### American Club Refuses Offer

Houston, Tex. - (UPI) - The owners of Houston's new National league baseball franchise, nipped by a refusal of an offer of \$382,500 for the city's American association club, said today that if their offer is not accepted within 10 days they'll simply wait and draft the territory.

George Kirksey, executive secretary of the Houston Sports association, made the offer to Bufts president William Hopkins Friday. Hopkins refused the offer and said the asking price for the club was \$800,000.

"We made this offer to buy the Bufts despite advice of our friends in baseball," Kirksey said. "One National league owner told us to trim our offer in half and we would be closer to a more realistic figure."

"The Houston American association team is worthless as a business investment," he added.

Kirksey said his group would like to operate the American association franchise in 1961 - but if necessary will purchase another AAA club and then draft the Houston territory in October, 1961, under existing baseball rules.

### Bears and Colts Should Win Sunday Encounters

The Baltimore Colts and Chicago Bears, who share the lead in the Western division of the National Football league, play on the road today against a pair of teams that have not yet won a game and are due for an upset.

Baltimore, in excellent shape, was a 14-point pick over the Detroit Lions and Chicago was the choice by 6 points over the Los Angeles Rams.

Both Rams coach Bob Waterfield and Detroit coach George Wilson feel that just as it is practically impossible to go undefeated in the NFL, so is it inevitable to go for too long a stretch without victory. At least, they're hoping that today is the day.

The Cleveland Browns, only team in the league with a perfect record thus far, play at home against the Philadelphia Eagles in an important Eastern Division game. The Eagles, with a 3-1 record, need a victory to stay "alive" in the race. But the Browns, who won their first meeting, 41-24, in Philadelphia, are 10-point favorites.

Packers Favored

In other NFL games, the Green Bay Packers were favored by 9 1/2 points over the San Francisco Forty-Niners at Milwaukee; the Pittsburgh Steelers, with quarterback Bobby Layne a doubtful starter because of an injured thumb, were rated even with the Redskins at Washington; and the St. Louis Cardinals were picked by 10 at home against the winless Dallas Cowboys.

The American Football league presents one of this weekend's top pro attractions at New York, where the Titans entertain the Houston Oilers in a battle for first place in the Eastern Division. In other games, the Denver Broncos are at home against the Boston Patriots, and the Buffalo Bills entertain the Oakland Raiders.

### Wyoming Beats Flyboys 15-0

Laramie, Wyo. - (UPI) - Wyoming put up a savage defense and turned loose its hard running backs Saturday to defeat a battling Air Force academy football team, 15-0.

Hard line play by the Cowboys and winds up to 42 miles per hour all but bottled up the Air Force aerial attack led by quarterback Rich Mayo, the nation's second leading passer.

Wyoming sprung an aerial attack of its own with Mike Wright, an 18-year-old quarterback, passing for the Cowboys' first score after Falcon right half Mike Swins fumbled on his own 21 with four minutes and 22-seconds left in the first half, and Cowboy end Kevin Ward recovered.

Wright, a 177-pound sophomore, flipped a pass to right half Dick Hamilton for the score. A furious charge by the Air Force line overwhelmed Wyoming's kicking specialist, Joe Dempsey, as he tried for the extra point.

Quarterback Chuck Lamson found a hole in the Air Force line and ran 40 yards for Wyoming's second score in the fourth period. Wright's attempted pass to halfback Jerry Hill for the conversion was no good.

Lamson intercepted a Mayo pass on the Air Force 40 a few seconds later. But the academy defense stiffened on the 17 and Dempsey came in and kicked a field goal to end the scoring.

### Wildcats Hold On To Win 7-6

Evanson, Ill. - (UPI) - Northwestern's defense, holding Notre Dame's stumbling attack without a first down for 40 minutes, squeaked to a 7-6 victory yesterday to break a three-game losing streak in the nationally televised football game of the day.

The Wildcats, 13-point favorites, never glinted against the Irish but Notre Dame's attack was futile until a brief dash in the third period which resulted in a touchdown.

Notre Dame's losing streak was extended to four games, equalling the second longest in Irish history, established by the 1933 team, and only one short of the record losing string of five games, set in 1956.

Bird hunting season opened Saturday and Chief Champlin said there are several areas in the city in which bird hunting would be good if it was not illegal.

Most of these areas are located in the north part of the city and on municipal airport property, the two men noted. Gutjahr said signs will be posted at the airport prohibiting hunting there.

Champlin said that in past seasons hunters have been "very co-operative" in not hunting within the city. There have been some violations, he noted, but they have been isolated cases.

Sam Jones, Billy O'Dell and Stu Miller divided pitching honors for the Giants.

The home team got its only run off Miller in the seventh. Akira Kunimatsu hit a long fly triple to right center which the Giants' famed Willie Mays could not quite catch. Andy Miyamoto then bunted him in as first baseman Orlando Cepeda could not get either runner in the successful squeeze.

### Army Buries Villanova 54-0

West Point, N. Y. - (UPI) - Army's gridiron Grenadiers paraded to a 54-0 victory Saturday, burying Villanova under an avalanche of eight touchdowns to hand the tattered Wildcats their sixth consecutive and worst defeat of the season.

Dick Eckert of Carlisle, Pa., led the assault by scoring once and passing for three other touchdowns as the Army added insult to injury in spearheading its attack with Pennsylvanians against the Philadelphia university.

For when it was over this autumn-painted day before 24,154 chilled spectators, in addition to Eckert's heroics two other keystone staters had sparked the massacre, with two touchdowns for Al Rushatz of Allentown, Pa., and six extra points for Frank Blanda of Youngwood, Pa.

### Driver Injured In Trial Run Crash

Monterey, Calif. - (UPI) - Jack Graham, 41-year-old San Jose contractor and auto racer, was reported in serious condition Saturday after he overturned his sports car during a practice run over the Laguna Seca course at Fort Ord.

Graham's three-liter Ferrari Testa Roca went over a 45-degree embankment on the fourth turn of the 1.9 mile course. He suffered neck and skull injuries.

The accident married an otherwise outstanding Friday which saw the course record cracked four times as 19 professionals qualified for today's big Pacific Grand Prix races here.
