

Casey Stengel Has Few Places To Turn

New York — (UPI) — Halph Hook is "in" as the Yankees' new manager but Casey Stengel may be shut out as a baseball pilot at least until 1962.

Those are the clear indications today in the wake of the Yankees' dismissal of the 70-year-old Stengel who had led them to seven world championships and 10 American League pennants in the last 12 years.

Yankee president Dan Topping is expected to follow up today or Thursday with the announcement of a new front-office setup which will oust 66-year-old general manager George Weiss in favor of younger blood and officially install 41-year-old Hook in Stengel's old post.

Want Younger Blood

All the changes are understood to be solely dictated by a basic agreement between Topping and co-owner Del

Webb to install younger men in the key positions. The team of Weiss and Stengel was the most successful in the history of baseball.

The announcement that Hook, never more than a part-time player but always recognized for his talents of leadership, will succeed Stengel is expected to be made Thursday. Details of the new front-office setup, which probably will have Roy Hamey and Jack White dividing Weiss' duties, may be held off a little longer.

Stengel, meanwhile, found that his dismissal by the Yankees left him with surprisingly few places to turn if he wishes to embark on a managerial career with a new club. Circumstances indicated that there just may be no place as a manager, at least in 1961, for the most successful manager in the game's annals.

Has No Offers

The San Francisco Giants, Chicago Cubs and Detroit Tigers are the only teams who have yet to sign managers for next year and there was no firm offer from any one of them. That led to speculation that Casey may not be able to return as a manager until 1962 when the promised expansion of both leagues will create at least four new openings.

But even there Stengel seemed to be met with great deference and respect — and lukewarm enthusiasm.

Independently wealthy, Stengel certainly does not have to work but he made it clear Tuesday that he had hoped to continue as manager of the Yankees next season and, by inference, wanted to remain in baseball somewhere. He was deeply hurt by his dismissal.

Last Week Of General Deer Hunt

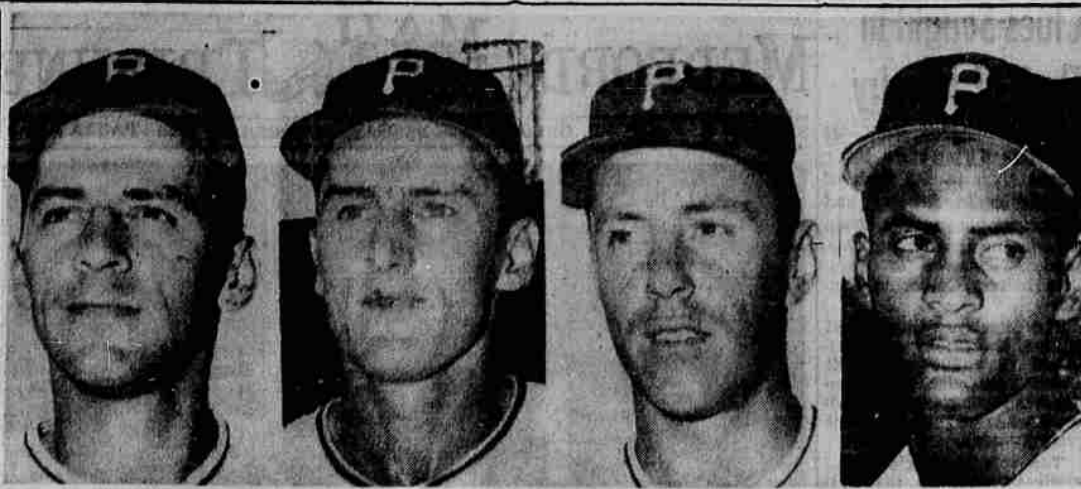
Limited Chance

After this week end, unsuccessful hunters still have a limited chance of taking deer in several extended deer areas. Five areas will be available for unused deer tag holders in portions of the Rogue valley, Umpqua valley, Willamette valley, McKenzie unit, and portions of the Hood River and Wasco areas. A late season hunt will also be held along the White river, but this hunt is available for hunters holding Wasco unit permits and unused deer tags.

Hunters are urged to check the big game synopsis for the dates of these late season hunts and the open area boundaries. Most of these extended hunts will be held on several week ends in November, with two areas extending into December.

Pirates, Braves Each Have Four on National All-Star

New York — (UPI) — The world champion Pittsburgh Pirates and the Milwaukee Braves placed four players each on the 1960 National League All-Star team named today by the United Press International.

Second baseman Bill Mazeroski, shortstop Dick Groat, outfielder Roberto Clemente and pitcher Vern Law were the Pirates honored while catcher Del Crandall, third baseman Ed Matthews, outfielder Hank Aaron and pitcher Warren Spahn were the Braves selected on the squad

of eight regulars and two pitchers.

First baseman Norm Larker of the Los Angeles Dodgers and center fielder Willie Mays of the San Francisco Giants were the other players picked by the UPI's 24-man board of experts composed of three writers or radio broadcasters from each city in the league.

Beats Out Banks

The closest race was a shortstop where Groat, who won the NL batting crown with a .325 mark, beat out Chicago Cub shortstop Ernie Banks by a 13-11. The vote also was close at first base where Lark-

er won the batting race, beat out Joe Adcock of the Braves, 12 votes to 9.

Aaron and Mays were unanimous choices for outfield positions and Mazeroski, the Pirates' World Series hero, received all but one vote in the balloting for second baseman.

The only pitchers besides Law and Spahn to receive votes were Ernie Broglio, who won 21 games, and Lindy McDaniel, star relief hurler, both of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Stengel No 3 On Giant List

San Francisco — (UPI) — Casey Stengel is No. 3 on the list of managerial prospects for the San Francisco Giants, President Horace Stoneham said today.

Stoneham, returning from a meeting of the National Association of Inter-collegiate Athletics (NAIA) football this week, but Southern Illinois University moved closer from its second position.

Both teams have 5-0 marks, but Southern Illinois' decisive 52-8 victory over Eastern Illinois last week pulled the second-ranked team within 15 points of Lehigh Rhyme in the balloting.

Lehigh Rhyme received 261 points in the poll, while Southern Illinois had 246.

Humboldt State of California, also with a 5-0 record, moved up one notch into third place this week, and Southeast Louisiana State moved up two places into fourth.

Whitworth of Washington retained its No. 5 ranking, and last year's NAIA champion, Texas A&M, was in sixth place. Florida A&M moved up six places into seventh, with Idaho State eighth, Willamette of Oregon ninth and Langston of Oklahoma tenth.

Casey's Hands

New York — (UPI) — They all hated to use the word "fired." Dan Topping, the usually urbane president of the New York Yankees, was obviously embarrassed, Casey Stengel stood there grim, solemn and unsmiling.

So it took them a long time to get around to the unvarnished fact that the man who had won 10 pennants and seven world championships in 12 years actually had the can tied to him.

Topping read a prepared statement which gilded the lily they were placing in

Casey's hands. He said that Casey "reluctantly" signed a two-year contract two years ago; they hoped he'd get into the Hall of Fame swiftly and that he was getting a \$160,000 "bonus."

Casey Flares Up

It took the usually garrulous Stengel a long time to get into conversational gear. But then, gruffly and with a white heat flaring in his voice, he laid it on the line:

"I was told that my services would not be desired any longer."

He rambled on and he answered a host of questions and it became obvious that Casey might have been permitted to stay on as a figurehead manager.

"If I had stayed, I'd have wanted a two-year contract," he said. "I wanted to stay managing. But I told them if I wouldn't have 100 per cent control I wouldn't stay. They wanted me out for a new and younger system. That's the best excuse they have."

The voice dripped with acid.

"Was I fired? I'll draw you a picture. They wanted to make changes. They knew my work was fairly good. They were satisfied with the return financially. But I don't own the club. Maybe I'd have had the same feeling as Topping if I owned the club."

Has No Plans

Where does he go from here, this 70-year-old man who has spent his life in baseball?

"I have no plans," Casey grunted. "But Mrs. Stengel thinks I'm a good manager. Certainly I've lasted longer with her than I did with the Yankees."

Would he consider managing the embryo New York team in the National league?

"I never talk about a job until it's offered to me," he shot back.

Bob Tichenal Coach of Week

San Francisco — (UPI) — He coaches pro-type football at an amateur-type college. He recruits some of his football players from the track and field team.

And he claims he's "lucky" to have playing for him the "world's smallest fullback."

He's Bob (Titch) Tichenal, head coach of San Jose State college, named by United Press International today as college football's "coach of the week."

Tichenal's crew, a two-touchdown underdog, wrecked Stanford, 34-20, Saturday, and the Spartan rooters were so happy about it all that they engaged in a 45-minute free-for-all riot with the "enemies" from Stanford.

While the coach didn't approve of the riot, he thinks spirit is important in any good athletic team. And he thinks style is just as important.

"I believe in suiting the style of the type of players," says Tichenal, 43, a tall, blond collar-ad type who played pro football for the Washington Redskins, San Francisco Forty Niners and Los Angeles Dons. "This year I happen to have a lot of speed, so we are using the pro-type spread T-formation."
