And, the No. 1 ranked Oregon prep gridiron team pushed its high prestige into a third state of the union by thundering over an outclassed Reno, Nev., High school Husky aggregation.

Long Kickoff Run

Halfbacks Jim Barry and Phil Humphreys gained the limelight on the evening's most thrilling Tornado scoring plays. Barry, a stellar defender, scooped up a loose ball and sprinted 61 yards to the Reno goal. Humphreys touched down on an 85-yard runback of the second half opening kickoff. Medford blocking formed quickly and massively to let Barry romp away and Humphreys had a tremendous picket line assist.

There will be no Medford public sale of reserve seat tickets for the Medford-Ashland high football game at Ashland next Friday night. Medford Principal Lester Harris has announced. This is because of the limited supply. Only 112 were available from Ashland and requests of players' parent are being filled.

Humphreys also tabulated the first Tornado TD on a 16-yard jaunt. Fullback Dan Sieg went over twice from three and 17-yards out. Halfbacks Kent Blew and Jack Lowery each crossed the goal on respective 15 and 13-yard runs.

Dan Miles kicked three extra tallies and two other conversions were off the toe of Bill Heyerman.

Sparkling play by tailback and quarterback Dave Ricks took some of the edge off of what otherwise was a disappointing Reno night. The Huskies' workhorse ball carrier and passer touchdown for the Nevadans in the early fourth period, slanting over tackle for nine yards.

Goes Play Defense

Quarter margins favored the host crew 20 to 0, 33 to 0 and 40 to 0. Medford first offensive unit, the Go Team, carried the attack only through the first quarter and on the second half kickoff. It went to touchdowns each time it got the ball. The Goes did see additional service as a defensive crew but Coach Fred Spiegel turned the assault over to the Shock, Red Band and Junior Rebel units. And, a fifth backfield got into the fray.

Reserve force, likewise, was used in defensive operations. A total of 52 Black Tornadoes gained duty in the game. Sieg opened the first Medford TD drive when he burst 37 yards from the Tornado 41-yard line to the Reno 22. He gained five more to the 16 and Humphreys swept the remaining distance with Sieg and guard Al Funston leading the way.

Jim Stever's pass interception then set up a Medford

73-yard 10-play march to the end zone. Humphreys had runs of 22 and 13 yards and halfback Mike Hood one of nine before Sieg crossed from the three.

Before Reno could get in gear, Medford tackle Monte Jones fell on a fullback. Dennis Arch fumble on the Reno 37. Quarterback Scott Benson lost a yard. Humphreys took a pitch and went 21 yards to the 17. Sieg boomed through a hole and rammed to the end zone.

The Tornadoes stopped a Reno push on the Medford 38 and took the ball on their 18 on a Jim Evans punt. After an offside penalty and a pitch-out that went awry, Medford's gridders found themselves on their own one-foot line. Sieg, however, got off a long quick kick from the end zone which carried to the Medford 49.

Helped by a roughing the passer infraction, the Huskies got back to the Tornado 25. But, there was an apparent bad center snap and Ricks could not control the ball. Barry grabbed the ball on the run on the Medford 36 and ran away to TD land.

Blew Tallies
Medford's fifth score of the fracas came on a sustained drive of 53 yards with Blew's 15-yard paying dash the longest gain. He swept right and with good blocking and smashed the last three yards into the end zone. Mike McCullough and George Clearwater each packed on 10 yard plays. On his 85-yarder Humphreys raced down the right sideline after crossing the field to get behind the screen. Reno's next effort was stopped by Dick Ragsdale's pass interception and 30 yard runback but Medford tries to generate further attack in the third stanza were halted by two fumbles and recoveries by Reno's Al Glockzin.

A Ricks to Mike Lane pass for 28 yards touched off the Reno 53-yard spurt to the goal, putting the ball on the Medford 29. A Tornado offside moved the ball to the 24. A Ricks-Lane pass made it to the 17 and Ricks went around end on an option to the nine. He scored on the next play.

Lowery Crosses Goal
The Medford's came right back with a 57-yard promenade with Lowery going over on the ninth play. Frank Van Pelt had one 10 yard gain.

The Tornado passed only twice in the mix with Hood completing one of two throws to Ragsdale for seven yards. Ricks hit receivers on seven of 17 heaves for Reno for 96 yards. Humphreys had 78 yards in five scrimmage carries for Medford and Sieg 73 yards in six. Ricks packed 22 times for Reno and netted 58 yards.

Defensive honors for Medford were much divided by the heavy substitution. Jon Culbert, Ricks, Pete Josse and Willie Scott headed the Huskies in trying to hold back Medford. Al Funston, Medford defensive leader, flashed his offensive talents with a starting guard assignment in place of the missing Terry Earl.

The Grizzlies tabulated first in the fracas but Del Norte warpathed to a 19 to 6 advantage before Ashland could gain the goal again. Quarter counts were Ashland 6 to 0, Del Norte 12 to 6 and Ashland 25 to 19.

Bob Voris spurred the Grizzlies going for the last four Ashland touchdowns after a run which set up the home team's second TD of the night. The Voris tally romps were for 53, 20, 83 and two yards.

Farmer Scores
Ashland went to a touchdown the first time it got the ball. Forrest Farmer went 24 yards to the score. Crescent City countered in the second quarter with Larry Baker to
