture of Gold's passes and Jerry Scattini's running. George Plerovich went over from the two.

In the third period the Bears went to the Trojan five, and sub quarterback Jim Ferguson kicked a 22-yard field goal for the brief Cal lead.

Bill Krause Nabs Race

Riverside, Calif. - (UPI) - Billy Krause, a 27-year-old Long Beach, Calif., machinist overshadowed in the pre-race picks by a dazzling international field, won the \$26,000 Sports Car Grand Prix easily Sunday in a car he never driven before.

It was Krause's first race in the feather-light, birdage Maserati, but he handled it like it was part of him to break the track record on route to victory, worth \$8,500. His time for the 203-mile race was 2:13.10, bettering the course record set last year by 3.35.

Two Lotus Monte Carlos - driven by top qualifier Dan Guerny of Riverside and England's Stirling Moss - were the favorites with the crowd of 80,000 that witnessed the Los Angeles Times-Mirror sponsored races. But they both dropped out in the first quarter of the 62-lap race because of mechanical difficulty.

"I saw the two Lotus start smoking and my Maserati was running like a watch," said Krause, who averaged 91.5 miles an hour. "And I knew I had it in the bag."

Owls Nip Raiders 21-19 in OCC Mix

Ashland - A 38-yard pass Roy Johnson to Artes Palmero, produced the winning touchdown Saturday night as Oregon Technical Institute overtook Southern Oregon 21 to 19 at Klamath Falls and assumed lone undefeated football leadership in the Oregon Collegiate conference.

The pass came with 4 minutes left on the clock to make it 20 to 19. Dick Olivass added the extra point. On the deciding touchdown, Palmero got behind the defensive Raider back who partially deflected the ball. The Owl wingman, nevertheless, managed control of the elusive pigskin.

Southern Oregon still had chances to try and score but two fumbles, one a scrimmage play and on a punt, spoiled the opportunities. After the second muff and OTI recovery, the Owls ran the clock out in the vicinity of the Raider 30-yard line.

No Less Than Tie
Also on Saturday Portland State downed Oregon College 14 to 6. This helped OTI to its lone unmarred OCC status and assurance of no less than a tie for the mantle.

OCC and SOC are knotted for second and this Saturday these two teams will clash in the OCC homecoming game at Monmouth.

OTI's defense spelled out most of the win for the Owls. They contained the Raider offense to only 194 total yards. SOC had been averaging 311 yards per game. The Owls racked up 190 yards passing and 100 yards rushing in their own cause for a 200 total.

Both teams went scoreless through the first stanza before Ore Tech finally drew first blood on a 43-yard aerial from Johnson to Palmero, their first of the evening.

Olivass converted and the clock showed 13:09 remaining in the second quarter. SOC immediately got its own scoring drive under way going all the way from the OTI 45 yard line. Eldon Francis and Al Barnes did most of the carrying for the Raiders but two passes from Doug Olsen to Howard Hartman finished the drive.

Olsen spotted Hartman in the middle of the end zone from five yards out and hit him with a short lob for the score.

The kick failed. The score stood 7 to 6 at halftime before SOC came back to take the lead for the first time on a 43-yard sweep by Doyle Bransom. On a pitchout from Olsen, Bransom headed for the left corner and down the sidelines for the score.

Again the conversion kick failed but the Raiders had a 12 to 7 lead with 14:04 remaining in the third period. Fifty-five seconds later Oregon Tech bounced back to go on top 14 to 12 on a pass from Johnson to Ardell Hamilton that carried 25 yards for the score.

Olivass' kick was good for the extra point.

Southern Oregon finished its scoring in the same when Gordy Carrigan returned an Owl punt 79 yards to the OTI one foot line. On the first play from scrimmage, Olsen dived into the end zone.

Lynn Knight's conversion boot was good and SOC had a 19 to 14 gap with six minutes remaining in the third quarter.

It was touch and go from that point on for both teams as the Owls struck for the Raider goal line, and SOC fought to contain the Tech men.

Winning touchdown play was a fourth down and four yards to go for the first down situation which saw OTI go beyond the first down mark on their way to the end zone.

Dismissal Of Damage Suit Voted

Portland - (UPI) - The Portland baseball club's board of directors has voted to dismiss a \$1.8 million damage suit against the major leagues.

G. A. (Arch) Kingsley, president of the club, made the announcement Saturday.

The dismissal vote was taken despite the failure of Commissioner Ford Frick of the major leagues to take immediate action on a compromise measure of \$42,500 sought by the Beavers.

The suit, which charged the major leagues with a monopoly, was filed in 1959. Portland lost two Federal Court decisions since the suit was filed.

Kingsley said the Beavers plan to take steps toward establishment of a working agreement with a major league club for player assistance.

SO Loop Officials Against Proposal To Shift Tourney

A motion instructing Secretary Lee Ragsdale, Medford, to write a letter to the Oregon School Activities association "emphatically opposing" any move of the state Class A-1 high school basketball tournament to Portland was passed Saturday at the fall meeting of the Southern Oregon conference.

There is a bid to shift the tourney to the Portland exposition-recreation center.

Representatives of Klamath Union, Crater, Ashland, Grants Pass and Medford High schools did not state a reason in discussion on the motion. It is believed, however, that the primary reason is the difficulty it is felt would be encountered in supervising and controlling large groups of students attending a tourney in a town as large as Portland.

School representatives also decided to hold their meeting next spring in the evening and, at that time, to schedule all sports events for a year ahead. President Lester Harris, Medford principal, is to appoint a committee to

draw up schedules for approval. The group set Friday afternoon, Oct. 28, at Ashland as time and place for the A-1 district cross country meet. Each school will be limited to seven runners.

Willamette Wallops CI

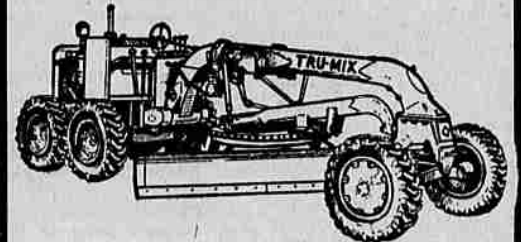
