**Ted Kennedy Demo Candidate's Brother Points to Surplus of Foods**

He also pointed to the \$9 billion federal food surplus, which, he said, "is rotting," while people in West Virginia do not have enough to eat. The present administration has failed to come up with imaginative ideas and progressive programs on what to do with these surpluses, he said.

His brother believes, he said, that the President should have the power to send some of the surpluses to East European countries to help the people who need help.

Kennedy also alleged that the U.S. is pricing itself out of world markets, and pointed to the plywood situation in Oregon as an example of this. Yet, he said, the government continues to follow the same policies.

**Have to do Better**

"Yes, we are doing well," he, "but we have to do better."

The "real alternative" between the Republican and Democratic positions, he said, is whether we are doing well enough now or whether we should do better.

On the Quemoy-Matsu island question, Kennedy said Nixon has "retreated" to the administration's views that Quemoy and Matsu should be defended only if an attack comes as part of a general attack on Formosa. He said this is also the position of his brother.

Kennedy concluded his talk by stating: "You can be sure that when he (Kennedy) is elected he will have the kind of administration that is going to respond to the problems of the 60's."

One of the several warm rounds of applause received by Kennedy came when a member of the audience asked him: "What kind of influence will the Knights of Columbus have?" Without hesitation, Kennedy said "none" and the several hundred persons in the audience made known their approval by breaking into spontaneous applause.

**3,000 Die in East Pakistan Cyclone**

Calcutta, India —UPI— More than 3,000 persons perished in the cyclone and tidal wave that ravaged nearby coastal areas of east Pakistan and offshore islands last Monday, according to reports reaching here today.

The reports said the exact death toll may never be known because many of the dead were washed out to sea while others were buried under tons of mud and debris. Numerous fishing boats were reported missing.

Extensive damage also was reported to homes and property. Hard hit were the islands of Rangamati, Kutubdia, Sandip and Hatliya in the Bay of Bengal near Chittagong.
