Morse Urges UN To Seat Red China

Washington — (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) said Sunday the United Nations should seat Red China before "Chiang Kai-Shek and the Red Chinese pull the world into a Communist blood bath."

"I urge my country to stop supporting a dictator who has seized these islands and has used the U.S. Seventh Fleet to back him up," Morse said.

Morse said the United States should indicate to the U.N. that it should open negotiations with Red China about being admitted to the international body.

Morse said Chiang cannot claim the islands of Quemoy and Matsu — only a few miles off the Red China mainland — because, according to international law, they have been the property of the mainland for centuries.

"Red China could be a nuclear power in the next few years," Morse said, "and before this happens, the U.N. will have to stop them and their trend toward war."

Vice President Richard M. Nixon:

(To reporters at Hartford, Conn.): "My idea would be to appoint (to the Cabinet) the best persons without regard to race, creed or color. We must not have preconceived predictions as to who would be or not be in the cabinet. . . . We are not making any commitments on Cabinet posts now. . . . We want to find people of great ability for all segments of the population."

"And in the international and security fields, we had just met Sunday with vice presidential nominee Henry Cabot Lodge agreed we must have the best qualified men from all segments of our national life without regard to party. . . . We feel the best men must come to the top regardless of party background, race, creed or color."

"In the fields of international affairs and national security, we will appoint the best men to the extent we can get them."

reveals Nixon's "special ability to stand on almost every side of every issue."

He conceded Red China might eventually be voted United Nations membership "but not with our agreement, if . . . their official policy" continues to be the inevitability of war.

"Unless we make a stronger effort, we're not going to be ahead of Russia militarily in 1962 and 1963."

"There are very important election issues, but I don't think this (religion) is one of them."

SEA CAPTAIN DEFECTS

Guayaquil, Ecuador — (UPI) — Luis Morse Delgado, skipper of the Cuban freighter Havana, defected Sunday saying he did not want to live under the "tyrannical" regime of Premier Fidel Castro. His family already had fled from Cuba to Miami, Fla., to seek political asylum.

Sen. John F. Kennedy:

(Campaign speeches in Delaware and New Jersey and on national TV interview): "Unless he (Nixon) wants to continue discussing the defense of Quemoy-Matsu . . . I'm prepared to move on to other issues. I do not want the Chinese Communists to think Americans are divided. And I would not want to endanger bipartisanship in foreign policy."

"The rainbow-like spectrum of his (Nixon's) political beliefs defies description either in color or in breadth." The conflicting position, he said Nixon has taken, on defense of Quemoy and Matsu

Wall Street Chatter

New York — (UPI) — The Value Line Investment Survey reports that the "ready-mix" cocktails, so profitable for the big food processors, could conceivably undermine the profit margins of the major distillery companies.

Value Line thinks the distillers, with huge investment in plants and in brand loyalty, would find it costly to enter this market if the ready-mix takes hold in a big way.

Moreover, in doing so, they may run the risk of undermining the foundation behind the rest of their product lines, the survey reports.

B. K. Thurlow of Winslow, Co. & Stetson still feels that most stocks will continue to improve between now and election day and that strength should be used to sell steels, chemicals, aluminum, electronics, papers and other poorly acting issues. These should be reinvested, he says, in defensive stocks—oil, aircraft, motion pictures and other special situations.

What will the speculative gold shares do in response to election results? Eldon Grimm of Walston & Co. says a Kennedy victory might cause a greater outflow of gold due to expected lower interest rates here, and golds should rally. If Nixon wins, he says, golds may fall for a time.

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TV Quiz Show Idols Held on Perjury Charges

New York — (UPI) — Fourteen former TV quiz show idols, including Charles Van Doren and Elfrida Von Nardoff, were arrested today on perjury charges in connection with testimony before a grand jury investigating big money quiz show rigging.

The former contestants—nine men and five women connected with the defunct NBC-TV shows "Twenty-One" and "Tic Tac Dough"—trooped to the district attorney's office this morning to surrender on second degree perjury charges stemming from a grand jury information. Six more winners were expected to surrender later today or early this week.

Record Winner

Hank Bloomgarden, a medical research consultant who won \$98,500 on "Twenty-One," was one of the first to surrender. Van Doren, who became a national celebrity as a result of his TV appear-

ances, won \$129,000 on the same show. Miss Von Nardoff was the record quiz show winner with a take of \$220,500 on "Twenty-One."

Van Doren revealed his part in the quiz show conspiracy in soul-searching testimony before a congressional investigating committee Nov. 2, 1959. He admitted he lied to

the grand jury when he testified he had not received help, and as a result he lost his assistant professorship at Columbia University and a \$50,000-a-year job given him by NBC after his TV appearances.

Miss Von Nardoff maintained throughout the investigations that she had never been fed information.

Bloomgarden was reported to have denied receiving aid but later made "substantial changes" in his testimony, according to the prosecutor's office.

Local Couple Escapes Injury in Accident

Olympia, Wash. — (UPI) — A Medford couple and their infant daughter escaped serious injury Friday when their automobile and house trailer flipped over and burst into flames on U.S. Highway 99 near here.

Brent H. Carter, 24, a student at Oregon State college, told Washington State Patrol officers the 30-foot trailer started to sway as he was driving south on the freeway just south of Olympia. The trailer suddenly hit a light standard and both the car and trailer flipped over on their sides on the roadway.

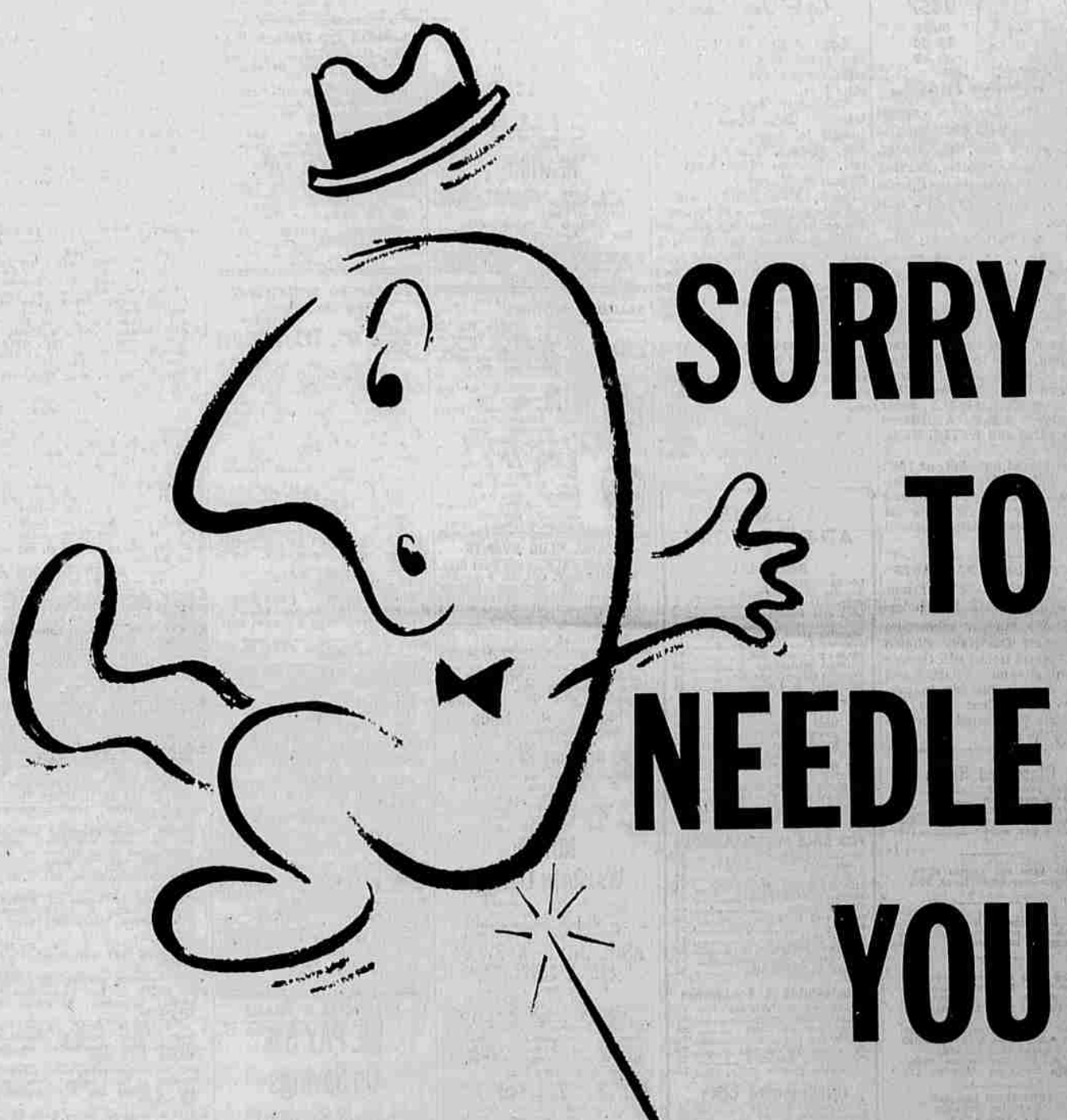
