Capitol Memo Republicans Could Conceivably Control Oregon Legislature

Salem —(UPI)—Mathematically speaking, the Republicans could control the Oregon legislature next year. But heavy Democratic voter registrations indicate the GOP may have to pull a rabbit out of the hat to do it.

In the 1959 legislature the Democrats held the balance of power in both chambers, 19-11 in the Senate and 33-27 in the House. The Republicans gained in the House last year while losing four seats in the Senate.

One advantage for the Republicans is that the Democrats have more to lose in the Senate this year. Of the 15 seats that are up, 12 are held by Democrats and only three by Republicans.

Two of these seats involve non-contests. Both Sens. Anthony Yturri, Ontario Republican, and Harry Boivin, Klamath Falls Democrat have no opposition. This makes the number of crucial seats 11 for the Democrats and two for the GOP.

If the Republicans hold these two—in Washington and Josephine counties—and take five away from the Democrats, the GOP would control the Senate 16-14.

In the House, which elects a new slate of 60 every two years, anything could happen. Peter Gunnar, Oregon Republican chairman, says the GOP has an "excellent chance to take the House," and he adds, "We have a much better chance than we've ever been given credit for to break even or take the Senate."

Robert Straub, Oregon Democratic chairman, is confident of Democratic control in the 1961 legislature.

"We will increase our lead in both houses," he says. "It is completely unlikely that the Republicans will win either house, and the wider margin will be in the Senate."

Plywood Market Forecast Told

Portland —(UPI)—A Seattle plywood official Wednesday forecast a potential plywood market of up to 16 billion board feet within 10 to 15 years.

C. Henry Bacon Jr., executive vice president of the Simpson Timber Co., Seattle, made the forecast at the annual fall promotion meeting of Douglas Fir Plywood Association here.

Bacon said the industry currently was selling at an annual rate of 8.2 billion feet while capacity has been rising rapidly and that it may approach 10 billion feet by the end of this year. He said the answer to this was better marketing and a stronger cooperative promotion effort than ever before.

Meany Points to 'Stagnation Of Employment' in Ike's Term

Washington —(UPI)—AFL-CIO President George Meany says the nation's total full-time employment increased by only 700,000 workers during the Eisenhower Administration. Meany called the increase a "stagnation of employment" and said "this shocking trend must be halted or it will undermine our entire society and throttle the advance of technology itself."

Meany blamed the "inadequate rise" on radical technological changes "in a period of slowly rising sales and production."

More Than Doubled
He said joblessness has more than doubled—up from 1.9 million in 1953 to 3.9 million in 1960.

Meany's statement was contained in a booklet "New Views on Automation" published by the Congressional Joint Economic Committee. The 600-page document is composed of statements from a number of labor and industrial leaders, government officials and professional men.

Meany said a "much more rapid pace of economic growth" is needed in the 1960s to provide more jobs for workers displaced by automation.

Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell said "a high rate of economic growth will be essential" to meet the needs of an expanding population. Mitchell estimated that total employment will rise by about 20 per cent by 1970. He said there were grounds for confidence that automation and productivity can advance without a rise on the overall unemployment rate.

Meany and other labor leaders called for a comprehensive federal employment to lessen the impact of automation on workers. Recommendations included reduction in the standard work week, aid to economically distressed areas and liberalization of unemployment and social security benefits.

Roadblocks Thrown
Rudolph F. Bannow, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, charged that many labor leaders, while "paying lip service" to automation, have thrown roadblocks in its path.

Bannow discounted fears that automation would produce large-scale unemployment. But he said labor could "halt or seriously deter the orderly process of technological change by appropriating the benefits of automation."

Bannow and other industrialists said present tax laws hamper the growth of automation and should be revised.

OSC, Thailand Program Expires
Washington —(UPI)—The International Cooperation Administration said Wednesday that an exchange program between Oregon State College and Kasetsart, a university in Thailand expired this month.

Under the program, which existed for approximately five years, about 50 students from Thailand studied at Oregon State and a number of teachers helped with the agriculture training program at Kasetsart.

A spokesman said the contract was allowed to expire because some leaders felt that the Thailand University had reached the stage where it could go ahead on its own.
