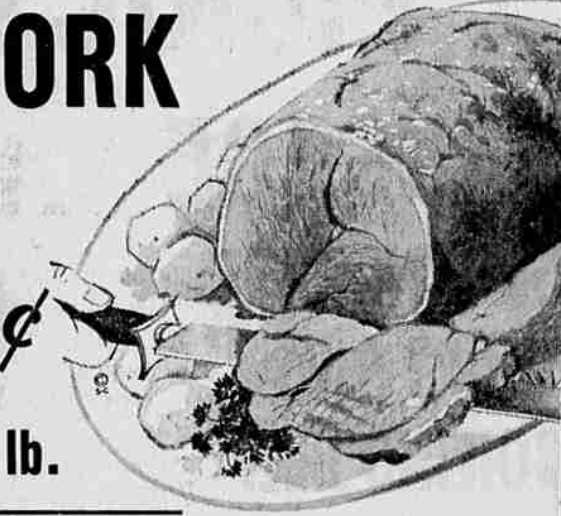

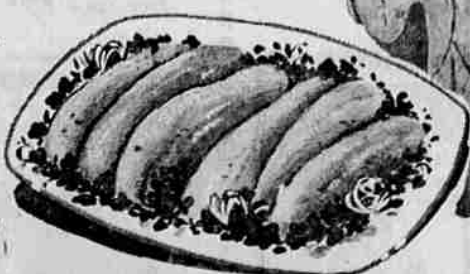

Kennedy Slackens Campaign Pace To Plan for Debate

New York—(UPI)—Sen. John F. Kennedy, cheered by four days of intensive stumping from New York to Florida, slackened his campaign pace today to prepare for his fourth "great debate" Friday night with Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Both candidates were here in the nation's biggest city only a few blocks apart, and a running controversy continued to swirl around Kennedy's repeated demand for a fifth debate with the GOP nominee shortly before election day.

At the same time, a fresh row between the two boiled up over Nixon's statement charging Kennedy with misstatements and inaccuracies in campaign speeches.

Kennedy's press chief, Pierre Salinger, said the Democratic candidate would have a specific and detailed reply to each of Nixon's charges today.

Kennedy received a tumultuous welcome on his ticker tape parade through lower Manhattan Wednesday despite unfriendly weather. Jubilant Democrats called it the biggest crowd in the city's history, although police declined to set any specific crowd figures.

A gloomy, heavy rain drenched New York during the day but Kennedy continued with an outdoor speech at City Hall Plaza and also drew large crowds at a rally in nearby Yonkers. He topped off the day with appearances before labor union leaders at a downtown labor hall and at the local headquarters of "Volunteers for Kennedy-Johnson."

Kennedy's schedule today was open but still flexible, and he added a two-hour motorcade of the Brooklyn area early this evening to his previous program.

Following the motorcade Kennedy will make a brief appearance at a testimonial dinner for John T. (Pat) Clancy, borough president of Queens.

The youthful Massachusetts senator planned to spend most of the day conferring with aides and strategists on tactics for his fourth televised encounter with Nixon.

Nixon Plans To Tell Program for Nation's Economy

New York—(UPI)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon planned to spell out his program for advancing the nation's economy today in a speech billed by his aides as "one of the major" addresses of his White House campaign.

The Republican presidential candidate scheduled an appearance before the National Association of Business Economists here to expand upon his plans to maintain what he has called "unprecedented prosperity" under the Eisenhower administration.

The speaking date was announced after Nixon arrived here Wednesday to prepare for his fourth and probably final television-radio debate with his Democratic opponent, Sen. John F. Kennedy, Friday at 6 p.m. (PST).

Nixon and Kennedy shared the speaker's platform for the first time outside these debates when both appeared Wednesday night at a dinner honoring the memory of Alfred E. Smith, Democratic candidate for president in 1928. Smith was the only Roman Catholic ever to win nomination for the presidency until the Democrats selected Kennedy this year.

Nixon, who has taken the gloves off in his recent attacks on Kennedy, put them back on by concentrating on the virtues of faith and good will in his after-dinner speech. But earlier, he issued a long statement replying to what he denounced as 13 points of "misstatements and distortions" by Kennedy.

The GOP nominee's own points basically were repetitions of prior statements on issues including economic growth, power development, farm progress, federal aid to education, natural resources, defense spending, health programs, civil rights, housing, minimum wage, medical care for the aged, and interest in Latin America. In each case he cited Kennedy's alleged "misstatement" and then offered "the facts."

Nixon particularly challenged Kennedy on one aspect of their feud over how far to go in defending the Nationalist-held islands of Quemoy and Matsu several miles from the Communist-held mainland of China.
