Man Visits Hornbrook Aunt

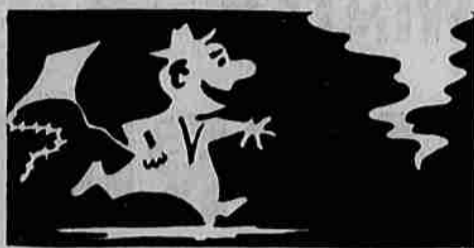
Hornbrook - William Bailey was a visitor recently at the home of his aunt, Mrs. Mary Kurt.
