Communism Ideology Phony, Organization Is Triumph

"Communism is a triumph of organization, not ideology," Dr. Marshall Woodell, professor of political science at Southern Oregon college, told the Jackson County Council of Parent Teacher Associations at a meeting held Wednesday, October 19, at the Bellview Grange hall, Ashland.

Dr. Woodell, Navy Reserve commander, attended the National War college in Washington, D. C., this summer.

"The Communist ideology is phony, their organization carries them. If we expect to survive we must organize for

conflict, we must know what we believe in and be ready to defend it, we must recognize the crisis we are in and stop conceding points with the Soviet Union.

"We have been on the defensive too long," the speaker continued. "It is time we started making the Communists guess what we are doing. A mass effort is needed to teach the American way of life."

Dr. Woodell asked, "Are you going to be morally and ideologically ready for total war when it comes?"

He recommended "Protracted Conflicts," a book published by Harper Brothers and J. Edgar Hoover's book "Masters of Deceit" as studies of the crisis the U. S. finds itself in.

A tape narrated by a Marine corps psychiatrist, William E. Mayer, on "Communist Indoctrination" was heard. Dr. Mayer stated that Korean war prisoners were "brainwashed" by education and indoctrination, not torture and drugs. The Communist primary weapon was said to be indoctrination, where our primary consideration is the human being.

"There is too much lethargy on the part of Americans towards civil defense and Communism," he said. "We have to learn to understand the Communist line — it won't go away if we try to ignore it."

A controlled study was made of a "cross section of American males" from Korean war camps. Dr. Mayer

nation was by young Red Chinese men who had been educated in the United States. The Communist way was to educate where the American system had failed to educate. The prisoners had more hours of education in the war camp than the average prisoner had had prior to the war. The prisoners were grouped 12 to 15 in a group and listened to months of lectures, study and discussion groups on the Communist way of life while breaking down the American "imperialist" way of life, the doctor said.

As a result of this period 3,000 of the 7,000 prisoners died. Studies of the 4,000 returning men showed that they had been taught so well that they wouldn't talk to each other, they had been taught not to trust anyone. As a result of the study Dr. Mayer said that we all need to have a firm dedication to our principals and our ideals.

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
