

# Failure of Economy To Boom Effects Corporate Executives

New York—The failure of the economy to live up to its "boom" expectations apparently has had adverse effects on the corporate executive market.



A survey by Executive Manpower Corp. showed there would be an average of 2.2 jobs per company paying from \$10,000 to \$75,000 during the coming six months, a slight drop from an average of 2.5 such jobs tabulated in an earlier survey this year, and well below the 3.5 executive job openings listed a year ago.

But while there may be fewer executive positions available, the increased competition for business which our current standstill economy brings about has intensified the search for "top" executive talent.

This, in turn, means that anyone lucky enough to land an executive job the next six months most likely will get more money than he would have for the same job the past six months.

## Chemical May Be Salvation of Teachers

Detroit—A chemical which may prove the salvation of grade school teachers throughout the world is being studied by scientists here.

Physicians at the Children's Center of Metropolitan Detroit found that 31 or 40 children between the ages of 5 and 11 who had been almost hopelessly unruly calmed down when given dextro-amphetamine.

Scientists called their fidgets "hyperkinetic impulse disorder."

"There is evidence that up to 2 per cent of the school age population from 5 to 11 present this problem," said Dr. Hunter H. Comly, director of the Children's Center.

To Stockholders of Rogue Valley State Bank:—Please Take Notice that a special meeting of the stockholders of the Rogue Valley State Bank will be held at 11:00 A.M. December 8, 1960, at its Head Office, 1109 Court Street, Medford, Oregon, subject to adjournment, to consider and act upon the following:

Proposed plan of merger between said bank and The Oregon Bank, Portland, Oregon.

Authorizing the directors and officers of said bank to implement such merger.

Such further action in connection with such merger and amendments as may properly come before the meeting.

G.R.S. 711045 sets forth the exclusive rights and remedies of dissenting stockholders, to wit:

(1) A dissenting stockholder of a state bank shall be entitled to receive the value in cash of only those shares which were voted against a merger to result in a state bank if and when the merger becomes effective, upon written demand made to the resulting state bank at any time within 90 days after the effective date of the merger accompanied by the surrender of the stock certificates.

The value of such shares shall be determined, as of the date of the stockholders' meeting approving the merger, by the merger agreement or by three appraisers, at the option of the dissenting stockholder.

(3) If the value fixed by the merger agreement is not accepted, appraisers shall be selected as follows: One to be selected by the vote of the owners of two-thirds of the shares involved at a meeting called by the Superintendent of Banks on 10 days' notice to the Board of Directors of the resulting state bank and the third, by the two so chosen. The valuation agreed upon by any two appraisers shall govern. If any appraiser is not appointed within 60 days after the effective date of the merger or if the appraisal is not completed within 90 days after the merger becomes effective, the Superintendent of Banks shall cause an appraisal to be made. The expenses of appraisal shall be paid by the resulting state bank.

(4) The amount due under such merger agreement, under the appraisal shall constitute a debt of the resulting state bank.
