Holmes helped to form the present partnership and has helped build an active and successful practice, not limited to a specialized field. He has thus become familiar with all facets of the law, an indispensable aid in the advisory duties of county government.

**Second Term**  
He is presently serving his second term as municipal judge of the city of Medford, a member of the Oregon State Bar, American Bar association and the American Judicature Society. He has served as first vice president, treasurer and secretary of the Jackson County Bar association.

Holmes is a veteran of World War II, having served both in the Merchant Marine and the Army and resides at 33 North Berkeley way, Medford, with his wife, Rowan, and two daughters, Amy and Laura Jane. He is a member of St. Peter's Lutheran church and has been active in community affairs, including United Medford Crusade and Medford Jaycees.

With foresight and experience, Holmes has formulated a platform and pledges to change present office policies in an effort to accomplish the following results:

1. To maintain a full-time staff devoted to the duties of this office and to maintain office hours commensurate with the opening and closing of the Jackson county court house.

2. To cooperate with state and county agencies, particularly the Oregon state and Jackson county public welfare departments and the state board of control in an effort to reduce the relative and child support burden now being carried as part of your tax load.

6. To work closely with the county court and sheriff's office in an effort to establish work programs for county prisoners in an effort to clean up unsightly areas in the county, including Bear creek.

7. To personally discontinue a private law practice, which presently utilizes secretarial services and supplies paid for by your tax dollar.
