

## Expenditures Outlined by Gold Hill Superintendent of Public Schools

Gold Hill - Charles A. Meyer, superintendent of District 8 schools was guest speaker at the October meeting of the Gold Hill PTA. The session conducted by Mrs. Jerry Herington, president of the unit, was held in the recently completed multi-purpose room at Patrick Elementary school on Second ave.

The superintendent said that in spite of some criticism nationwide that schools are building marble palaces with a tremendous amount of unnecessary expenditures he does not believe that school District 8 is guilty of needless spending. He explained to the group that the additional classrooms and multi-purpose building cost \$122,031. This he added is a cost of \$10.10 per square foot which was considered by officials of the district to be an excellent bid.

Additional Uses

He told of extended uses of the multi-purpose room. The cafeteria tables are collapsible and mobile so that the room may be used for eating. The tables may be removed and the room used for various educational purposes, meetings, physical education classes and eventually basketball games when money is available for backboards and baskets. The floor is laid out for basketball, volleyball, badminton and shuffle board.

Also included in the bid is a rolled-window for the serving area to isolate the kitchen. This equipment is expected to arrive soon.

To place all the necessary stage curtains that will add to the appearance of the room, the cost will be over \$1,000. He said that it is hoped funds will be available out of the bond money for the curtains.

He said the cost of roll-away bleachers would be about \$1,500 for three sixteen foot sections, three rows high.

He referred to the growth in the district in the past two years. On Sept. 30, 1958 there were 2,177 students enrolled in District 8 schools, 2,312 students were enrolled on Sept. 30, 1959 and on Sept. 30, 1960 there was an enrollment of 2,441 pupils in District 8 schools. This is a 5.3 per cent increase, the superintendent said.

He said that proportionately Gold Hill schools had the highest increase of any school in the district this year. Enrollment over a three year period in Gold Hill was 278 in 1958, 289 in 1959 and 318 in 1960. School officials are now in the process of taking the annual school census, he said. This is demanded by the law and includes ages four to 19 years.

Meyer said that it is impossible to predict the area of students that will increase the most. Grade three at Patrick Elementary school in Gold Hill this year was an example of concentration of students. It is always necessary to investigate to see whether the jump is due to temporary fruit workers or students who will

remain for the entire year. The study here showed at least for the present that the group here is permanent.

The present budget includes almost \$100,000 for transportation, he said. This amount of money makes this section of the school budget in District 8 big business. Sixty-five per cent of students in District 8 ride buses and this means 1,600,000 student miles in 180 school days. He stressed the importance of students bringing a note from parents when any change is necessary.

The superintendent said the transportation system needs a great deal of cooperation from parents in getting fewer stops. He said that it is getting almost to the point where the bus driver is expected to stop at every home. This he added is expensive and time consuming. School officials are questioning why it is necessary for so many stops in the rural areas, when many students who reside in town walk as much as a mile distance to school.
