### Clothing Campaign Continues

Mrs. Wayne Troxell reminds valley residents that the clothing drive for overseas relief is being carried on this month, and will close October 24. Those having warm clothing are asked to package the garments securely in medium or small cartons and the well for overseas shipment. The name and address of the donor church are to be on the tag. Each church is asked to provide the 8 cents per pound required for shipping charges.

It is stated that the materials are to be sent where the need is greatest. Needed clothing for women and children, men and boys. Shoes will also be sent this year and hats of felt may be rolled and placed in packages being packed. Household needs include quilts, sheets, pillow cases, towels and wash cloths. Sewing materials are also desirable, as well as yard goods and knitting wools. Infants' garments are to be included.

Materials donated should be in good repair and have at least six months wear in them, states Mrs. Troxell. She also again announces that packages are to be left at either the First Methodist church or the First Christian church for truck pickup. The truck will come from Church World Service located at Medford, Calif.

### Boiler Equipment Should Be Cleaned Before Winter Rest

New York - EPA - Whatever you broiled the steaks and hot dogs on this summer should be put away clean for next year.

June Woods of the Home Service Department of Oakite Products, Inc., offered the following advice for cleaning off a summer's accumulation of grease and ashes.

Disassemble the grill, roaster or whatever, and soak in water with a low sudsing household detergent to cut the grease. Scrub with brushes, steel wool, scouring powder, or wire brushes as needed - using soft brushes or cloths only on scratchable surfaces.

Rinse in hot water, dry thoroughly, oil screws and moving parts, put a light coating of oil over the entire cooker, reassemble and wrap in newspapers for storage.

The light oil coating will protect against rust and can be washed off easily when cook-out time returns.

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
